The president said the government has started a new central sector scheme for the industrial development of Jammu and Kashmir at a cost of about Rs 28,000 crore.

Last year, the Qazigund-Banihal tun-

nel was opened to traffic and international flights between Srinagar and Sharjah have also started, he pointed

### Kashmir gets some respite from severe cold conditions

SRINAGAR: The minimum temperature across Kashmir improved as 'Chilla-i-Kalan' -- the harshest winter period when the chances of snowfall are maximum and most frequent - ended, officials said on Monday.

However, the minimum temperature settled below the freezing point across the valley on Sunday night, the officials said.

Chilla-i-Kalan -- the 40day harshest winter period which began on December 21 last year -- is a period when a cold wave grips the region and the temperature drops considerably leading to the freezing of water bodies including the famous Dal Lake here as well as the water supply lines in several parts of the valley.

The chances of snowfall are the most frequent and maximum during this period and most areas, especially in the higher reaches, receive

# J&K sees 15 coronavirus deaths, 2,550 new cases

JAMMU: Jammu and Kashmir recorded 2,550 fresh coronavirus cases on Monday, taking the number of infected people to 4,35,425, while 15 deaths due to the disease were reported in the past 24 hours, officials said.

Out of the fresh cases, 974 were from the Jammu division and 1,576 from the Kashmir division of the Union Territory, the officials said. While ten deaths were reported from

the Jammu division, five were recorded

They said Jammu district recorded a maximum of 500 new cases, followed by

391 cases in Srinagar district. There are 36,372 active COVID-19 cases in the Union Territory, while the number of recovered patients stands at 3,94,379, the officials said.

The 15 new fatalities, highest single-

day count so far this year, pushed the death toll from the pandemic to 4,674 in Jammu and Kashmir

Meanwhile, Ladakh has reported 133 fresh COVID-19 cases, taking the virus tally to 25,869 while the active cases in the union territory have come down to 1.212, officials said. The union territory has recorded 224

Covid-related deaths -- 165 in Leh and 59 in Kargil -- since the outbreak of the pandemic last year, they said.

There was no death reported from union territory on Sunday, they said. As many as 182 patients were cured

and discharged from hospitals in Ladakh. Of these, 148 were discharged in Leh and 34 in Kargil, they said.

With these, the total number of cured patients is 24,460, they said.

Of the total of 133 fresh cases from Union territory, 102 such cases were reported from Leh district and 31 from Kargil district, ■ CONTD ON PAGE 9
