India under leadership of Narendra Modi will showcase India's prosperity and culture at G20

The G-20 presidency means that India will lead for the next one year the G-20, that represents 80 percent of the world's GDP, a 75 percent of international trade and 60 percent of the world's population. This is huge honour for India.

On the one hand, under leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, India will get an opportunity to prove its potential on the international stage and on the other hand it will give us an opportunity to present its lofty heritage, rich culture and heritage in front of the world.

The upcoming G-20 meetings will be one of the top international events to be hosted by India. By the way, meetings related to G-20 have already started in India. Over 200 such meetings of 32 different sectors will be organized at different places across the country. The G-20 meeting is being held in the wider context of the 'geopolitical crisis, food and energy security and the pace of the Sustainable Development, Goals and the growing debt burden'.

India's endeavour is to build consensus within the G-20 and to shape the issues of the Global South in particular, as well as drive this agenda forward. There will be big events across the country before the proposed summit in October-November next year. G-20 meetings are to be held in major cities including Delhi, Chandigarh, Guwahati, Lucknow, Pune, Indore, Surat, Srinagar, and Amritsar.

Apart from 20 member countries, major global organizations like United Nations (UN), International Monetary Fund (IMF), and World Health Organization (WHO) will participate in these conclaves. Apart from this, permanent invitations are also sent to some other countries including Singapore, Spain, Bangladesh. Prime Minister Modi has kept the theme of India's G-20 chairmanship 'Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam' (The world is one home).

The next one year is very important for India. There is a chance to prove that India can lead in global affairs. All these

events will also be important in the emergence of India as a superpower. The President of Indonesia handed over its chairmanship to Prime Minister Narendra Modi at the G-20 Summit held in Bali. It includes 19 countries Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Republic of Korea, Mexico, Russia, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, Turkey, UK, US and European Union.

During the presidency of India, there are expected to be more than 200 meetings of G-20 countries in the coming one year. These meetings will be held in 50 cities of the country. In this way India will have a chance to present its diverse and rich culture and heritage to the world.

India's chairmanship of the G-20 has come at an opportune time, not just for India, but for the entire world as the climate crisis, COVID crisis, global supply chain crisis and debt crisis, geopolitical crisis and food and energy crises that have emerged in the recent past have thrown economies, especially developing economies, into turmoil.

The chairmanship of the G-20 does not confer any formal power, but being the host, the chairing country has its own influence. In such a situation, using its influence, India can give a meaningful direction to the G-20.

Thus under the leadership of Narendra Modi, India can give direction and vision to the world. Be it the problem of environmental change or food problem, health management or energy management, at this time the eyes of the whole world are on India. Dragon on its Toes

that China is ready to work with India through steady and sound growth of relations. The Chinese minister said this while addressing reporters on China's relations with India.Wang Yi stated," China and India have maintained communication through diplomatic and military to military channels and both countries are committed to upholding stability in the border areas. We stand ready to work with India in the direction towards steady and sound growth of China ,India relations." In fact this statement came in the backdrop of December 9 standoff between India-Chinese troops in Arunachal Pradesh's Twang sector. This statement of the Chinese foreign minister shows that there is a paradigm shift in the behavior and attitude of C Chinese leadership and it is a good augury fot the normalization of the relations between the two countries which are reeling in strained relations. This change in Chinese attitude towards India is perhaps the effect of the growing clout of India in the international sphere and this has resulted in the change in the behavior of China towards India after the December faceoff in Twang sector. Modi's diplomacy and his thrust towards the bilateral ties and his strong leadership has a favorable impact on China and its leaders are now talking of working with India for steady and stable India-China relations. The fact that India has taken the mantle of presidency of G20 and her assuming of the world leadership has forced China to change its attitude towards India and this is no insignificant development for normalization of China-India relations. There is some commonality in the culture of the two Asian neighbors and from ancient time there have been cordial relations between India and China but in the twenty century the relations between the two countries nosedived because the borders between these countries are not clearly marked and there are differing perceptions so for as the long border between the two countries is concerned.

The relations between the two countries had plummeted so low and were strained in 2020 June due to the worst clashes in Galwan valley of eastern Ladakh and it resulted on the human casualties between the two armies and the border tensions continued for two years despite of the military to military talks. Now the situation was not so tense but the CLA transgressed into our side in Twang sector of Arunachal Pradesh and it resulted into physical and ma to man to man clashes

between the two armies.

However Indian troops were successful in making the Chinese troops to retreat to their side of the Line of actual control. But after this border tension and face off between the two countries, Chinese leadership showed abrupt change in its behavior towards India and this encouraging change can be attributed to the growing stature of India because of the sound and strong diplomacy and the consistent foreign policy of India towards China. India wants bilateral relations with China and our foreign policy is directed towards it.

The tensions, conflicts and wars have no place in 21st century as this century is of cooperation and not division. Moreover world and China-India has common challenges and problems like terrorism, global warming and climate change as well as other common issues which can be fought in cooperation and therefore the two countries of China and India should sink differences and work closely to find solution of these problems and also need to reduce the border tensions for the good of the two nations. Thus there is need for the engagement between India and China not only at borders but at the level of the political leadership.

There is also a need to build normal political relations between the two countries after the December faceoff the two countries agreed to maintain the security and stability on the ground in western sector. The MEA statement said the two sides agreed to stay in close contact and maintain dialogue through military and diplomatic channels and work out a mutually acceptable resolution of the remaining issues at the earliest. There is a discernable shift in Chinese political leadership towards India but we should be vigilant and cautious as one does not know if the present change in attitude of China towards India is real or a trick of our clever neighbour. In the end we should also give a positive response to Chinese current attitudinal change towards India and try sincerely to build the cordial relations between the two nations while remaining cautious. In fact Dragon has come on toes so for its attitude towards India is concerned and it seems to be because of the strong diplomatic and international leadership of Modi as well as his strong foreign policy towards China.

J&K emerging as model of digital Govt across country

IT interventions, digital initiatives bringing transparency in governance, streamlining public service delivery

Jammu and Kashmir is emerging as a model of digital government across the country with focus on transparent and accountable governance system.

IT interventions and several digital initiatives are bringing transparency in the system and streamlining the public service delivery system for the welfare of common masses. J&K has achieved several milestones with solid technical architecture at the service of citizens with speedy development as the new identity of J&K.

The prime objective of government is line to online and instead of travelling to Government offices, people just need to use digital mode for availing different government services. The Government aims to establish a system which enables people to access high-quality services anywhere, anytime, on any device.

Continuing its march on the path of providing E-governance to its citizens, J&K has been successful in providing

nearly 444 services online including all the major services commonly availed by the people.

Government is working to usher the UT into an environment where its citizens would carry offices in their pockets and avail any services without having to physically visit any of the office.

Chief Secretary, Dr. Arun Kumar Mehta in a recently held meeting maintained that the contactless administration not only ensures transparency and accountability but swiftness also.

He observed that the technology happens to be panacea for all the evils and J&K envisages to utilize the IT/ITes for optimum empowerment of its population as per the vision of LG administration.

Notably, the number of online services provided by Planning Department shot to 411 in addition to 33 services integrated on Rapid Assessment System (RAS). Moreover 195 services had already been integrated with the feedback system out of these 411 online

services and some 103 more services are going to be made RAS complaint shortly.

Synchronization with auto-appeal for the services of few departments has generated encouraging results with 99% applications disposed within the stipulated time frame as per the Public Services Guarantee Act (PSGA) which not only ensures timely delivery pof services but penalizes those officers/officials found failing in doing so.

The UT administration is soon going to integrate all its online services with the auto-appeal so that all the services are provided to its citizens as per the timelines specified in PSGA for these services for the benefit of one and all.

Government has directed the stakeholders to formulate short-term goals of 3-6 months and long-term vision statements to transform core ICT infrastructure, governance and services for ease of living, accessibility, innovation to transform J&K into digitally empowered soci-

ety and knowledge economy.

It is worth to mention that Digi Dost' program launched by Govt is aimed at developing a strong network of digitally empowered young volunteers at District, Block and Panchayat level who can work as the brand ambassadors for Digital J&K and Digital India to achieve maximum mobilization and awareness on digital services.

'Digi Dost' volunteers assist in digital service delivery, data collection, training, spreading information regarding Digital India campaign and make the people aware about cyber hygiene and cybercrimes.

As per official data, J&K is number one in the ranking of UTs in e-governance. Host of initiatives like e-office, BEAMS, Awam ki Awaaz, MyGov, e-Unnat, Digilocker, Aapki Zameen Aapki Nigrani have brought transparency and accountability in governance across J&K mad brought transformational changes in the lives of people.
