A major highlight of the inaugural session was the release of the book A Pictorial Guide to the Alpine Flora of Madhmaheshwar

Valley, Uttarakhand by Dr Kanad Dass, Prof Umesh Rai, Prof Susheel Verma, and Dr Sikander Pal.

Authored by Dr Sunit Singh along with co-authors. the book presents comprehensive and updated information on the rich alpine plant diversity of the Madhmaheshwar Valley.

It documents 317 plant species belonging to 59 families of Gymnosperms and Angiosperms collected from elevations ranging between 3000 and 5100 meters. Notably, 22 vascular plant species recorded in the study area fall under various threat categories of the IUCN Red List.

The book also provides an introduction to the Madhmaheshwar temple, highlighting the cultural and ecological significance of the region, and suggests strategies for conservation and sustainable management of alpine flora. Enriched with detailed descriptions, phenology, and vibrant colour photographs, it serves as a valuable resource researchers, forestry professionals, nature lovers, and

Kashmiri students, not protecting them: BJP **STATE TIMES NEWS**

JAMMU: BJP spokesperson and former MLC Girdhari Lal Raina has alleged that the issue of alleged harassment of Kashmiri students and workers outside Jammu and Kashmir is being deliberately weaponised for political gain. He stated that instead of acting responsibly, certain political parties, leaders, and affiliated student bodies are inflaming tensions through provocative and misleading statements, exaggerating minor and routine incidents into claims of persecution, while simultaneously defending or justifying involvement in serious crimes such as terrorism.

Raina described this approach as reckless and counterproductive, asserting that it does more harm than good.

He stressed that by constantly promoting a narrative of victimhood, such leaders discourage Kashmiri students and workers from behaving as responsible citizens and make their adjustment in other states more difficult. Highlighting what he termed as double standards, Raina said that while respect for "local sentiments" is demanded from people coming to Kashmir, the same respect is often ignored when Kashmiris reside elsewhere in the country.

Weaponising victimhood politics is endangering

The BJP spokesperson alleged that incidents involving intimidation, physical altercations, faculty bias, and lack of institutional support faced by students from other states studying in Kashmir are frequently suppressed. According to him. many such students are forced to leave campuses due to insecurity, yet these incidents rarely attract outrage from the same political voices, exposing selective concern.

Raina acknowledged that verified incidents of harassment do occur, both within and outside Kashmir, especially during periods of heightened tension. However, he cautioned that blanket accusations and manufactured hysteria weaken genuine cases and create unnecessary fear. He also raised questions about the credibility and political motives of certain organisations. including the Jammu and Kashmir Students Association (JKSA), which claim to receive frequent distress calls.

He further pointed out that police authorities in several states have clarified that measures such as tenant verification or questioning are routine security practices based on specific inputs and not acts of targeting. Raina noted that state governments and political leaders across party lines have consistently appealed for calm

and assured the safety of students. Emphasising that rights come with responsibilities, Raina said students and workers must respect local laws, customs, and national sentiment. He asserted that expectations of special treatment are unreasonable and urged leaders to promote responsible discourse, national unity, and restraint instead of fear-mongering and political exploitation.
