The truth makes both the Hakim and the Professor look foolish, showing how blind faith and big egos can mislead people. With lively

dialogues, funny situations and light-hearted humour, Purvabhyaas becomes an entertaining yet meaningful play on quackery, human weakness and how easily we can be made to laugh at

JAMMU: Dr. Varinder Sharma, Co-Convenor of the BJP Health Cell, Jammu & Kashmir, launched a sharp attack on the National Conference (NC) for politicising the Darbar Move and misleading the people of Jammu. He accused NC of hypocrisy, saying the same party that once insulted Maharaja Hari Singh and forced him out of his princely state is now invoking his name for political gain.
