JAMMU: Director Agriculture Production & Farmers' Welfare Jammu K. K. Sharma on Monday chaired a meeting of the officers to review the progress under CAPEX 2021-22.

The physical and financial achievements/ expenditure under various centrally sponsored schemes and REVEX/CAPEX Budget 2021-22 were discussed threadbare in the meeting.

The Director stressed to expedite utilization of funds under CAPEX Budget 2021-

22 to ensure maximum achievement at the earliest. He asked officers for strict adherence to quality parameters and Codal formalities while executing the infrastructure development works as per DPRs.

Low expenditure on part of some districts was viewed seriously by the chair. He further impressed upon the officers to identify and resolve the bottlenecks for successful implementation of farmer welfare schemes.

The Director took latest update under PM KISAN,

PMKMDY, e-Shram and directed for 100% target achievement of adhar correction. Stress was given on QR code installation including UPI & IP address by the fertilizer dealers. Director also stressed on promotion of right and farmer friendly extension activity in the field by keeping check on wrong technology transfer. Full Utility of the machinery under Custom Hiring Centre (CHC) should be ensured, he said.

He asked for need based conductance of e-plant clinics

in the districts for facilitation of the farmers. Feed back in respect of Mushroom, Apiculture, Vegetable Clusters and Departmental Farms was also reviewed in the meeting.

Director Agriculture informed the house that in accordance with latest circular by the UT government, the rider of 30% expenditure of funds does not pertain to centrally sponsored schemes.

## FOIJ seeks developed Industrial Estates for prospective investors

JAMMU: Lalit Mahajan, Co-Chairman, Federation of Industries Jammu (FOIJ) has expressed gratitude towards LG Manoj Sinha, Principal Secretary, Industries & Commerce Department, Ranjan Prakash Thakur for granting Rs 28,400 cr; which is being enhanced to Rs 50,000 cr; as reported in print & electronic media on basis of which Prospective Investors from within/outside UT have already applied for allotment of Land in the proposed Industrial Estates as notified by Industries Department in JKINVEST Portal. In a press statement issued here, Mahajan said, "It has been printed in media that approximate 16,000 Kanals of land stands returned to Government as it is not possible to develop aforesaid land by J&K SIDCO/ SICOP. This will be a setback in establishing New Industrial Units. It is a matter of great concern that Industries Department already started process for the allotment of land in Industrial Estates in jkinvest.com portal, for which JKISICOP has already intimated prospective investors to deposit the requisite documents. Further; it has been also brought into our notice that JKISICOP/JKSIDCO has intimated the prospective allottees to deposit full amount of land premium along with 3 years advance rent & maintenance charges but there is not developed land in any Industrial areas except Gathi in Kathua District and IGC Samba The FOIJ urged LG to issue necessary directions for allotment of developed land to prospective Investors in a time-bound manner on the basis of land allotment application received from September 1, 2021 on First Come First Serve basis besides collecting premium & lease rent only when the land is fully developed and ready for possession.

## Ladakh Buddhist Association condemns alleged kidnapping case in Kargil

LEH: Ladakh Buddhist Association, Ladakh Buddhist Association Youth Wing, Zanskar Buddhist Association and Ladakh Gonpa Association condemned the recent alleged kidnapping of a minor girl from Mulbekh village. They alleged that a minor girl belonging to the Buddhist Community of Mulbekh was kidnapped by three boys from Kargil and sexually harassed on Saturday.

President, Ladakh Buddhist Association Youth Wing, Rigzin Dorjay addressed the media about the issue on Monday and informed that an FIR has been lodged with Police Station Wakha in this regard. The Buddhist Youth leader accused Kargil Police and other concerned

complainant, mother of prosecutrix, submitted an application on June 22, 2018 at Police Station Kandi alleging molestation of her minor daughter by appellant. It was averred in application that complainant's husband had gone to Kuwait for work. Her daughter, the victim, is studying in Class-IV in Primary School Kotranka and on fateful day, the victim had gone to the school as usual but did not return up to 2.30 PM whereas other students returned back. After this, complainant went to the school and found that victim was weeping in ground and coming towards house. On enquiring about reason for her weeping, the victim told

complainant that her teacher, Hardev Singh, after school time was over, allowed all other students to leave school except her. She was let out only when she raised hue and cry. It was prayed in application that since victim was a child and appellant-teacher had committed offence of outraging her modesty as such action under law be taken against him, after which FIR No. 71/2018 for offence under Section

354-A/341 RPC and Section 9 POCSO was registered and after completion of investigation, Challan was presented which was decided by Trial Court on February 28, 2020, thereby sentencing petitioner to undergo rigorous imprisonment for ten years and a fine of Rs 10,000. Justice Sanjeev Kumar, after hearing both the sides, observed that major contradictions pointed out herein above, the prosecu-

tion case falls in the category where appellant is at least entitled to the benefit of doubt. "The major contradictions appearing in statements of the prosecution witnesses and the slipshod manner in which the investigation has been conducted badly dents credibility and reliability of prosecution case," the Court observed and allowed the petition thereby setting-aside the sentence awarded to petitioner.

## HC upholds PSA of OGW of terrorist outfit ‘Kashmir Tigers’

SRINAGAR: Justice Tashi Rabstan upheld detention under Public Safety Act (PSA) of one Tanveer Ahmed Malik, an Over Ground Worker of a terrorist organisation 'Kashmir Tigers'.

As per details, the detenu was indulged in anti-national and criminal activities and remained in contact with anti-national elements, thereby creating a feeling of insecurity, pain and fear among general public. The grounds of detention further revealed that detenu has been working as OGW

with terrorist organization 'Kashmir Tigers' and providing shelter/logistic support and information regarding movement of security forces to terrorists particularly one Altaf Shah. It further revealed that detenu is working on directions of terrorists whose aim is to disrupt peaceful atmosphere and secede the UT of Jammu & Kashmir from rest of country and as such, his immediate detention was warranted.

While dismissing petition of Tanveer Ahmed Malik, Justice Tashi Rabstan observed that if

one looks at acts, J&K Public Safety Act, 1978, is designed for, is to prevent. "There are acts that are prejudicial to security of the State or maintenance of public order. The acts, indulged in by persons, who act in concert with other persons and quite often such activity has national level ramifications. These acts are preceded by a good amount of planning and organisation by the set of people fascinated in tumultuousness. They are not like ordinary law and order crimes," the Court observed.

## Road ahead for U-19s BCCI-NCA may develop ‘19 plus’ team to stop talented boys from going off radar

NEW DELHI: Kamal Passi played a few matches for Punjab some seasons ago, Ravikant Singh is nowhere near the system now and four years since his glory days, Manjot Kalra's career hasn't got a head-start. They were all once U-19 World Cup winners but have fallen off the radar, which is an issue that the BCCI will have to address.

That's why there could be a "19 plus" level added to the pathways structure with the National Cricket Academy (NCA) ensuring that the talented U-19 players who have just crossed the age-group remain firmly in the system and their progress is monitored.

Such a concept was in place during N Srinivasan's regime and when Sanjay Jagdale was the secretary and it seems that there are discussions to revive that structure.

The likes of Shaik Rasheed (Andhra), Ravi Kumar (Bengal), Raj Angad (Chandigarh) or Yash Dhull (Delhi) might make it to the state side right away but many players from the current India line-up will be caught in between the post-U19 phase and Ranji Trophy.

There exists an U-25 (previously U-23) state level but too many candidates are queuing for particular slots in those teams also.

"There is a five-tier pathways structure that National Cricket Academy could be looking at in future for developing players for the senior India team. It starts with U-16, followed by U-19, the Emerging (national U-23) and A team.

"In this there is a plan to add a '19 plus' level where all these boys could be integrated," a senior BCCI official privy to discussions told PTI on the condition of anonymity.

Among all these levels, the BCCI's U-25 (now known as state A team) is basically a platform given to players, who are unable to make the senior grade. The coaches know that most of the men who are 23-24 and are still not playing first-class cricket regularly might never make the grade, and hence, the bridge between U-19 and first-class cricket becomes doubly important.

Once the new NCA becomes operational with four first-class level grounds inside its premises, the academy can have its own '19 plus' teams which can play matches among themselves and their progress can be regularly monitored by the coaches, trainers and physios.

If they make the grade and play state A team (U-25) or Ranji Trophy, nothing like it but if they aren't part of any teams, at least they are in NCA's radar.

It is expected that the BCCI brass (president and secretary) might have discussions with the 10 national selectors (five junior and five senior) along with NCA supremo VVS Laxman and senior national head coach Rahul Dravid to create a blueprint.

"We all get really excited with the U-19 triumph but one doesn't understand that BCCI has such a great structure in place that we will always be up there among junior teams at global level.

"But just after this, first-class becomes a different beast. Go and check the 2012 team. Save Hanuma Vihari, most are now nowhere among even best domestic players in their own states," the veteran official, who had worked extensively in junior cricket, said.

Renowned Australian fast bowling coach Troy Cooley has already joined the NCA in Bengaluru, where he will be monitoring the progress of India's next batch of pacers.

The BCCI has thought about providing a pace bowlers' NCA contract to 10 talented youngsters whose entire cost of coaching, injury management and other expenses will be taken care of by the board.

It remains to be seen if something on similar lines is done for the reigning U-19 world champions.

## Proper drainage system necessary to make Jammu Smart City: Baru

## Bail denied in bovine smuggling case

JAMMU: CJM Jammu Amarjeet Singh Langheh rejected bail application of one Mustaq Choudhary, who was arrested by police in a case of bovine smuggling on fake documents.

As per police report, on January 30, 2022 a docket was received by respondent police station alleging therein that during Naka checking by police personnel at about 0030 hrs at Ban Toll Plaza, a vehicle (Tata Mobile) bearing registration no. JK02AX-6629, going from Jammu to Srinagar, was stopped for checking, during which it was found loaded with four bovine animals and when petitioner, who was driving the vehicle, was asked to produced permission if any regarding transportation of bovines, petitioner produced a permission purported to have been issued by the District Magistrate, Jammu under dispatch no. DMJ/Misc/21-22/4637 dated January 29, 2022. It was further alleged in

the docket that aforesaid permission under dispatch number was found to have been already issued in favour of some another vehicle bearing registration no. JK02CR-6093 on January 28, 2022 and that the aforesaid vehicle was permitted to cross Toll Plaza on strength of that permission. It is also outlined in police report that a copy of permission is always retained in the Naka as a routine practice and when permission allegedly produced by petitioner was compared with permission in respect of vehicle bearing registration no. JK02CR6093 dated January 28, 2022, the one produced by petitioner was found to be fake and forged intended to defraud police personnel in order to transport bovines. Accordingly, FIR no. 35/2022 for offences under-sections 188/ 420/ 467/468/ 471/34 of IPC & Section 11 of PCA Act was registered and investigation started.

CJM Jammu Amarjeet Singh Langheh after hear-

ing APP Kuldeep Bhat for police whereas Adv Anayat Ullah for applicant observed that the manner in which fake permission for transportation of bovine animals is alleged to have been produced before police as aforesaid and resources that might have been utilized in procuring fake stamps of Additional District Magistrate Jammu, Chief Animal Husbandry Officer Jammu and Mobile Officer Jammu only describes the level of impunity with which offences in question have prima facie been committed by petitioner. That petitioner is not co-operating in investigation is another issue highlighted by Investigating Officer. In these circumstances, grant of bail to petitioner on facts, would not only be against interest of public at large but shall also embolden petitioner to take law for a ride and that too with impunity. With these observations, Court rejected bail application.
