

## NMOPS J&K holds protest, demands old pension scheme

JAMMU: National Movement for Old Pension Scheme Jammu and Kashmir (NMOPS-J&K), an amalgam of workers associations held protest at Press Club Jammu under the chairmanship of UT President Mohd Ashraf Sheikh in which appeal was made to the UT Govt for restoration of Old Pension Scheme.

The New Pension Scheme does not provide the guarantee of minimum pension and is not in the welfare of employees and their family members, Sheikh said adding that the employees recruited on or after January 1-2010 are not eligible for old pension scheme and are forced to opt the new scheme which is unjust & uncalled in totality.

While addressing the gathering UT senior vice president and chairman JKATA Vishal Manhas appealed to the Govt to scrap the New Pension Scheme (NPS) and restore the old pension scheme so that a sense of belongingness could prevail among all Govt employ-

ees appointed after 01.01.2010. Pertinent to mention that New Pension Scheme was introduced in India in January 2004 and was implemented in Jammu and Kashmir in January 2010 since the NPS is a privatised pension scheme, with no assurance of a secured post retirement life of retirees and their families. Most of the retired government employees who have worked under NPS are very much dissatisfied with this scheme and are facing hardships to sustain their post

retirement life. Keeping the flaws and drawbacks of NPS in mind the government employees throughout the country are demanding restoration of the Old Pension Scheme (OPS) with an aim to secure their post retirement life. Sheikh requested the LG administration to consider their demand on priority basis as this NPS scheme is totally against the employees and a grave injustice and threat for their future. The leaders of all different Employees Association/forums assured the masses that we

had full faith in our govt and we expect like other states very soon our Govt too will consider our demand of scrapping NPS.

## Dr Jitendra visits premier Kolkata institute, calls for preventive healthcare research

KOLKATA: Union Minister, Dr Jitendra Singh on Friday visited the premier Kolkata institute founded in 1935, the Indian Institute of Chemical Biology (IICB) and called on the medico scholars, senior scientists and students to carry out preventive healthcare research, with special focus on prevention of Metabolic Disorders like Type 2 Diabetes Mellitus in the young so that India's youth energy could be optimally channelled for nation building instead of letting go under-utilised on account of health issues.

Dr Jitendra said that Healthcare has been one of the key focus areas of the Modi government since 2014, and he has taken several measures in the last 8 and half years to make Indian Healthcare future-ready.

Dr Jitendra was happy to note that the Indian

Dr Jitendra underlined that there is a Paradigm Shift in approach as far Healthcare is concerned as the government is focusing on health as well as wellness, by eliminating the factors responsible for illness and making treatment of diseases inclusive.

Dr Jitendra was happy to note that the Indian

Institute of Chemical Biology (IICB) was established in 1935 as the first non-official centre in India for biomedical research and was included within the aegis of CSIR in 1956. He said, the institute continues to exploit its unique strength in Chemical biology for understanding various diseases to find out therapeutic

solutions and the Process

chemistry for generics is one of the priority areas in addition to novel drug development of various diseases.

Dr Jitendra Singh also informed that although the CSIR-IICB was established to carry out research in infectious diseases like kala azar, cholera, malaria etc, but it has gradually transformed into a cutting age research institute in biomedical research with emphasis on basic understanding of the infectious diseases, immune system, cancer, metabolic diseases including cardiovascular diabetes and liver diseases.

Dr Jitendra said, works done in the institute to fight Type 2 diabetes, which was more common in older adults has started affecting huge number of younger people is phenomenal. The Minister said, it will go a long way for the health and

well-being of younger people engaged in making of Modi's New India.

Dr Jitendra Singh said, CSIR-IICB today is engaged in research on diseases of national importance and biological problems of global interest, employing sophisticated state-of-the-art technology in keeping with the rapid and unprecedented momentum that life science research has gained globally over the last 50 years. The scientific staff has expertise in a variety of areas including chemistry, biochemistry, cell biology, molecular biology, neurobiology and immunology which promotes productive interdisciplinary interaction.

Presently, CSIR-IICB has 2 campuses. The main campus is at Jadavpur and the second campus is situated at Salt Lake. The Salt Lake Campus was in February 2016.

## Leakage of water pipes: Lesser quantity of water is supplied, more is wasted

JAMMU: Live and Let Live Society of India (LLLSD) under its President Santokh Singh Komal, during its visit to Nowabad and surrounding colonies on either sides of the Sunjwan road and interaction with the consumers found that there is heavy leakage of drinking water pipes in the area of PHE Sub Division Narwal, Jammu.

This huge leakage of water not only causes wastage of precious water but a great damage to the main Sunjwan road as also the interior roads and creates water contamination, besides providing insufficient supply of water to the consumers.

Komal pointed out that while government is spending huge amount to aware the people to save water, the Jal Shakti is ignoring the water contamination and its heavy wastage due to which the exchequer is put to manifold loss and multiple problems to the consumers and commuters on road. The consumers in large number lodge complaints and demand water tankers which indeed are given but not to all. The leakage of drinking water was also pointed out by Public Health and Sanitary Committee (PHSC) two months back directing the Jal Shakti to plug all leakages immediately but in spite of all this the leaked water continues to flow on roads. People have requested that responsible officers should personally inspect the leakage and issue suitable directions to the concerned staff. According to Komal the consumers also complain that the drinking water is not supplied on daily basis but after 2 or 3 days and that too for 30 to 40 minutes with low pressure due to which the consumers have to purchase water from private tankers for Rs 800 to 1,000 though in some cases the Jal Shakti also deputes the tankers but not to all.
