India withdraws from Asian Under-22 Boxing championship amid COVID threat

NEW DELHI: The Boxing Federation of India has decided to pull out of the Asian Under-22 Championships for men and women in Tashkent, Uzbekistan due to the global surge in COVID-19 cases but is willing to participate if the tournament is rescheduled to a time when the pandemic subsides.

A reliable source in the federation has confirmed to PTI that a letter has been sent to the Asian Boxing Confederation as well as the tournament's organising committee confirming India's withdrawal.

The event was scheduled to be held from January 20 to 30. The Asian event was originally slated to be held from December 7 to 17 last year but was postponed because of the pandemic.

Indian boxing has been hit by a COVID crisis of its own. The men's senior national camp in Patiala has reported 26 cases, including 20 boxers.

Boxers born in 1999, 2000, 2001 and 2002 are eligible to compete in the event that is being held for the first time in the continent.

The competition was to be held in 12 women's and 13 men's weight categories.

The Indian men's squad featured the likes of Asian youth bronze-medallist Mohammed Etash Khan (63.5kg) and reigning national champion Rohit Mor (60kg) among others.

We will have short targets, key is to stay focussed during U19 World Cup Kanitkar

GEORGETOWN: Head coach Hrishikesh Kanitkar says his side would set short targets when it competes at the Under-19 World Cup, where the past Indian teams have created a rich legacy.

The under-19 World Cup begins in the West Indies on Friday and India begins its campaign with a match against South Africa on Saturday.

"There is a huge legacy since India has done so well in this tournament. It doesn't help that we have won four times. There is a new team, so you have to start afresh," Kanitkar said during an online media interaction ahead of the marquee event.

"We don't want to look too far ahead at things like the IPL auction and the Ranji Trophy. What we need to do is to just focus on what we can do in this tournament. We, as a coaching unit, keep them focussed on what they can do in the short term," he added.

Asked about playing under difficult circumstances as players are being forced to stay in bio-bubbles, the former India cricketer said it is better to get used to it than complain.

"Yes....it is a challenge. What we need to realise is that this is the norm now. It is better to get used to it. It is the reality now, staying in the bubble. The boys will be able to learn from this, after this World Cup also, when

they need to stay in bubbles, they will be up for it," he said.

The Indians head into the Under-19 World Cup with a victory in the under-19 Asia Cup and the head coach said it was of great help as the team got to play together.

"It is important because we had not played together as a team. For us, it was important in terms of team building and getting matches under our belt. It has been of great help," Kanitkar said of the win in the U-19 Asia Cup.

The coach emphasised that the team had good fast bowlers and all-rounders with Rajvardhan Hangarkar of Maharashtra developing well.

"It augurs well for the future. The talent is there...it is about grooming and handling them well. Rajvardhan is a really exciting prospect and bowls at a fair clip.

"He has a good yorker and a bouncer and he is not a bad batsman. You will find that out in the tournament. He is keen to do well for the team. These are good signs," he said.

Asked what went in favour of Yash Dhull that he got the captaincy, Kanitkar said he had the respect of the play-

ers which was important.

"The primary quality is to have respect from the players. I think that is what he has, the respect of the team. He is able to take tough calls.

"Every time, especially while fielding, he can't be told to do things, he needs to take his decisions. He is up to it. I think his instincts are tuned fine and think he can do justice to the job," Kanitkar added.

The Indian under-19 captain Dhull, who looks up to the Indian Test skipper Virat Kohli, felt it was important to take it game by game.

"The morale in the team was good. It is important to take it game by game and see how to improve game by game. We will keep our intent and take it as it comes," he said.

About the interactions the team had with the legendary VVS Laxman, who heads the NCA now and India's white ball skipper Rohit Sharma, Dhull said, "They told us about their experiences and that will surely help us in the tournament ahead."

The Indian under-19 skipper said the pitches in West Indies were on the slower side.

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CAPE TOWN: Rishabh Pant was fearless without being careless during a brilliant hundred in the most adverse circumstances but South Africa were on course for a memorable series win against India on a day when visiting skipper Virat Kohli was left fuming due to a contentious DRS decision in the third and final Test here.

Pant's (100 not out off 139 balls) fourth Test hundred constituted for more than 50 per cent of India's shoddy second innings total of 198 with Kohli's 29 off 143 balls being the second highest individual score.

With an easy target of 212 to chase, South Africa were 101 for 2 at stumps as their dogged skipper Dean Elgar (30) was finally out tickling down the leg side giving India some breathing space going into the fourth and probably the final day of the series.

With 111 runs left, the match is expected to end early on Friday either way but at this moment Proteas look way ahead.

With eight batters failing to reach even double figures, no amount of excuses would be enough for India when they analyse the below par show along with the new team management's decision to carry over-the-hill out of form seniors, which only compounded problems. It's up to the bowlers now.

This was the first Test match in 145-year-history

where all 20 batters of one

team were caught.

It was in the 21st over that R Ashwin flogged one that straightened enough after pitching as Elgar was beaten trying to play a forward defensive stroke. Straight

umpire Marais Erasmus gave it leg before but Elgar went for DRS, which surprisingly ruled that the ball would miss the leg stump.

It seemed a howler and more so a technical one rather than the Indian team very angry.

Funnily enough Elgar, after seeing that he was beaten, had started walking before he came back. An angry Kohli kicked the ground in
