

Div Com Jammu discusses Revenue issues with DCs

Calls for encroachment eviction, timely service delivery & expeditious process for delineation of Gair Mumkin Khad Land

JAMMU: Divisional Commissioner Jammu, Ramesh Kumar on Saturday chaired a meeting of Deputy Commissioners to review the Revenue related issues in the districts of Jammu division.

The meeting was attended in person by Additional Commissioners, Assistant Commissioners with Div Com and other concerned officers, while the Deputy Commissioners along with ACRs, ADCs, participated in the meeting through video conferencing.

Threadbare discussions were held on the important issues, while the Div Com reviewed in detail status of digitisation of revenue records, distribution of passbooks, clearance of land use conversion pleas, land acquisition for development works, land acquisition for Army, BSF installations, online revenue services, court cases, enquiry cases pending and other important revenue matters.

The concerned Deputy Commissioners apprised the Divisional Commissioner about the progress achieved in their respective districts under digitisation of land records under Digital India Land Records Modernization programme (DLRMP) and the course of action for furthering the land reforms.

The Div Com directed Deputy Commissioners to conduct random inspection (Partial) of some Jamabandis and ensure that the record is error free. He also instructed the DCs to constitute Tehsil wise, patwar halqa wise committees and set targets for the Tehsildars for completing the process in a time-bound manner.

The Div Com also instructed the DCs to expedite the process of distribution of passbooks by holding special camps. "This will help in speeding up distribution and reaching out to maximum public" he added.

While reviewing the status of online revenue services, the Div Com directed the DCs to ensure training of staff, quality disposal of people's grievances

about the online services available.

The Div Com inquired about the number of applications applied for Fard, mutation, copy of mutation, copy of Girdavri etc. The DCs apprised about the total number of applications received and disposed of.

The Div Com took note of high rejection rate in copy of mutations and in other revenue services and instructed the DCs to identify the reasons and ensure disposal of applications within designated PSGA days.

The Div Com also reviewed the status of court cases pending in the districts and directed the DCs to expedite the disposal of all pending cases.

While reviewing the clearance of the land use conversion applications, the

Div Com instructed the DCs to ensure the disposal within 30 days.

The Div Com also reviewed the progress on land acquisition process for development works and instructed the concerned DCs to expedite the land acquisition and disbursement of land compensation. He also instructed DCs to expedite the disposal of land acquisition, requisition cases of BSF, Army on priority.

The Div Com asked DCs to hold regular meetings with defense estate officers and Army, BSF Officers and follow all the pending cases.

The Div Com also reviewed progress on retrieval of government land and directed DCs to expedite the process and ensure eviction of government land, removal of encroachments. He also asked DCs to Set monthly targets for retrieval of common, state land and also take measures to keep a check on fresh encroachments in the districts.

The Div Com directed DCs to fix target for eviction of encroachment and performance will be reviewed monthly.

While reviewing delineation of Gair Mumkin Khad Land the Div com emphasized to expedite process of delineation of Gair Mumkin Khad land and progress will be reviewed fortnightly, no laxity will be allowed in this matter.

On World Food Day, despite Garib Kalyan Yojna India slips in World Hunger Index

SRINAGAR: Today is World Food Day, almost one in ten people globally are undernourished, and more than 3 billion can't afford a healthy diet, according to the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO).

Conflict, climate change and rising prices are all contributing to growing food insecurity around the world.

The FAO says governments should re-evaluate their support to agriculture to help improve sustainable production of more nutritious foods.

World Food Day, held this year on 16 October, is an annual reminder that food insecurity and malnourishment remain widespread and are poised to worsen thanks to a range of ongoing threats, including climate change, inflation, geopolitical conflict, and more.

Here's what to know about World Food Day and why it's more important than ever.

World Food Day is an international day celebrated every year worldwide on October 16th to commemorate the date of the founding of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization in 1945.

There is no good news for India on World Food Day, even central government is providing free ration to its 80crore BPL ration card holders out of 135 crore total population under The Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Anna Yojana (PMGKAY) , which was started in April

2020 to help the poor whose livelihoods were shattered by a nationwide lockdown aimed at containing the spread of the coronavirus.

India slipped six places on global Hunger Index 2022 to take 107th position out of 121 countries ranked.

India has been ranked behind all south Asian countries except the war torn Afghanistan, with a score of 29.1, the publishers of Global Hunger Index European NGOs concern worldwide and welthungerhilfe-have levelled the level of hunger as "serious".

GHI scores are based on the values of four component indicators -under nourishment, child stunting, child wasting, child mortality.

The data used for the indicators have been sourced various UN and other multilateral agencies, including UNICEF, World Bank, Food and Agriculture Organisation(FAO) the report said.

Neighbouring countries are above the India. As many as 17 countries have been collectively ranked between 1 and 17 with a score of less than five.

On release of Hunger Index many opposition leaders attack the BJP central government. Senior Congress leader P Chidambaram said this is very shocking data.

Earlier the central Government had rejected last year's GHI report saying the publishing agencies had not done their "due diligence."

Retd. Justice Bashir Ahmad Kirmani, former Judge, High Court of J&K was the resource person in the programme.

In his inaugural address, Justice Javed Iqbal Wani, Judge, High Court of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh described the significance of the concept of justice in maintaining a delicate equation between qualitative and speedy justice within the justice delivery mechanism through statutory procedures.

He also stated that the triple concepts of Plea Bargaining, Compounding of cases and

in various courts. He also stressed that since the new institution of cases outnumbers the disposal of cases, it is imperative that alternative modes are adopted to lessen the pendency in courts.

He also emphasised that the judicial officers must tune-up their abilities and craftsmanship in clearing the backlog yet they must not lose sight of the concept of justice which is the essence of the whole system of administration of justice.

Shahzad Azeem, Director, J&K Judicial Academy welcomed the participants and gave an overview of the programme. He stated that the present day criminal justice system is severely affected by the inordinate delays and enormous pendency of cases in courts which is a potent factor for the overcrowding of jails and has a cryptic tendency to negatively impact the entire domain of administration of justice.

He described the provisions of Plea Bargaining, Compounding of cases and Probation of Offenders Act, as sure alternative modes for disposal of cases which have the capacity of playing a very decisive role in bringing down the figures of pending cases in the courts.

In the technical sessions, Justice Bashir Ahmad Kirmani, resource person deliberated upon the concept and provisions relating to the provisions of Plea Bargaining, Compounding of cases and Probation of Offenders Act and the procedure for disposal of criminal cases by effectuating the provisions in compliance to the directions of the Supreme Court.

Later, an interactive session was held during which the participants deliberated and discussed the various aspects of the subject topic and raised queries which were satisfactorily settled by the resource person.

Chamber, bazaar associations hold protest against opening of Reliance store

Allowing Reliance to open store will prove fatal for small businesses: Arun Gupta

JAMMU: All the major Bazar Associations on Saturday held a meeting at the Chamber House on the request of President Chamber of Commerce & Industry Arun Gupta to discuss various burning issues including.

The Presidents of all major Bazaar Associations were present and threadbare discussions were held regarding hike in power tariff and opening of Reliance store in Jammu.

Speaking in the meeting, Arun Gupta said that the authorities should revisit the proposal to hike power tariff as this is not the right time to take such hard decisions because people are currently facing financial crunch due to pandemic corona and its ill effects.

Gupta said that the Power Department has miserably failed to reduce the transmission losses and continuously hiking the power tariff, resulting in uncertainty in the mind of the existing industrial units as well as prospective investors who are in the process of setting up new units. "The government should take preventive measures to plug the Loopholes in the System and try to control Transmission Losses the areas other than the Industrial Areas and also

improve the Infrastructure to control the Transmission Losses," he added.

Gupta suggested that the Industrial, commercial and essential feeders should be separated to know about the actual losses.

The Presidents of all the major bazaar associations reposed their full faith in the Chamber team and were unanimously of the view that Chamber's stand has always been justified based on facts and logic.

Later, Arun Gupta along with members of various Bazaar Associations gathered at Tawi Bridge and staged a symbolic protest against the opening of another store of Reliance in Jammu.

The CCI President appealed to the govern-

ment not to allow this business tycoon to open another store in Jammu as it will directly affect the sales of small shopkeepers, which are already struggling for their sustenance due to rising inflation and several other issues concerning their business. He said that allowing Reliance to open new store will prove fatal for the small businesses in the region which should not be the case as the government has the responsibility to look after one and all in the Union Territory.

Arun Gupta also appealed to the members of Jammu Chamber to assemble at Dogra Chowk on October 16 at 10 AM as a mark of protest against the opening of another retail store of Reliance in Jammu.

India romp to seventh Women's Asia Cup title with easy win over Sri Lanka

SYLHET: India maintained their dominance in the Women's Asia Cup with an eight-wicket demolition of a self-destructing Sri Lanka in the final here on Saturday for their seventh title in eight editions.

Sri Lanka, who were playing their first tournament final in 14 years, imploded after opting to bat on a slow and turning pitch. They could only manage 65 for nine which India knocked off in 8.3 overs. Smriti

Mandhana struck a sublime 51 not out off 25 balls.

It was a procession after Sri Lankan skipper Chamari Athapaththu got run out in the third over following a mix up with Anushka Sanjeevani who too got run out six balls later.

Renuka, who has been in top form since the Commonwealth Games in August, sent back Hasini Perera to the very first ball she faced. The left-hander checked her shot only to be caught at cover, leaving Sri

Lanka at nine for four.

The Sri Lankans were in dire need of a partnership but Kavisha Dilhari's fall made it 16 for five as she was bowled while trying to play an incoming delivery from Renuka across the line.

Rajeshwari Gayakwad got her first wicket after Nilakshi de Silva played on to her stumps while trying to at a ball close to her body. At 32 for eight, being bowled out for a sub-50 total was very much on the

cards, but Ranaweera saved them from that ignominy with an unbeaten 18 off 22 balls.

The Indians bowled with discipline but poor shot selection contributed more to Sri Lanka's steep slide. After a memorable win over Pakistan in the semifinals, it seemed the occasion got the better of Sri Lanka.

India lost Shafali Verma and Jemimah Rodrigues cheaply in the run chase. However, both the batters did well in the tour-

nament, with Shafali getting back to form and Jemimah making a successful comeback from injury.

The elegant Mandhana played some exquisite strokes on way to completing the formality alongside skipper Harmanpreet Kaur (11 not out off 14). Smriti's effort included three sixes and six boundaries. Fittingly, she sealed the win with a maximum off Oshadi Ranasinghe.

The win is a shot in the arm

for India's preparations for the T20 World Cup next year. They were able to test players for different roles during the competition, though that also contributed to their only loss in the tournament, against Pakistan in the league stage.

The Indians took a lap of the Sylhet International Cricket Stadium and, in a fine gesture, got clicked with the entire groundstaff after their triumph, which was witnessed by a sizeable turnout.
