

ANOTHER GOOD INITIATIVE

The government led by BJP in Centre has taken so many steps in ensuring safety on the roads and in the same context, the Road Transport and Highways Minister, Nitin Gadkari has come up with another initiative to curb the bloodshed on roads due to accidents. It is pertinent to mention that over 5 lakh accidents occur on the roads in the country in one year claiming lives of nearly 1.5 lakh people therefore taking steps to save lives while people move on wheels is a noble cause and those doing the same are philanthropic persons. In this regard, the Union Minister Nitin Gadkari has informed that the government has made it mandatory for automakers to provide three-point seat belts for all front-facing passengers in a car. This means that sooner than later all the occupants in the car will have to mandatorily wear seat belts thus raising the safety level which is necessary to save lives. The norm will also be applicable for the middle seat in the rear row of a car. It is pertinent to mention that presently, only the front seats and two rear seats in most cars produced in the country have three-point seat belts. However, the middle rear seats in these cars come equipped with only a two-point or lap seat belt, similar to the ones provided in aircraft seats. Nitin Gadkari has so many good decisions to his credit that he deserves kudos for the changes he had brought in the country to ensure safety on roads, which also includes development of roads infra which has seen tremendous improvement under the incumbent government especially by the ministry under Nitin Gadkari. All said and done, this small initiative for making seat belts mandatory in rear seats of the cars as discussed will go a long way in saving lives. There are many other things akin to this one which can be brought in to ensure safety of people on roads. The concerned ministry should invite suggestions from the people to bring about changes for minimizing accidents on roads and curbing the number of deaths as losing people to accidents is the biggest tragedy which people face after avoidable accidents.

In this context, Principal Secretary Higher Education Department, Rohit Kansal has directed principals of all colleges to get their institutions evaluated and accredited by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) within the shortest possible time and also conduct an academic audit to determine the quality of academic input, need for course or options revision and modernization of syllabus. With the introduction of the New Education Policy (NEP) 2020, the focus had moved to quality education, flexibility in curriculum and globalization of outlook and for this NAAC accreditation is an important milestone as NAAC accredited institutions have a certain level to impart quality education which is necessary in today's world having cut throat competition. Education is the most important pillar of a nation for its development therefore the excellence and relevance of courses offered by the colleges must have a standard. Colleges must find and recognize additional requirements to satisfy them per the international standards. The role of NAAC Accreditation is to bring the best in every institution and help institutions grow across research, innovation, student success, governance and more. Surely instructions given by the Principal Secretary Higher Education Department with regard to NAAC accreditation of colleges in the UT are the most relevant one and therefore moving fast to achieve the same is in the interest of all in the UT. Wasting time in this regard is not a good idea because all colleges in J&K having NAAC accreditation will improve the standard of education considerably.

Think mindfully and you'll find it's really difficult to remain in a state of despair. It's tough because it would be difficult for anyone to spend time in such a painful state of mind.


On the contrary, if you are in a state of comfort, peace and happiness, it will make the days go by faster. You don't find your days tiring & irksome.

Modi in Parliament-Bane of Congress to nation in past

Replying to the debate on the motion of thanks to the President's address in the Rajya Sabha, the Prime Minister Narendra Modi, while highlighting his government's achievements in various sectors of development in the country, said the Congress is creating hurdles in country's development as an opposition party too. Modi said urban Naxals are today controlling Congress' 'thought and ideology'. He further said, 'Congress in a way is in the grip of urban Naxals. That is why the thoughts of Congress have become negative. The Prime Minister said that the dynastic parties are the biggest threat to India's democracy. Prime Minister Narendra Modi said, as he launched an all-out attack on the Congress, in response to the comments of some members in parliament that how would the country be if there would have been no Congress in the country. He opened Pandora box of the Congress and said in a poetic tone, if there had been no Congress then there would have been:

1. No Emergency imposed in country.
2. No Mass killings of Sikhs in 1984.
3. No Mass exodus of Kashmiri Pandits from Kashmir.
4. No Caste politics for garnering votes and dividing people of country on caste and religion bases to remain in power.
5. Not other host of issues concerning the development of the country.

What a hard and a bashful reality, which no honest politician of India had spoken about, so far during the Congress rule for more than fifty years. How Sikhs and Kashmiri Pandits suffered has remained no body's concern amongst the dynastic politicians so far including the dynastic politicians of Kashmir about the mass killings and the exodus of Kashmiri Pandits in the valley. In retaliation, The Congress staged a walkout from the House during the prime minister's address, prompting Modi to say that one needs to listen too in a democracy and alleging that the party was used to only preaching to others till now. The Prime Minister said, 'The biggest threat to our democracy is dynastic parties. When one family gets too prevalent in a political party, then talent is the first casualty'. He quoted some instances like, whenever someone within the Congress has spoken against a particular family, the results have been there for all to see, the prime minister said, naming the late leader Sitaram Kesri. Kesri, who spoke out against Gandhi family, was removed as party President. He also took on Congress for preaching about freedom of expression and cited the example of Lata Mangeshkar's musician brother Hridaynath Mangeshkar who was sacked from All India Radio for presenting poetry on Veer Savarkar. Lyricist Majrooh Sultanpuri was jailed criticising Jawaharlal Nehru. The prime minister noted that India is known as the 'mother of democracy', and democracy and debate have been carrying on for centuries here. He alleged that the Congress thinks the country was born only in 1947. This mindset is harmful for the country, as its policies have affected the country's progress in the last 75 years. 'We will never learn lessons in democracy from those who trampled over democracy in 1975,' Modi said. He attacked the Congress for sacking over 50 state governments of several parties during its over 50-year rule at the Centre. Congress, the Prime Minister said, has been suppressing state governments and the policy of the Congress high

command has been 'to first discredit, then destabilize and then dismiss' governments. Modi suggested that the opposition party change its name from Indian National Congress to 'Federation of Congress' and urged it to not impose its frustration and despair on the people of the country as loss and victory happen in politics.

Prime Minister suggested that all political parties should establish democracy in their own parties and Congress being the oldest party of the country has more responsibility to do so. Referring to some unfortunate utterances of Rahul Gandhi in Parliament, where in he said that Modi is behaving as a King, the Prime Minister said that to listen to Rahul Gandhi's long and rambling speech in the Lok Sabha was to realize, that if he remains the only challenger that the Congress party produces, Modi will continue to look much, much better. As I listened to Rahul Gandhi's speech in Parliament last week, I found myself understanding why Narendra Modi has won two terms in office. It needs to be noted that for such utterances of Raul Gandhi, BJP MP Nishikant Dubey on Thursday submitted a privilege notice to the Lok Sabha secretariat against Congress leader Rahul Gandhi for attempting to 'incite' MPs and the nation at large through his remarks during the debate in the House on the Motion of Thanks on the President's address. Noting that while every MP has a constitutional right to speak in Parliament and express his/her views on various topics, he said it is also one of the foremost duties of every member to maintain decency and should not speak anything that would lower the dignity of Parliament and categorized as 'Contempt of the House'.

'I have submitted a privilege notice to the Lok Sabha Secretariat against (Rahul) Gandhi for his comments relating to the 'Union and its Territories,' Dubey said. 'In his speech, he has uttered that India is described as a Union of States and India is not described as a Nation. He has further correlated this with making a hollow, baseless and childish prophecy that the people of Tamil Nadu, etc., would never allow themselves to be ruled by the present Government/Party'.

'Such utterances of Rahul Gandhi is an attempt to 'hurt' and 'incite' the other Members of Parliament and also to the citizens of our 'Nation', by means of the live telecast, that any State could easily be separated from our 'Nation' if they do not want to be ruled by a specific political Party and no new State and/or alteration of areas, boundaries or names of existing States could be effected in any manner in view of the fact that our Country came to existence by means of a 'negotiation' between and amongst various States,' he asserted.

Calling Rahul Gandhi a 'script reader' and a 'Drawing Room Politician', Dubey said it appears that he has even not read the Preamble of our Constitution, which unambiguously states that 'We, the People of India, having solemnly resolved to constitute India into a Sovereign Socialist Secular Democratic Republic. By usage of the word 'Republie' in the preamble of our Constitution, it has already made clear to one and all that India is a 'Nation' by all means but, it is quite unfortunate that this simple fact is not understood by a veteran Parliamentarian, i.e., Rahul Gandhi, who also share the rare distinction of possessing a questionable academic attainment abroad, the BJP leaders said. 'In view of this, I wish to give this notice of 'Breach of Privilege' and 'Contempt of the House' against Rahul Gandhi. It is humbly requested that my instant notice may kindly be accepted under Rule 222 of Rules of Procedure and Conduct of Business in Lok Sabha,' he added.

Taking a veiled dig at Congress leader Rahul Gandhi,

PM Narendra Modi said, 'What did he say that industrialists are a variant of COVID? At least tell him that he is damaging the reputation of Congress.' This came after Rahul Gandhi on February 2 tweeted, 'Institutions, the instruments of conversation between states & people, are being destroyed by the BJP's idea of India. They have created a divide where a 'Double A' variant of very richest monopolize all sectors. Yet in 'Gareeb Ka Hindustan', 3 crore youth lost jobs in 2021. While reiterating that dynastic politics biggest enemy of democracy, the PM made a scathing attack on 'dynastic politics' saying, 'it is a big threat and biggest enemy of democracy' and severely compromises the talent coming into a political party. In an exclusive interview with a news agency, the Prime Minister elaborated on his 'fake Samajwadi' jibe at Samajwadi Party in poll-bound Uttar Pradesh and said these parties were concerned about 'Parivarvad'. Modi said he had received a letter in the past stating that in Samajwadi Party in Uttar Pradesh there were 45 people from the family who held various positions. The Prime Minister said the Government was focusing on the welfare of people and the BJP has a view that 'Government has no business to be in business'. The Prime Minister referred to socialist leaders Ram Manohar Lohia and George Fernandez and asked if they ever laid thrust on their families. He said Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar, an ally of BJP at the Centre and in Bihar, is also a socialist leader. 'I am for the society. When I say fake socialism, it is 'Parivarvad'. Do you see Lohia's family anywhere, he was a socialist; do you see the family of George Fernandez, he was also a Samajwadi. Nitish Babu, he is working with us, he is also a socialist. Do you see his family,' he asked. Taking a jibe at Samajwadi Party headed by Akhilesh Yadav, he said they laid thrust on 'my family'. 'Someone sent me a letter once that in Samajwadi Party in Uttar Pradesh there were 45 people from the family who held some positions. Someone else told me all those of around 25 years in age got the opportunity to contest elections. Is this dynastic politics a threat for democracy?' he asked. He said in dynastic parties positions like the President, Parliamentary board chief are held by a person and if the father is not there for some reason, the son replaces him. Citing examples, the Prime Minister said that two political parties in Jammu and Kashmir practiced dynastic politics for decades. He said dynastic politics prevailed in parties in Haryana, Uttar Pradesh, Jharkhand and Tamil Nadu. 'The family runs the party; this is a big danger to democracy. The family-run parties are the biggest enemy of democracy as it negates the basic norms. Their goal is to save family whether there is any benefit of the country,' he said. As far as Jammu & Kashmir is concerned, Jammu suffered a lot for its development and recognition as an important entity of the state ever since 1947, due to this dynastic rule of the politicians from Kashmir, encouraged and supported by the dynasty Congress rulers from the Centre.

Kashmiri Pandits present plight to be refugees within their own country due to their mass exodus from the valley under the threat of terrorism, is again a sin of the Congress, who ruled India for decades abetted by the dynastic rulers of just two political families of Kashmir, who ruled Jammu & Kashmir ever since 1947, considering Jammu & Kashmir as their personal heritage and property. That is quite unfortunate.

procurement from domestic market, a big boost to Atmanirbhar Bharat, Rs.19500 Crore in PLIs for high efficiency solar modules, Capex stepped up by 35.4 per cent, Rs.7.50 lakh crore for 2022, Rs.10.68 lakh crore estimated for 2022-23, over 4 per cent of GDP, Digital Rupee by the Government, to be issued by the RBI, Blockchain technology for digital Rupee, Rs 1 lakh crore interest free loan for States, Fiscal deficit revised to 6.9 per cent of the GDP, Co-op surcharge reduced to 7 per cent for income 1 crore-10 crore, Corrected income tax returns can now be filed in 2 years, Tax deduction for state employees increased to 14 per cent, bringing them at par with Central Government employees. After reviewing the highlights of the 2022-23 budget, hardly can one draw the conclusion that the budget has been presented keeping in view the forth coming elections in five states.

government had imposed a complete ban, which is still imposed from time to time in many places. In parallel with the condition of the victim and the pressure arising out of it, the reasons for this extend to the policies of the government at the systemic level. The truth is that suicides are deaths that are avoidable but it is up to the vision and will of the government that what kind of social development policies it implements.

Increasing financial crises

It is generally believed that a person, in a state of extreme emotional pressure, sometimes unable to handle himself, embraces death. Such deaths have often been viewed as result of direct causes but if there is an unexpected increase in the incidence of suicide, then it should be a matter of concern for anyone. Especially, when a person ceases to see any option but to commit suicide due to circumstances arising out of Government policies. Incidents of people's suicide due to lack or various other reasons are not new and the statistics of suicides of farmers in debt especially in the last several years have forced one to think about the wider perspective of this problem. Despite this, no sincere initiative was taken by the government in the direction of making such policies, so that no person would face the risk of suicide. It is not unreasonable that today the

noose of financial crisis is tightening so much that many people are losing their lives.

The picture presented by the government in Parliament on Wednesday is enough to show that the area in which the government could have taken some concrete steps at the policy and implementation level to solve the complex issue of suicide or reduce its intensity could have been done, nothing was done in that too. Rather, during the last two-and-a-half years due to the pandemic or various other reasons, the network of debt and unemployment that has arisen, the patience of many people trapped in it has been answered.

Quoting the National Crime Records Bureau, the Union Minister of State for Home told in Rajya Sabha that during the last three years, more than 25,000 people committed suicide due to unemployment and debt. According to this figure, about nine thousand people have given their lives due to unemployment and more than sixteen thousand people have become bankrupt due to the vicious cycle of debt. The total number of people who committed suicide in the last two years was about three lakhs. Significantly, in view of Corona, the
