The IGP said an operation was launched on specific information in Soan village on Monday evening.

"The information turned out to be true and an encounter took place. We had a small Special Operations Group party. During the firefight, Amjad Ali Khan, our policeman, suffered injuries. We tried to evacuate him, but due to excessive blood loss, we lost him," he said. A wreath-laying ceremony was held in Udhampur to pay tributes to slain constable Amjad Ali Khan of the 22nd Battalion of the Indian Reserve Police.

Director General of Police Nalin Prabhat led the solemn ceremony, held at the District Police Lines in Udhampur, to honour the constable.

Earlier, a police officer told PTI that the operation has been resumed in the area to track down the holed-up terrorists. "The cordon has been further strengthened."

A joint team of the Special Operations Group (SOG) of police, along with the Army and the CRPF, is on the job with sniffer dogs, the officer added.

On Monday, forces got locked in a gunfight with terrorists in Soan village.

The village was raided by the police on a tip-off about the presence of three terrorists, believed to be affiliated with the Pakistan-based Jaish-e-Mohammad (JeM) outfit.

They said the searches were carried out in connection with a 2023 case registered at CIK Srinagar police station under various sections of IPC and the Unlawful Activities

The action was undertaken after obtaining due authorization through search warrants ssued by a special court in Srinagar, designated under the NIA Act, the officials added.

The case stems from credible intelligence inputs indicating that certain individuals in Jammu and Kashmir were "exploiting" platforms linked to mass media, social media, human rights advocacy, environmental causes and women empowerment as a "cover to carry out activities gravely prejudicial to the sovereignty, integrity and security of India", they said. "Discreet verification further revealed their suspected links with secessionist groups and

proscribed terrorist organisations," an official said. Investigations also brought to light that some of these individuals were allegedly in con

tact with Pakistan-based terror handlers using encrypted communication applications.

"They are suspected to have been actively involved in peddling false narratives, glorifying terrorists and terrorism, radicalising impressionable youth, and systematically attempting to disrupt public order and peace in Jammu & Kashmir," the official said.

Acting on these inputs, 12 locations in Srinagar, Baramulla, Anantnag, Pulwama Kupwara, Budgam and Shopian were identified and searched.

During the operation, 12 suspects were detained for questioning. A substantial cache of ncriminating digital material was seized, including 10 mobile phones, a laptop and 14 SIM eards, all of which are now under detailed forensic examination, the officials said.

"The operation has successfully dismantled a dangerous covert network that sought to exploit the credibility of social causes to advance terror agendas. The seized digital evidence is expected to unravel deeper layers of the conspiracy, and further arrests cannot be ruled out as the investigation progresses," the official said.

The investigation is on to unearth the full scale of the conspiracy, identify other conspirators and associates and expose their chain of communication with terrorist-secessionist handlers sitting across the border, the officials said.

Mandatory GPS, RFID and e-challaning for mineral transportation by Jan 26, 2026

JAMMU: Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo, on Tuesday chaired a review meeting of the Mining Department to assess the progress of mining sector reforms, revenue realisation measures, technological interventions and enforcement mechanisms aimed at curbing illegal mining across J&K.

During the meeting, the Chief Secretary reviewed the department's performance in implementing policy reforms, auctioning of mineral blocks and strengthening monitoring systems, while underscoring the need for transparency, sustainability and maximisation of revenue from miner-

The Chief Secretary, on the occasion, commended the role of BISAG-N in creating a robust and efficient mining surveillance system equipped with modern technological features.

He took a live demonstration of the vehicle tracking system, public grievance redressal platform and ATMC cameras installed at key exit points, and expressed satisfaction over the system's potential to significantly deter illegal mining and unauthorised transportation of minerals.

Emphasising the importance of scientific assessment of mineral resources, the Chief Secretary direct-

ed the department to undertake G3stage geological studies of major mineral blocks such as lignite, marble, graphite and granite through MECL, so as to establish clear estimates of mineral reserves and attract better investor response during future auc-

The Chief Secretary impressed upon the department to expedite the operationalisation of 110 non-operational minor mineral blocks across various districts to unlock their revenue potential and ensure availability of construction material for developmental works. He also directed the department to remain uncompromising in dealing with illegal mining and to create sufficient deterrence through strict enforcement and penal

About the mining reforms and major achievements made by the Department, the ACS Mining, Anil Kumar Singh informed that the eauction of seven limestone blocks was formally launched by the Union Minister of Coal and Mines on November 24, 2025, marking a major step towards scientific and transparent exploitation of major minerals.

Under the Scheme for Special Assistance to States for Capital Investment (SASCI) 2025-26, he added that the Department had secured a grant of ?100 Cr after implementing key mining reforms, including adoption of a Minor Mineral Policy, allocation of all minor mineral blocks through auction mode, introduction of mine closure nisms, and initiation of survey, mapping and exploration of identified

minor mineral blocks. In addition, the department has operationalised a star rating system for minor mineral mines, established the State Mineral Exploration Trust. and notified District Mineral Foundation Trust (DMFT) Rules in accordance with revised PMKKKY

guidelines, thereby strengthening

institutional frameworks for sustain-

A major focus of the review was the Integrated Mining Surveillance System (IMSS), developed for the first time by the department in collaboration with BISAG-N (Bhaskaracharya Institute for Space Applications and Geoinformatics). The system integrates GPS tracking, RFID, e-challan, weighbridge data and public grievance redressal mechanisms on a real-time digital dashboard to enhance transparency, accountability and compliance in mining operations.

The department reported that 114 system-generated triggers were verified on the ground, resulting in confirmation of 14 cases of illegal mining and imposition of penalties amounting to ?90 lakhs.

SRINAGAR: After a brief respite, Kashmir witnessed a sharp drop in night temperatures, with minimum readings settling below the freezing point across most parts of the valley, officials said on Tuesday.

Srinagar, the capital of Jammu and Kashmir, recorded a low of minus 1.8 degrees Celsius, nearly four degrees down from the Monday night's 1.9 degrees Celsius, they said.

A thick layer of fog engulfed the city and most other parts of the valley, particularly areas around water bodies, during the hours, Meteorological Department while Kupwara in north Kashmir's settled at minus degrees Celsius. Kokernag in south Kashmir registered a minimum of minus 0.6 degrees Celsius. In Gulmarg, the minimum

minus 2.2 degrees Celsius,

temperature settled above the freezing point at 0.5 degrees Celsius, the weather office said. The famous ski resort was the only place in the Kashmir valley where temperatures night remained above freezing.

Pahalgam, one of the base camps for the Amarnath Yatra in south Kashmir, logged a low of minus 2.6 degrees Celsius. Konibal and Pulwama

towns in south Kashmir were the coldest recorded places in Jammu and Kashmir, registering minimum temperatures of minus 4.0 degrees Celsius. Kashmir is inching

towards 'Chillai Kalan' the 40-day harshest winter period beginning on December 21 -- when the chances of snowfall are highest and temperatures drop sharply.

So far this winter, the valley has not witnessed any major wet spell. The prevailing dry weather has led to a rise in ailments such as cough and common cold.
