JAMMU: To accommodate the increased travel demand during the upcoming Diwali and Chhath Puja festivals, Western Railway has announced the operation of multiple Festival Special Trains on special fares. These trains will operate between Mumbai Central-Shakur Basti, Bandra Terminus-Gandhidham, and Sabarmati-Haridwar, ensuring better connectivity for passengers travelling during the festive season.

According to a press release issued by Vineet Abhishek, Chief Public Relations Officer, Western Railway, Train No. 09471/09472 Bandra Terminus-Gandhidham Weekly SuperFast Special will make 10 trips. Train 09471 will depart Bandra Terminus every Tuesday at 12:30 PM and reach Gandhidham at 1:30 AM the next day, running from October 14 to November 11, 2025. every Wednesday and Saturday at 8:50 AM, reaching Haridwar at 5:30 AM the next day from October 15 to November 29, 2025. In the return direction. Train 09426 will leave Haridwar every Thursday and Sunday at 9:40 PM, arriving in Sabarmati at 9:30 PM the following day, from October 16 to November 30, 2025. Key halts include Mahesana, Palanpur, Abu Road, Ajmer, Jaipur, Delhi, Meerut, Roorkee, and more. This train will have AC 3-Tier coaches.

the long-pending demands and grievances of retired police personnel and members of the Fire Services Department regarding the issue of pay anomalies and other pensionrelated disparities. Addressing the gathering, Ajit Singh the continued discrimination faced by the retired police pensioners. He said that Government Order No. 229-F of 2014 dated 17-10-2014. pertaining to the pay anomaly issue, was implemented prospectively, which means its

stressed that the benefit should have been granted retrospectively from 1996, the year when the 5th Pay Commission was implemented across the State.

"The Police Department was unfairly left out of that imple-

effect was given only from the mentation, and many of our who retired after 2019 have justice are no longer alive. The surviving pensioners deserve to be compensated for their service and patience," he said.

> The forum also demanded that the government extend the facility of the ECH Card to all retirees who retired before 2019, pointing out that those

facility. "Equality should be maintained among all retirees irrespective of the year of retirement," Ajit Singh added. Another kev issue raised was

related to Article 242 of the Civil Services Rules, under which the pension process is to be handled by the Drawing and Disbursing Officers (DDOs). The pensioners urged the authorities to release the pending gratuity and finalize pension cases in accordance with the provisions of Article 242, as has been done in other departments.

The forum also reminded the government that the Tribunal Court has already passed a judgment in their favour, bringing justice to their longstanding demands.

The pensioners now expect the government to implement the court's order without further delay and to end the pro longed discrimination against the retired police and fire services personnel.

Ajit Singh urged the Lieutenant Governor's Administration to take immediate action to resolve the grievances, ensuring justice and dignity for those who dedicated their lives to public safetv and service.
