sector participation. It will also grant the Logistic sector the industry status, ensuring that it receives all the benefits of industrial policy," the Lieutenant Governor said.

He observed that, under the PM GatiShakti National Master Plan (PMGS-NMP), 49 major logistics and connectivity projects worth Rs 3,000 crore have already been mapped, supporting real-time coordination and faster execution. He said the integrated planning approach is helping J&K identify logistics gaps, improve last-mile connectivity to industrial estates, optimize freight movement, and significantly reduce logistics costs and transit times. The Lieutenant Governor further said that a Multi-Modal Logistics Park (MMLP) in Vijaypur, Jammu, will be developed through a Public-Private Partnership (PPP) model, under a Build-Develop-Finance-Operate-Transfer (DBFOT) approach.

The park will offer modern facilities such as Inland Container Depot (ICD), Warehousing, Cold Storage, Truck Terminal and Container Freight Station aimed at boosting trade and logistic efficiency.

The ministers included Samrat Choudhary and Vijay Kumar Sinha, both deputy CMs in the previous government, who have been elected as the BJP's leader and deputy leader, respectively, following the polls that were swept by the NDA, which got 202 seats in the 243-member assembly.

Out of 26, five ministers in the new Nitish cabinet are Dalits - one each from BJP, LJP(RV) and HAM, and two from JD(U). Eight ministers belong to the upper castes, including four Rajputs. Three Yadavs have also been accommodated in the new cabinet, which is a mix of senior coalition leaders and new entrants, with the focus on caste and regional balance. The portfolios to the ministers were not immediately allocated.

"Congratulations to Shri Nitish Kumar Ji on taking oath as Bihar's Chief Minister. He is an experienced administrator with a proven track record of good governance for many years. My best wishes to him for his tenure ahead," Modi wrote on X.

Modi, who had told voters during the campaign that he would "return for the swearing-in of an NDA government", delighted the crowd when he lifted his trademark 'gamchha' and swirled it above his head, a gesture that has become a signature of the 75-year-old leader. The Prime Minister also posted on X: "Congratulations to Shri Samrat Choudhary Ji and Shri Vijay Sinha Ji on becoming Deputy Chief Ministers of Bihar. Both leaders have worked extensively at the grassroots in serving people. Best wishes to them."

Leaders of several NDA-ruled states, including TDP chief and Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister Chandrababu Naidu, and BJP satraps Yogi Adityanath (Uttar Pradesh), Himanta Biswa Sarma (Assam), Devendra Fadnavis (Maharashtra), Mohan Yadav (Madhya Pradesh), and Rekha Gupta (Delhi) attended the ceremony.

With a tally of 89 out of 243 seats, the BJP, which emerged as the single largest party, had the lion's share of 14 ministers in the new cabinet.

Besides Choudhary and Sinha, other BJP leaders who took the oath included Mangal Pandey, Nitin Nabin, and Surendra Prasad Mehta, all of whom were ministers in the previous government.

State BJP president Dilip Jaiswal, who had resigned from the cabinet nearly two years ago in keeping with the party's 'one person, one post' policy, was back in the council of ministers. Another minister who is back after a break is Narayan Prasad. He had lost his post in 2022 when the chief minister abruptly quit the NDA. He was not re-inducted upon the JD(U) supremo's return to the BJP-led coalition last year.

The party has also brought in fresh faces like Shreyasi Singh, a professional shooter of international fame, who has been elected from Jammu for a second consecutive term. Other BJP leaders who will enjoy a ministerial berth for the first time are - Arun Shankar Prasad, Dr Pramod Kumar, Lakhendra Kumar Raushan, Sanjay Singh Tiger, and Rama Nishad.

Another notable inclusion is Ram Kripal Yadav, a former Union minister who lost the Patliputra Lok Sabha seat last year but was elected from Danapur in the assembly polls.

From the JD(U) quota, all the inductees were ministers in the previous government, including Zama Khan, the lone Muslim MLA in the NDA.

Others who took oath, included Bijendra Yadav, Shrawan Kumar, Vijay Kumar Chaudhary, Leshi Singh and Madan Sahni, Sunil Kumar, and Ashok Choudhary.

The NDA also comprises smaller allies like LJP(RV), HAM, and RLM, led by Union ministers Chirag Paswan, Jitan Ram Manjhi, and Rajya Sabha MP Upendra Kushwaha, respectively.

heritage, and natural beauty offer the perfect setting for yoga camps, wellness therapies, meditation courses, and nature-based healing. With proper planning, modern facilities, and effective promotion, Mantalai could easily attract visitors from across India and the world, giving Jammu a strong place on the global spiritual tourism map.

Billawar presents another striking example. Home to the sacred Sukrala Mata Shrine, it has the potential to grow into a major pilgrimage destination, much like Mata Vaishno Devi or the Shri Amarnathji Shrines. With improved facilities, better roads, and festival-centric promotion, Billawar could attract huge footfall from neighbouring states. Yet the area has virtually remained frozen in time - no tourist information campaigns, no dedicated yatri facilities, no major infrastructure projects. Meanwhile, Kashmir's pilgrim tourism continues to receive heavy publicity, streamlined facilities and sustained government push.

Reasi district, too, stands as a symbol of wasted opportunity. With its fast-flowing Chenab River; deep gorges, and dense forests, Reasi could easily become North India's next major adventure tourism hub. The region offers ideal terrain for rafting, trekking, camping, rock climbing, and other adventure sports. Properly developed, it could meaningfully complement the pilgrim magnet of Vaishno Devi. Yet apart from occasional proposals, nothing significant has materialised, while adventure tourism in Kashmir - skiing in Gulmarg, trekking in Sonamarg, gondola rides - continues to expand and attract lakhs of visitors annually.

This Kashmir-centric approach is not merely perceived; it is reflected in policy decisions, budget allocations, and tourism promotion. Kashmir routinely receives winter tourism drives, film festivals, G-20 events, national branding campaigns, and regular identification of new tourist destinations such as Gurez, Bangus Valley, Tosa Maidan, and Doodhpathri. In contrast, Jammu continues to wait even for basic recognition of destinations that already enjoy local popularity. Even in aero-adventure tourism, Jammu is overlooked. Regions like Udhampur; Samba, Reasi, and parts of Jammu district possess the perfect terrain and weather for paragliding and aero-sports. Himachal and Uttarakhand have built thriving tourism economies around similar landscapes. Yet Jammu still awaits its first fully developed paragliding site, while Kashmir actively promotes heli-skiing, winter sports, and snow-based aero-adventures every year.

A major factor in Jammu's stagnation is the absence of an updated and officially notified tourism map. When the government does not declare new destinations, private investors stay away. Investors need policy certainty, defined zones, and long-term assurances before committing to hotels, eco-resorts, river cafés, trekking lodges, water-sports facilities, or adventure parks. Jammu has immense potential, but without official status, no major investor steps forward. Kashmir, on the other hand, benefits from well-supported tourism zones and consistent recognition of new locales.

If Jammu is to finally break free from this cycle of neglect, a strategic course correction is essential. The government must begin by officially identifying and notifying new tourism destinations in Basohli, Billawar, Reasi, Akhnour, the Katra-Bhairon Valley belt, the Sudh Mahadev-Mantalai circuit, the Chenab basin, Patnitop's hinterland, and the border tourism zone around Sulechgarh. Each destination should have a well-prepared master plan developed in consultation with experts and local communities. Once official recognition is granted, private investment can be drawn into hospitality, adventure infrastructure, cultural centres, and eco-friendly facilities. At the same time, Jammu must finally receive its fair share of national tourism campaigns, festivals, and inter-state collaborations.

The truth is straightforward: Jammu has all the ingredients needed to emerge as a major tourism powerhouse, but potential alone does not create progress. For decades, tourism policies and administrative priorities have tilted overwhelmingly toward the

Kashmir Valley, leaving Jammu under-recognised, underdeveloped, and unfairly sidelined. Pointing out this imbalance is not about discrimination; it is about fairness and the right to equal developmental opportunities. A region so rich in nature, culture, faith, art, and adventure deserves not indifference but vision, investment, and a rightful place in the tourism narrative of the Union Territory.

Affiliation of 4 schools suspended, 8 imposed fine

SRINAGAR: The Jammu and Kashmir Board of School Education (J&K BOSE) has put affiliation of 4 schools under suspension following confirmation of reports about adoption of non-J&K BOSE prescribed textbooks in their institutions.

These schools are being issued show-cause notices as to why their affiliation cannot be cancelled for open defiance of terms and conditions of affiliation and violation of J&K BOSE Act. In a press note issued here on Thursday, J&K BOSE while giving details revealed that affiliation of Radiant Public School, Anantnag, Solace International School, Pulwama, Holy Mission School, Narbal, Budgam and Pioneer Educational Institute, Hanjiwara, Pattan, Baramulla was put under suspension and their Board related facilities were withheld forthwith. The schools which were imposed fine include Candid Higher Secondary School, Nowgam, Fayaz Educational Institute, Chanapora, Nowgam, Al-Fajr Institute, Chanapora, Nowgam, Al-Huda Public School, Pattan, Baramulla, Shamas Memorial School, Khansahib, Budgam, Hanfia High School, Frisal, Kulgam, Future Vision School, Bhandipora and Linton Hall High School, Rajbagh, Srinagar. The institutions were directed to deposit the penalty amount within a week in default of which disaffiliation proceedings will be initiated. Meanwhile, the Board has issued stern instructions to private schools to ensure adoption of prescribed curriculum including textbooks, which it said are aligned with NEP-2020 involving age appropriate content of NCERT. The textbooks, BOSE said are affordable and cost effective with focus on competency-based learning in sync with physical and mental development of children. Adoption of these books ensures academic growth without bringing mental pressure to the children in their formative stages of development, it added.

Narco-terror module busted in Kupwara; father-son duo held

SRINAGAR: Security forces have busted a narco-terror module in Kupwara district by arresting a father-son duo, officials said on Thursday.

Acting on specific information regarding the presence of a commercial quantity of contraband and illegal arms and ammunition, a case was registered under various sections of the NDPS Act, UAP Act, and Arms Act, a senior police officer said.

Two "hybrid terrorists" - Abdul Lateef, 53, and his son, Shahnavaz Khan, 23, residents of Puthwari in Nowgam area of Handwara, were arrested during the joint operation by the Jammu and Kashmir Police and the Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF). The official said the duo was actively involved in running a narco-terror network in the area. Overies effected so far include a pistol with seven rounds, and heroin-like contraband weighing approximately 890 grams, the officer said.

Search operations launched along Indo-Pak border

JAMMU: Security forces conducted search operations along the Indo-Pak border and hinterland areas in Kathua, Samba and Jammu districts on Thursday as part of a security drill to enhance vigilance, officials said. The forces carried out search operations in Korepannu and Marheen villages in Kathua; between Sadoh and Arangal villages, particularly forested areas near Mawa village in Samba district, besides the Chowki Choura area of Jammu, they said.

According to officials, the joint search operations -- conducted by the Special Operations Group (SOG) of Jammu and Kashmir Police, border police and the Border Security Force (BSF) -- were aimed at strengthening security and enhancing vigilance in areas along the Indo-Pak border. To review the security apparatus along the International Border, Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP), Kathua, Mohita Sharma conducted a ground review of the anti-infiltration grid in lower Kathua, visiting remote villages and security camps in Hiranagar and Rajbagh areas. She inspected Malaman and Chingara outposts and interacted with personnel deployed there and was briefed on past infiltration routes, Village Defence Guards (VDGs) and key terrain features, officials said. Sharma directed the teams to keep a close watch on over-ground workers (OGWs), maintain records of migratory population movement and identify additional volunteers for induction into the VDG programme. She also visited infiltration-prone areas in Paeca Kota, Parangoli, Mangloor and Saida, where she interacted with SOG and CRPF (Central Reserve Police Force) teams conducting search operations.

She reviewed weapons and equipment and instructed personnel to continue long-range patrols to strengthen local outreach and improve terrain familiarity.

At Baba Sidh Goriya temple and the adjoining forest area, the SSP met locals and reviewed routes linked to infiltration through the Kamad forest.
