Stop illegal encroachments on Nallahs, Nikki Tawi: Yudhvir Sethi in Assembly

SRINAGAR: MLA Jammu East Yudhvir Sethi on Tuesday raised serious concerns in the Legislative Assembly regarding the ongoing encroachment of Nallahs by land grabbers in the Nikki Tawi and Bajalta areas, warning that unchecked construction on these water channels could lead to yet another flood disaster in the region.

Sethi pointed out that the floods last year had caused massive destruction in these areas, washing away nearly 70 houses, most of which were built illegally on encroached

"Last year, around 70 houses were swept away during the floods, and all of them belonged to encroachers who had constructed on the Nallah land," he said, adding that despite the devastation, the same people have once again started building houses inside the same Nallahs. Expressing concern over the recurring pattern, Sethi cautioned that allowing such illegal constructions to continue will only result in repeated losses in the future.

"If the same situation continues, these houses will again be washed away in the next flood, causing not only property loss but also endangering lives," he warned.

He urged the administration to take immediate preventive action to avert future tragedies. "I request the concerned minister to instruct the Divisional Commissioner Jammu and DC Jammu to issue strict

instructions ensuring that no encroacher is allowed to build houses inside the nallahs. Sethi said.

He emphasized that stopping illegal encroachments now would save both lives and government resources later, as compensation and relief funds are repeatedly spent on the same avoidable incidents.

The MLA also appealed to the government to strengthen monitoring and enforcement mechanisms to prevent future encroachments and to take firm action against violators.

"Preventive measures today will safeguard the people of Jammu East from future calamities," he added.

STATE TIMES NEWS JAMMU: The Jammu and Kashmir Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) launched a blistering attack on the Deputy Chief Minister of Jammu & Kashmir, accusing him of repeatedly using "derogatory, uncivil and unacceptable language" against the Leader of Opposition and others, and charged the ruling National Conference (NC) with "insulting Jammu's dignity" by appointing such a persor

J&K BJP Spokespersons, Arun Gupta, Dr. Tahir Chowdhary, and Zorawar Singh Jamwal criticized the NC and its leaders while addressing a joint press conference at BJP headquarters, Trikuta Nagar, Jammu.

Arun Gupta said the Deputy Chief Minister had "forgotten the language of a civilized society" and had "crossed all boundaries of decency and responsibility expected from a public office-holder." "When the Deputy Chief Minister speaks, he seems to forget how a leader in a civilized society should talk. He doesn't know where to stop or what dignity

demands," Gupta said, asserting that such conduct "tarnishes Jammu's image." He further reminded that the Deputy Chief Minister's post has no constitutional recognition, while the Leader of Opposition is a constitutionally defined position, deserving respect across the political spectrum. "The Deputy CM must know his limits. The Constitution doesn't even recognize his post, yet he dares to speak against a constitutional office with such foul language. This is not

ety," Gupta declared. Calling out the National Conference, Gupta alleged that the party had "knowingly chosen a person with an abusive temperament" to represent Jammu.

"The NC knew exactly what kind of man he is-someone who forgets decency and civility. Yet they made him Deputy CM to deliberately distort Jammu's image. We cannot tolerate this any longer," he said.

Dr Tahir Chowdhary echoed the sentiment, accusing the NC leadership of showing its "disregard and bias" towards

Jammu through its appointment choices.

"When the NC made him Deputy CM, they did it fully aware of his attitude. He doesunderstand political responsibility. Every time he speaks, his words expose his immaturity," Dr Chowdhary

He added that such language from a constitutional office sends a "dangerous message" to the next generation.

"We didn't want to dr into public mudslinging because when you throw a stone in filth, you get splashed too. But now the situation is unbearable. The Deputy CM has become completely unrestrained," he said.

He further questioned Chief Minister Omar Abdullah's silence, saying, "Why hasn't the Chief Minister acted? Why hasn't the NC corrected this behaviour? Their silence means endorsement."

Zorawar Singh Jamwal drew a historical parallel, invoking the late Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee's conduct as an example of parliamentary

"Atal ji, even while sitting in

the Opposition, spoke with such grace that the Prime Minister of the day would rise to appreciate him. He always said - political differences are natural, but personal bitterness has no place in public life," Jamwal said.

He said that the Deputy CM's "abusive and provocative remarks" reflect a "moral and political collapse" in the ruling

"The problem is not just wrongs are being justified. The Chief Minister's silence is an endorsement. No society, no institution accepts this level of indecency," he added.

Jamwal said the BJP will continue to raise this issue both inside and outside the Assembly. "The BJP believes in healthy, issue-based politics for the welfare of the people of Jammu and Kashmir. But we cannot allow any leader to insult constitutional positions or defame Jammu's civilizational ethos," he said. All three BJP spokespersons urged the National Conference to take immediate cognizance and remove the Deputy CM from

Drug de-addiction centres functional in J&K: Sakeena

SRINAGAR: Minister for Health and Medical Education, Sakeena Itoo on Tuesday said that all Drug De-addiction centres are fully functional in J&K and directed for fee regulation at all centres for affordable rehabilitation of victims.

The Minister made these remarks while replying to a question of Legislator, Surject Singh Salathia on Drug Addiction, in Legislative Assembly. She highlighted that the Health and Education departments along-with law enforcement agencies are playing an active role to fight the menace of drug abuse in society. She added that strict instructions have been issued to head of all educational institutions (colleges and schools) to install CCTVs in and around their campuses to check any kind of irregular activities.

The Minister also lauded the role of NGOs in dealing with this alarming situation across J&K, adding that their support is must for combating this social evil.

While giving reply to the question, the Minister said that 166 drug abuse cases have been reported in district Samba from the date of establishment of de-addiction centre at District Hospital Samba, with 114 Alcoholic and 62 Heroin & Cannabis affected, while as six patients have recov-



ered till date. She added that the Government is taking concrete steps to curb this menace in the UT of J&K in general and Samba district in particular, like awareness Lectures and Educational Activities, Establishment of De-addiction Outreach Programs Educational Institutions

Communities, Panchavat-Level Awareness Activities, Door-to-Door Survey and

Identification as well as Camps in Hotspot

Areas where a roster has been constituted

for the organization of awareness and

treatment camps in hotspot and other vulnerable areas. She added that these camps are led by psychiatrists and counsellors to provide both preventive education and initial treatment support. The Minister also informed that

Addiction Treatment Facility has been fully established at District Hospital, Samba since February 2024 sponsored by NDDTC (AIIMS New Delhi) under MOSIE, presently working on OPD basis with services like OPD by Psychiatrist, Counselling Services and Substance Substitute therapy. While commenting on the subject, Speaker Abdul Rahim Rather advised the Minister to take suggestions from a scientific document prepared by political representatives of a party, as it outlines effective and detailed measures for combating this social evil. The Minister informed the house that Government has already started working on this report, besides the topics related to Drug Addiction have already been made part of the curriculum. Legislators, Justice (Retd) Hasnain Masoodi; Dr. Shafi Ahmad Wani; Muzaffar Iobal Khan; Pawan Gupta; Tanvir Ali Sadiq; Narinder Singh; Dr. Rameshwar Singh; Dr. Bashir Ahmad Shah Veeri; Balwant Singh Mankotia, raised supplementary questions on the subject.

Atal Dulloo, on Tuesday chaired the 15th Narco Coordination Centre (NCORD) meeting to review the ongoing efforts and coordinated measures being taken to curb the menace of narcotics trafficking and substance abuse across the districts of Jammu and Kashmir. The meeting was attended by Additional Chief Secretary, Higher Education Department; Director General of Police (DGP); Additional Director General of Police (ADGP), CID; Principal Secretary, Home Department; and other senior officers from the civil and police administra-Commissioners Deputy

(DCs) and Senior Superintendents of Police (SSPs) from all districts participated through video confer-



encing. At the outset, the Chief Secretary underscored the importance strengthening the legal and institutional framework to ensure higher conviction rates under the NDPS Act. He directed the Police and Law Departments to collaborate closely to devise a strategy for improving prosecution out-

The Chief Secretary further

called for developing an AIenabled system to assist in the preparation of watertight charge sheets and directed IGP Jammu to lead the development of this module in coordination with the Prosecution and Law Departments.

He further instructed that all bails and acquittals granted in commercial quantity cases be promptly challenged, and directed the formulation of

Operating Procedures (SOPs) for Investigating and Prosecuting Officers to avoid common procedural lapses that hinder successful convictions. Highlighting the need for vigilance in the health sector, the Chief Secretary asked for a robust monitoring mechanism to track medicines prescribed to de-addiction patients to prevent misuse. He directed the Forensic Science Laboratory (FSL) to enhance the pace and quality of sample testing to ensure timely generation of credible reports. He also called for a review of long-pending NDPS cases, identification of reasons for procedural delays, and necessary corrective measures. He emphasized capacity building of investigating officers, prosecutors, and legal personnel to enhance the overall effectiveness of the antinarcotics drive.
