AJKPC opposes preponement of Panchayat polls, seeks 2-year extension

JAMMU: An organisation representing panches and sarpanches in Jammu and Kashmir on Friday opposed any move to prepone the panchayat elections and sought two-year extension for existing panchayats in the Union Territory.

The Jammu and Kashmir State Election Commission (SEC) had on Monday issued its schedule for revision of the panchayat electoral rolls in the UT. All Jammu and Kashmir Panchayat Conference (AJKPC) president Anil Sharma said the term of existing panchayats will be ending in November-December 2023 and there are rumors that the government may dissolve the existing panchayats and prepone the elections to the grassroots level bodies.

"This (preponing of panchayat elections) is not

acceptable to us and we will oppose it," Sharma told reporters here.

The SEC released the schedule for revision of panchayat electoral rolls on December 12, leading to speculations that the government is planning to prepone the panchayat elections. As per the schedule, January 1, 2023 has been fixed as qualifying date for the electoral rolls and the final panchayat electoral rolls will be published on February 10.

"Lt Governor Manoj Sinha and the Union government should extend the term of the existing Panchayats for at least two years and hold the elections in January 2026," Sharma said.

Justifying the demand for the two-year extension in terms of panchayats, he said the Union Territory remained disturbed for a long period following August

2019 developments when the central abrogated Article 370 and later by the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"The panchayat members could not concentrate on development work due to the disturbance and it is justified that the term of existing panchayats be extended for at least two years," he added.

The AJKPC leader said under the 73rd Amendment of the Constitution of India, all three tiers of the panchayats should have co-terminus and as the term of the district development councils shall end in 2025, therefore, there is no logic to end the term of the panchayats prior to that.

"The elections for all the three tiers of the panchayats should be conducted simultaneously and all the PRI members are unanimous in this regard," Sharma said.

BJP Govt failed to contain terrorism in J&K: Sawhney

JAMMU: Condemning killing of two civilians by terrorists outside an Army camp in Rajouri, former Minister and Senior Congress leader Yogesh Sawhney, in a statement issued on Friday, accused BJP Government of failing to control terrorism. Sawhney demanded that the Home Minister must resign for his failure to protect innocent civilians in the region. The terrorist activity and civilian



killings are on the rise, and BJP has completely failed in handling the law and order in the UT. There is a surge cross-border infiltration attempts by armed

terrorists across and the incompetency of the BJP to bring the situation under control is leading to killings of several innocents, he stated. "Terrorism in Jammu and Kashmir has created tension among locals concerning their security and safety, and it is the total failure of the Home Minister and BJP Government. BJP is completely incompetent in handling Jammu Kashmir. The entire nation is rattled by this violence and terror,"

HC dismisses petition of Royal Singh challenging his PSA

JAMMU: Justice Wasim Sadiq Nargal of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh High Court dismissed the petition filed by one Royal Singh a notorious criminal challenging his detention under PSA. Justice Wasim Sadiq Nargal while dismissing the petition, observed that petitioner-detentue instead of mending his ways, has continuously been indulging in criminal activities and has not shown any respect for law of the land.

As such the petitioner-detentue has created a feeling of fear and insecurity in the minds of the public of area. It is the most valuable and cherished right recognized by the Constitution. However, the inherent need to curtail the right to freedom in certain circumstances has been recognized as emerging from the Constitutional scheme itself. The right of society as a whole is, from its very nature, of much greater importance than that of an individual. "In case

of conflict between two rights, the individual's right is subjected by our Constitution to reasonable restrictions in the larger interest of the society. By providing for preventive detention the framers of the Constitution have recognized certain restraints on the right to individual liberty and in certain cases the individual liberty is required to be subordinated to the larger social interest. The main object of the preventive detention is the security of a State, maintenance of public order and of supplies and services essential to the community demand, effective safeguards in the larger interest of sustenance of peaceful democratic way of life. Thus, for achieving a bigger cause, the preventive detention laws provide a mode of depriving an individual of his personal liberty. For all what has been said hereinbefore and having regard to the law laid down and noted hereinabove, the petition fails and is dismissed as such," the Court directed.

JKPEECC vows to struggle for redressal of issues

JAMMU: A number of Power Employees and Engineers under the banner of JKPEECC-an amalgam comprising of various Unions of PDD led by Sachin Tickoo, President JKEEGA and Convenor PEECC, Jaipal Sharma, Chairman JKPEECC & President DEA, Shakti Gupta Chairman PPEU, Koushal Sharma PPEU, Tarun Gupta President Youth Wing, Ashiq Hussain President, Lineman & Workers Union, H D Singh President TEF, Gurmeet Singh CNGEU, Akhil Kumar President PDL/TDL Workers Union held a meeting here in Jammu and discussed status of the issues that were committed to be resolved by Government as per agreement signed between JKPEECC and administration.

While welcoming move of Chief Engineer JPDCL to issue combined seniority of the PDL/TDL and other workers on basis of their dates of engagement as per the rules and vogue, the participants sought that maximum vacancies should be filled through DPC at an earliest so that no further delay is done. The

members also welcomed framing of seniority of Tech-III by Chief Engineer, JPDCL and sought completion of the same. Further JKPEECC appealed to the Principal Secretary PDD that a number of vacant positions of ministerial and executive cadre are vacant. Due to non-availability of Managing Director JKPT-CL, from last 3 months, DPC of the UT level cadres has not been done and people are on verge of retirement despite vacancies. Despite creation of posts of the CPAO/AOs, none of them have been deputed to the Corporations overburdening existing CPAOs and affecting Finance related matters. Re-Constitution of PDD Employees Welfare fund disbursement committee has not been done till date, despite fact that the employees own salary contribution of over 5 crore is lying with the department and next to kin of deceased are still suffering. The participants further said that 20,000 employees of Power Development Department on deputation to these various carved-out corporations and further requested for resolving all genuine issues on priority.

Court can't reject application for production warrant on grounds that no case is pending before it: DB

JAMMU: A Division Bench of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh High Court Comprising Justice Sanjeev Kumar and Justice Mohan Lal in a significant judgment held that Criminal Court, within whose jurisdiction the crime is committed and in respect whereof a production warrant is sought, cannot reject the application for production warrant simply on the ground that no case is pending before it. This order has been passed in an appeal filed by National Investigation Agency against the order of NIA Court whereby Chief Investigating Officer of National Investigating Agency (NIA) Sanjay Nagpal along-with public prosecutor filed an application under Section 267 of CrPC before the Court of Special Judge under section 11 of NIA Act (3rd Additional Sessions Judge) seeking production warrant against one Abdul Jabbar [Jabbar, son of Abdul Habib, resident of House No 3919, Urdu Bazar near Jagat Cinema, Chandni Chowk lodged in judicial custody in District Jail Bilaspur in FIR 288/2017.

The case relates to large scale transfer of funds from Pakistan to India through the import of California almonds and

other items via cross LoC trade facilitation centres located at Salamat, Uri, and Chakkan-da-Bagh, Poonch, for their purported use for fomenting terrorism in J&K.

It was claimed by the appellant herein in his application that during investigation, Abdul Jabbar has been found to be involved in the said LoC trade and is aware of several incriminating facts relating to the mechanism adopted by the accused to facilitate transfer of funds illegitimately for fomenting terrorism in the Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir. It was also averred in the application that during his examination in the jail, Abdul Jabbar had expressed his willingness to make his statement under Section 164 CrPC with regard to his acquaintance with the facts and circumstances of the case under investigation. It was thus pleaded that the statement of Abdul Jabbar was required to be recorded under Section 164 CrPC for taking the investigation further. The application was considered by the trial court and the same was rejected solely on the ground that the Court was not competent to issue production warrant under Section 267 CrPC during investigation and when no

case is pending adjudication before the Court against the person against whom warrants have been sought to be issued. The trial court vide its order dated 6th May 2022 passed on the application of the appellant herein rejected the prayer of the appellant for issuing production warrants against Abdul Jabbar for recording his statement under Section 164 CrPC before the competent Magistrate in connection with case RC-17/2016/NIA/DLI. It is this order of the trial court which is appealed against before us under Section 21 of the National Investigation Agency Act, 2008 [NIA Act]. The appellant also prays, in the alternative, to invoke the inherent jurisdiction of the court vested by Section 482 of the CrPC 1973 for setting aside and quashing the order dated 6th May 2022 passed by the trial court.

DB after hearing Deputy Solicitor General of India Vishal Sharma for the NIA, observed that Section 267(1), it clearly transpires that a Criminal Court, in the course of an enquiry, trial or other proceedings under the Code of Criminal Procedure, can direct a person confined or detained in a prison to be produced before the Court for answer-

ing to a charge of an offence or for the purpose of any proceedings against him. The criminal Court is further empowered to direct the officer in-charge of the prison to produce any person who is required to be examined as a witness for the purpose of giving evidence. DB further observed that "other proceedings" which occurs in Section 267 CrPC includes investigation and, therefore, a Criminal Court within whose jurisdiction the crime is committed and in respect whereof a production warrant is sought, cannot reject the application for production warrant simply on the ground that no case is pending before it. The order of the trial Court, therefore, is not sustainable in law. The order impugned passed by the trial Court, as held above, cannot be termed as mere interlocutory and, therefore, we hold the appeal under Section 21 of the NIA Act maintainable against the impugned order.

With these observations, the Division Bench allowed the appeal and quashed the order passed by the Trial Court and directed trial Court shall consider the application of the appellant afresh and pass appropriate orders that may be warranted in law.
