

LBA takes out peaceful rally against alleged forceful conversion in Ladakh

LEH: Ladakh Buddhist Association (LBA) took out a peaceful rally in Leh on Wednesday against the recent alleged conversion case in Zanskar and accused the district administration of Kargil and the administration of the Union Territory of Ladakh for failing to restore the girl to her community and parents.

The rally that took out from Chowkhang Vihara culminated on historic Pologround where LBA leaders addressed a mammoth gathering.

People from villages from Alchi to Shara participated in large numbers.

At the end of the rally, the LBA submitted a memorandum to Home Minister Amit Shah through Advisor to the Lt Governor of the Union Territory of Ladakh requesting for ending alleged discriminatory attitude towards the Buddhist Community in Ladakh.

The LBA also raised the

Central Institute of Buddhists Studies issue and the refurbishment of historic Chowkhang Vihara along with many issues concerning language, culture and heritage.

The memorandum reads, "The Buddhists always demanded separation from Kashmir for the safeguard of our faith, language, culture and our way of life. We did all these because of our trust and faith in the Indian democracy and the hope that the constitution of the land will protect the interests of the minuscule minorities like ours. The Parliament of

India amended the article 370 and abrogated 35-A to confer UT status to Ladakh liberating from years of slavery, discrimination, misrule, victimization and mental agony. We madly celebrated the conferment of UT status as our joy knew no bounds. But, alas! Our happiness proved to be short lived and a mirage. We were very soon made to realize that we had in fact lost what we had under the most ruthless and cruel regimes of the Abdullas and the Muttis. We, then, could play the minority card to extract some concessions and considerations from the

eruptions that, sometimes, yielded to our demands thinking that we were being taken care of by the central government."

It also noted that the LAHDC Act 1995 had empowered Ladakhis in respect of protection of land, job, culture and economic development to some extent. "Ladakh, especially Leh District, has been made to suffer from neglect and administrative apathy ever since it was carved out into a Union Territory. It is difficult to understand the reasons but it is obvious that the apathy is deliberate and the ill treatment is calculated. The UT administration has even curtailed the authority of the Ladakh Autonomous Hill Development Council and has disempowered it significantly. It exists in name now with wings clipped. Ladakh has no popular system of governance and the insensitive bureaucrats have made our lives miserable through

arrogance and irresponsibility," it added. LBA further alleged in its memorandum that the incident of conversion in Zanskar could have been handled sensibly after the girl was recovered but the UT government allowed things to take an ugly turn by its biased attitude and gross mishandling of the case at the possible cost of vitiating the tranquil atmosphere of Ladakh.

LBA, therefore, requested the Government of India to enact a proper anti-conversion law for Ladakh for protection of the minuscule Buddhist Community. "Needless to mention, we, the Buddhists of Ladakh, had clearly expressed our desire to remain a part of India even before the accession treaty was signed by the Maharaja of J&K in 1947," the memorandum reminded.

Similar peaceful rallies were also reportedly held at Nyoma, Tangtse, Khalsi, Padum Zanskar and Mulbeg Kargil.

DB disposes of PIL seeking safe, clean drinking water to people

JAMMU: In a Public Interest Litigation (PIL) filed by two practicing advocates Adv. Aditya Sharma and Adv. Rameshwar Padha to Government to provide clean and safe drinking tap water to people, a Division Bench of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh High Court comprising Chief Justice Pankaj Mithal and Justice Javed Iqbal Wani disposed of Public Interest Litigation as Advocate General informed that a comprehensive project for providing clean drinking water is under consideration and will soon be implemented in a phased manner.

Meanwhile during the meeting, Kavinder also paid rich tributes to Sardar Patel throwing light on his life history including freedom struggle and integrating Indian states.

He also mourned the demise of LAF Group Capt. Varun Singh who succumbed to injuries at the hospital today. It is pertinent to mention here that Group Captain Varun Singh was the lone survivor of Coonoor helicopter crash.

In the PIL, it has been submitted that Government is duty bound to provide clean and safe tap water but it had miserably failed to do so which is a violation of the right to live life with dignity of people of Jammu and further submitted that a survey was conducted by BIS

(Bureau of Indian Standards) whereby samples were collected from across Jammu city and as per the reports, tap water of Jammu city came out to be of worst level and stood at rank two among worst quality tap waters as samples failed against parameters laid down by BIS.

In PIL, it has been further submitted that there are various findings by Supreme Court whereby time and again specific directions have been issued to the authorities to ensure provision of clean water and further held that it is duty of authorities to protect water sources from pollution and encroachment.

Court was also apprised of the fact that after Delhi, Jammu is the second worst city in providing safe drinking tap water and is an alarming situation as is the main reason for causing diseases like cancer, heart attacks that too in younger generation.

Working Committee and President JUNTEA


