## Shiv Sena Hindustan protests acute water shortage in Purkhu Camp, burns PHE effigy

JAMMU: Members of Shiv Sena Hindustan, led by Jammu & Kashmir President Pandit Rajesh Kesri, staged a protest in Purkhu Camp, burning an effigy of the Public Health Engineering (PHE) Department to express their strong displeasure over the persistent water shortage in the area. The protest comes after residents of Purkhu Camp have been grappling with severe water scarcity for over a year, struggling to access clean water even during harsh winter months. Despite repeated appeals to the PHE Department and

assurances of laying new pipelines, no tangible action has been taken, leaving families, particularly the poor, in distress. Addressing the protest, Pandit Rajesh Kesri strongly condemned the department's apathy and inaction, warning that if the issue is not resolved promptly, Shiv Sena Hindustan will escalate the agitation with a protest outside the Chief Engineer's office. He urged the authorities to intervene immediately and ensure a regular and adequate water supply for the affected residents.

The protesters highlighted that the lack of water is

severely impacting daily life, from household needs to hygiene, and demanded urgent relief measures. The protest was attended by senior party members including Raj Kumar, Sanjeev Kumar Sharma, Rajesh Sharma, Sanjeev Kumar, Vinod Kumar, Anu Devi, Mani Devi, Darshan Devi, and dozens of other supporters. His change is appreciated, and he pledges never to litter again while encouraging others to do the same. The characters collectively vow to keep their surroundings clean for a better India.

The play then shifts to another locality plagued by plastic waste. Mohan throws a plastic bottle on the road, leading to the dramatic entry of Mother Earth, distressed by human actions. The Plastic Monster appears, boasting that humans create him and then suffer because plastic does not decompose. Suman enters with a cloth bag and reusable bottle, explaining the importance of

## 460th free Artificial Limbs Camp organised by Shri Atam Vallabh Jain Clinic

As part of the camp, 26 AFO & KFO (Ankle Foot Orthosis and Knee Foot Orthosis) were provided. In addition, two wheelchairs and eight hearing aids were also distributed free of cost.

Chairman of the clinic, Pradeep Jain, explained in detail the procedure for providing hearing aids and highlighted the services being rendered by Shri Atam Vallabh Jain Clinic. He appealed to the general public to inform and motivate specially abled persons to avail themselves of the free facilities available at the clinic for their rehabilitation and mobility support.
