COVID: 706 new...

gone up to 340, officials said.
The Union Territory has recorded 221 Covid-related deaths -- 163 in Leh district and 58 in Kargil district -- since the outbreak of the pandemic last year; they said.
No death was reported in Ladakh on Sunday, the officials said.
Thirty patients have recovered from the disease, taking the number of those cured to 22,000, they said.
There are 349 actives cases in Ladakh -- 316 in Leh and 24 in Kargil.
Meanwhile, authorities on Monday sealed several coaching centres in Bandipora district for allegedly flouting COVID-19 norms, officials said.
A joint team of officers inspected several coaching centres in the town to review the implementation of Covid appropriate behaviour; an official spokesman said.
The team comprising officers of education and health departments sealed several coaching centres that were operating in violation of the government orders. The in-person teaching has been banned till further orders to safeguard the lives by preventing the further spread of COVID-19. Coaching Centres Association of Kashmir (CCAK) has expressed disappointment over the administration's decision to close the coaching centres in the wake of the increase in coronavirus cases. It said whenever there is even a slight increase in Covid cases, the education sector becomes the first casualty. Meanwhile, a famous restaurant namely Casino situated at Purani Mandi was also fined for not following COVID-19 SoPs.

MHA seeks more...

extension from the Committees on Subordinate Legislation, Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha.
Since, the home ministry could not frame rules within six months of the enactment of the CAA, it sought time for the committees -- first in June 2020 and then four more times.
The fifth extension came to an end on Monday.
"We have approached the parliamentary committees seeking more time. Hopefully, we will get the extension," a home ministry official told PTI.
The Central government has already made it clear that the Indian citizenship to the eligible beneficiaries of the CAA will be given only after rules under the legislation are notified.
The objective of the CAA is to grant Indian citizenship to persecuted minorities like Hindus, Sikhs, Jains, Buddhists, Parsis and Christians from Pakistan, Bangladesh and Afghanistan.
Those from these communities who had come to India till December 31, 2014, facing religious persecution there, will not be treated as illegal immigrants and given Indian citizenship.
After the CAA was passed by Parliament, widespread protests were witnessed in different parts of the country leading to deaths of nearly 100 people in police firing and related violence.

SC to set-up...

SSP by the central government's committee saying you are guilty...
Please hang me and my officers if we are guilty but please do not condemn us unheard, the state's law officer said, adding that an independent committee be set up as he apprehended that the state officials will not get fair hearing before the Centre's panel.
The committee's inquiries were put on hold, where have these show cause notices come from, Patwalia asked and this led the apex court to express its displeasure.
The bench referred to the state government officials being issued show cause notices despite the panels being asked to hold their hands till January 10, and asked what purpose would remain for the court to intervene.
"Your show cause notice is totally self-contradictory. By constituting a committee you seek to enquire if there was a breach and then you hold state Chief Secretary and the DGP guilty. Who held them guilty... The state and the petitioner want a fair hearing and you cannot be against a fair hearing. So why this administrative and fact-finding enquiry by you at all, the bench asked.
The show-cause notices were issued before the order of the court, the Solicitor General replied, adding that the central government's panel may be allowed to inquire into the lapses, and a report would be submitted to the bench.
Moreover, the show cause notices were based on admitted non-compliance of statutory schemes , Mehta said and referred to various provisions of the blue book' relating to the SPG, the Prime Minister's security and the role of the local police.
The bench then said that both the committees should be permitted to continue with the inquiries.
"Asking them to return within 24 hours, after our order...it is not expected of you," the bench said.
"To say it is not expected of you', is a bit harsh under the circumstances", Mehta said, adding that the Prime Minister's security is of paramount importance.
We are not undermining the importance of the security of the Prime Minister... We are taking up the matter with all seriousness. Please do not be under the impression that we are not giving the importance, the bench said.
There is a breach and the state too has admitted it, but the other issues are questions of facts and they have to be seen by independent persons, the bench said.

If you want to take disciplinary action against the state officers then what remains for this court to do, the bench asked.

If the court felt that the show-cause notices pre-empted the final outcome, then inquiry proceedings may be put on hold till the Central committee inquires and give the report to the bench, Mehta said.

He referred in detail to the provisions of the "Blue Book" for PM's security and said that several breaches of the scheme of the rules are established such as the PM's convoy had proceeded on the road after taking clearance from the DGP and moreover, the warning vehicle did not warn about the blockade.

There was a complete failure of intelligence and violation of protocols, he said, adding, It has to be continuously communicated that there is a clear road and if there's a blockade, stop them 4 km away. A police spokesperson said the slain two terrorists belonged to proscribed terror outfit Al-Badr and their bodies were retrieved from the site of the encounter: They have been identified as Inad Muzaffar Wani resident of Arigam Pulwama and Abdul Rashid Thoker resident of Hassanpora.
As per police records, both the killed terrorists were categorized terrorists. They were part of groups involved in several terror crime cases including attacks on security forces and civilian atrocities. Besides, terrorist Inad Wani was involved in attack on police personnel Mushtaq Ahmad Wagay of Pulwama on December 19, 2021 in which the he got seriously injured. While as, killed terrorist Abdul Rashid Thoker, before joining terrorist ranks was working as terrorist associate and was also involved in attack on a civilian at Chitragram in which said civilian got injured.
Incriminating materials, arms & ammunition were recovered from the site of encounter: All the recovered materials have been taken into case records for further investigation.
Regarding the incident, the spokesperson said that a case under relevant sections of law has been registered in PS Bijbehara, Anantnag and investigation has been initiated.

Notably, all the accounts classified as D3 and Loss Assets with an outstanding amount of more than Rs 15 lakhs and up to Rs 5 Crore as on September 30, 2021 shall be eligible. As per the terms and conditions of the scheme, other cases include the eligible ones pending before Courts / DRTs besides the cases wherein the Bank has issued notice under various sections of the Securitization and Reconstruction of Financial Assets and Enforcement of Security Interest Act (SARFAESI-2002).

Two gangs of vehicle-lifters busted; 2 arrested, 13 vehicles recovered

BARI BRAHMANA/UDHAMPUR: Police on Monday busted two gangs of vehicle lifters by arresting 2 accused and recovering 13 vehicles.

As per details, a team from Police Station Bari-Brahmana during investigation of a two-wheeler (scooty) theft case registered under FIR No. 245/2021 under section 379 of IPC at Police Station Bari Brahamana during 2021, detained a suspect namely Shiv

Dayal, son of R a j i n d e r Kumar, resident of Teli Basti, Bari Brahmana. On sustained interrogation, suspect confessed his involvement in theft. The stolen scooty without registration number was also recovered along with one more scooty Activa 5G stolen from some other place with Registration number PB08EH/2533. On further interrogation, the suspect revealed name of his associate who is involved with him in theft cases. Acting on information, police conducted raid at a house of one Shani Gujjar, resident of Kikri Morh, near Purmandal Morh and recovered 9 stolen motorcycles and an Alto car from his Kullah. However, accused Shani managed to escape before arrival of Police party. It is learnt that major focus of the talks will be on disengagement in the Hot Springs area. The Indian side is expected to press for disengagement as soon as possible in all the remaining friction points including resolution of issues in Dipsang Bulge and Demchok. The 13th round of talks had taken place on October 10, 2021 and they ended in a stale-mate.

Both sides failed to make any headway in the talks with the Indian Army saying after the dialogue that the "constructive suggestions" made by it were neither agreeable to the Chinese side nor it could provide any "forward-looking" proposals.

In their virtual diplomatic talks on November 18, India and China agreed to hold the 14th round of military talks at an early date to achieve the objective of complete disengagement in remaining friction points in eastern Ladakh.

The eastern Ladakh border standoff between the Indian and Chinese militaries erupted on May 5, 2020, following a violent clash in the Pangong lake areas.

Both sides gradually enhanced their deployment by rushing in tens of thousands of soldiers as well as heavy weaponry.

As a result of a series of military and diplomatic talks, the two sides completed the disengagement process last year in the north and south banks of the Pangong lake and in the Gogra area.

Each side currently has around 50,000 to 60,000 troops along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in the sensitive sector.

The resort recorded a low of minus 10 degrees Celsius for the second consecutive night, MET officials said. They said Pahalgam in south Kashmir Anantnag district, which serves as the base camp for the annual Amarnath yatra, recorded a low of minus 2.6 degrees Celsius.

Srinagar, the summer capital of Jammu and Kashmir, was the one of the two places to record minimum temperature above freezing point as the minimum settled at 0.2 degrees Celsius on Sunday night, the officials said

They said Qazigund, the gateway town to the valley, recorded a minimum of 0.6 degrees Celsius, while the nearby south Kashmir town of Kokernag recorded a low of minus 1.7 degrees Celsius.

The minimum temperature in Kupwara in north Kashmir settled at a low of minus 0.6 degrees Celsius.

Kashmir valley is currently under the grip of the 40-day harshest winter period known as 'Chilla-i-Kalan' which began on December 21.

'Chilla-i-Kalan' is a period when a cold wave grips the region and the temperature drops considerably leading to the freezing of water bodies including the famous Dal Lake here as well as the water supply lines in several parts of the valley.

The chances of snowfall are the most frequent and maximum during this period and most areas, especially in the higher reaches, receive heavy to very heavy snowfall.

The 'Chilla-i-Kalan' will end on January 31, but the cold wave continues even after that in Kashmir with a 20-day-long 'Chillai-Khurd' (small cold) and a 10-day-long 'Chillai-Bachha' (baby cold).

4 narco smugglers nabbed with heroin

KATHUA/REASI: Intensifying its action against drug dealings and to neutralise activities of drug peddlers within the district, Police on Monday nabbed 4 narco smugglers and recovered heroin from their possession .

As per details, a team led by Insp Rajesh Kumar Incharge Police Post Nagri under the supervision of DySP Headquarters Kathua Shammi Kumar during Naka checking duty near Goond, intercepted a Royal Enfield Motor Bike (PB02BC-6585) enroute from Punjab towards Nagri Parole. On checking of rider, identified as Kabir Kapoor alias Kabi, son of Mumish Kapoor, resident of Jagdamba Colony House No. 5, Gali-1, Majitha road Amritsar, approximately 42 gm Heroin (Chitta) like narcotics recovered while on thorough checking of one pillion-riders, identified as Liaqat Ali, son of Sharif Mohd, resident of Korepunnu Marheen Kathua and Navdeep Singh, son of Gurudev Singh, resident of Gopal Nagar Gali no.01 and House No. 87-A, Tehsil and district Amritsar, Punjab, approximate 32 gm Heroin (Chitta) like narcotic was recovered, thereby recovery of total 74 gm heroin (Chitta) like narcotics approximately. Magistrate Nagri and officials of Legal Metrology Department were also called and all recovered narcotics along with bike were seized while 3 drug peddlers were arrested. FIR No. 15/2022 under sections 8/21/22/29 of NDPS Act was registered against them at Police Station Kathua while further investigation is underway.

Meanwhile, Reasi Police arrested another drug peddler and recovered heroin from his possession. A team from Police Station Reasi during surprise checking and frisking at Baradari, after noticing some suspicious movement, chased and apprehended one notorious drug peddler Ganesh Kumar, son of Prabhu Dyal, resident of Bara Dari, Seela, Ward-4, Reasi and recovered 1.13 gm banned drug heroin from his possession. FIR No 02/2022 under sections 8, 21, 22 of NDPS Act was registered at Police Station Reasi. The accused was arrested and banned drug was seized for further investigation to unearth forward and backward linkages.



Three drug peddlers arrested
