Farm union welcomes Govt's decision

 NEW DELHI: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Friday announced that the government has decided to repeal the three farm laws, which were at the centre of protests by farmers for the past year.

Addressing the nation on the occasion of Guru Nanak Jayanti, the prime minister said the three laws were for the benefit of farmers but "we couldn't convince a section of farmers despite best efforts".

The goal of the three farm laws was to empower farmers, especially small farmers, he said, adding He the three farm laws will be repealed in the coming Winter session of Parliament.

The agriculture budget has risen by five times with over Rs 1.25 lakh crore being spent annually, Modi said.

He also highlighted his gov't measures to benefit small farmers.

"I have experienced farmers' difficulties, challenges from very

close quarters in my five decades of public life," the prime minister said.


The day of announcement, coincided with Guru Nanak Jayanti which marks the birth anniversary of the one of the most revered Sikh gurus.

From Ghazipur border of Delhi-Uttar Pradesh to Singhu border of Delhi-Haryana, people were seen distributing sweets, 'jalebis' at protest sites.

TV channels and news portals also aired visuals, showing men carrying sweets in baskets, and distributing it to people at protest sites.

On Guru Nanak Jayanti, the Sikh community, every year celebrates the occasion with great reverence and festivities. Gurudwaras and public buildings and houses are lit up to mark the occasion.

Many farmers have been protesting and encamped at Delhi's borders since late November 2020 with a demand that the Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act, 2020, Farmers' (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020 and the Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020 be rolled back and a new law made to guar-

antee MSP for crops.

BKU(Ugrahan) is the largest among the all protesting farmers unions and are protesting at the Tikri border. Ugrahan faction of the BKU has sizeable presence across Punjab.

Various farmers unions have been protesting at the borders of the national capital since last year to demand repeal of three farm laws.

India-China ties going through a 'bad patch': Jaishankar

 SINGAPORE: External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said on Friday that India and China are going through a "particularly bad patch" in their ties because Beijing has taken a set of actions in violation of agreements for which it still doesn't have a "credible explanation" and it is for the Chinese leadership to answer where they want to take the bilateral relationship.

India has told China that progress in the disengagement process in eastern Ladakh was essential for the restoration of peace and tranquillity and that it is the basis for the development of

overall bilateral ties.

During his previous meeting with his Chinese counterpart Wang Yi in Tajikistan's capital Dushanbe on September 16, Jaishankar emphasised that the two sides should work towards early resolution of the remaining issues along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in eastern Ladakh while fully abiding by bilateral agreements and protocols.

"I don't think the Chinese have any doubt on where we stand on our relationship and what's not gone right with it. I've been meeting my counterpart Wang Yi a number of times. As you

Farms Bills: Had repeal come earlier, many lives may have been saved, says Azad

 JAMMU: Stating that none will criticise the Centre's decision to repeal the Farm Laws, Senior Congress leader Ghulam Nabi Azad on Friday, however, said had the step been taken earlier, many innocent lives lost during protests, due to harsh weather conditions and Covid-19, could have been saved.

Taking a jibe, Azad said the instance will also help BJP to remember in future, that first there should be a comprehensive study on any "anti-people" bill before taking any decision.

"The issue was raised and discussed on several occasions in Parliament, almost all political parties were on

Azad said, "Announcement has been made, parliament session begins November-end and I am sure the laws will be withdrawn in one week."

On dropping his name from the Disciplinary Committee

by the AICC, Azad said, "I have headed many committees in my more-than-three-decades-long political career and was member of one such committee for a decade."

"This is not a committee that meets often but once or twice in a year or more than that," said the Congress leader.

On revocation of Art 370 and 35A, he said that nobody was in its favour but let us see what's next.

India to soon manufacture 90 pc of defence products it needs: Rajnath

The effect of the strike was accentuated by the public holiday on account of Gurupurab, they added.

The Hurriyat Conference led by Mirwaiz Umar Farooq had given the strike call.

JK reports 193 new COVID cases, Ladakh 18
 SRINAGAR: Jammu and Kashmir on Friday reported 193 new COVID cases-- 23 from Jammu division and 170 from Kashmir division-- thus taking the total number of positive cases in Jammu and Kashmir to 335016.

Moreover, 105 more COVID-19 patients have recovered and been discharged from various hospitals including 18 from Jammu Division and 87 from Kashmir Division, officials said. They said that no new case of Mucormycosis has been reported during the past 24 hours.

The officials informed that 34,365 doses of COVID vaccine have been administered in the last 24 hours bringing the cumulative number of doses administered across J&K to 1,60,91,367. According to the daily Media Bulletin, out of 335016 positive cases, 1669 are Active Positive (262 in Jammu Division and 1407 in Kashmir

Austria to enter lockdown, bring in mandatory vaccinations

 BERLIN: Austrian Chancellor Alexander Schallenberg said Friday that the country will go into a national lockdown to contain a fourth wave of coronavirus cases.

Schallenberg said the lockdown will start Monday and initially last for 10 days. Most stores will close, and cultural events will be cancelled.

He initially said said all students would have to go back into home schooling.

Wolfgang Mueckstein, the country's health minister, later said that kindergartens and schools would remain

open for those who needed to go there but all parents were asked to keep their children at home if possible.

Starting on Feb. 1, the country will also make vaccinations mandatory, public broadcaster ORF reported.

We do not want a fifth wave, Schallenberg said, according to ORF. Not do we want a sixth or seventh wave.

Austria had initially introduced a national lockdown only for the unvaccinated that started Monday, but as virus cases continued to skyrocket the government said it had no choice but to extend it to everyone.

This is very painful,

Schallenberg said.

The national lockdown will initially last for 10 days, then the effects will be assessed and if virus cases have not gone down sufficiently, it can be extended to a maximum of 20 days.

Austria's intensive care doctors welcomed the government's decision.

"The record infection figures that we have now experienced day after day will only be reflected in normal and intensive care units with a time lag. It really is high time for a full stop, Walter Hasibeder, the president of the Society
