

JU Academic Council takes major academic initiatives

Integrated UG-PG Programmes approved for Offsite Campuses under NEP-2020

Dr. Neeraj Sharma, Registrar, JU presented the agenda items of academic importance for deliberations before the Academic Council. These included the start of B. Tech. (Electronics & Communication Engineering) at UIET, Kathua Campus, establishment of a "Translation Cell" in the Centre for Distance & Online Education.

The Council also approved the proposal of NIELIT (Srinagar/Jammu) for conducting free-of-cost skill development programmes for students of the University and its offsite campuses.

The Council further endorsed the introduction of the Four-Year Bachelor of Physical Education and Sports (B.P.E.S.) programme with an intake capacity of 50 students in the Directorate of Sports and Physical Education and the introduction of the Two-Year Integrated Master of Library and Information Science (M.Lib.I.Sc.) programme under NEP-2020, replacing the existing B.Lib.I.Sc (one year) from 2026-27 and M.Lib.I.Sc (one year) programme from 2027-28 offered

under the Non-CBCS pattern. The Council endorsed the introduction of the Integrated Teacher Education Programme (ITEP) in the Department of Education from the Academic Session 2026-27. The Council further endorsed the adoption of statutes governing the Five-Year Integrated Programme in the Faculty of Mathematical Sciences in the University of Jammu.

In a student-centric decision, the Academic Council approved the grant of one-time special chance to reappear/failure candidates of UG/PG Professional and Non-Professional programmes for clearing backlogs up to the Academic Year 2026.

To strengthen academic governance and disciplinary growth, the Council endorsed the constitution of the Faculty of Earth Sciences and the creation of a separate Dean in the said Faculty.

It further endorsed the introduction of the Five-Year Integrated UG-PG Programme (FYIP) under NEP-2020 at the Baderwah Campus, on the analogy of the FYIP offered in the main campus.

It further endorsed the introduction of Five-Year Integrated UG-PG Programmes under NEP-2020 at the main campus from the Academic Session 2026-27 onwards, and the adoption of statutes governing FYIP programmes as per NEP-2020.

In the context of global academic engagement, the Council approved adoption of the guidelines for pursuing Joint degree/Twinning degree with Foreign Higher Education Institutions, as per the UGC Regulations 2022 on Academic Collaboration between Indian and Foreign Higher Education Institutions.

The Council also endorsed the B.Com Programme at the Centre for Distance and Online Education under Non-Collegiate Women Education Board, on the analogy of the B.Com programme being offered at the Baderwah Campus, University of Jammu.

The Academic Council further approved the matter of award of credits to students of UG/PG programmes who participate in various co-curricular activities in consonance

with the National Credit Framework (NCF).

It also took note of the allocation of ISSN: 3108-2327 to the University's vernacular annual peer-reviewed journal "GYANANJALI", which will significantly enhance the institution's image by transitioning the publication from local to a globally academic resource.

Earlier Prof. J. P. Singh Joorel, Dean Academic Affairs in his welcome address acknowledged the efforts of the Deans, Heads, Rector, Directors and other faculty members for providing their valuable academic inputs.

Prof. Neelu Rohmetra, Dean Research Studies; Prof. Sangita Gupta, Dean Planning and Development also shared their inputs.

Shrine Board begins free Prasad distribution from Maha Shivratri

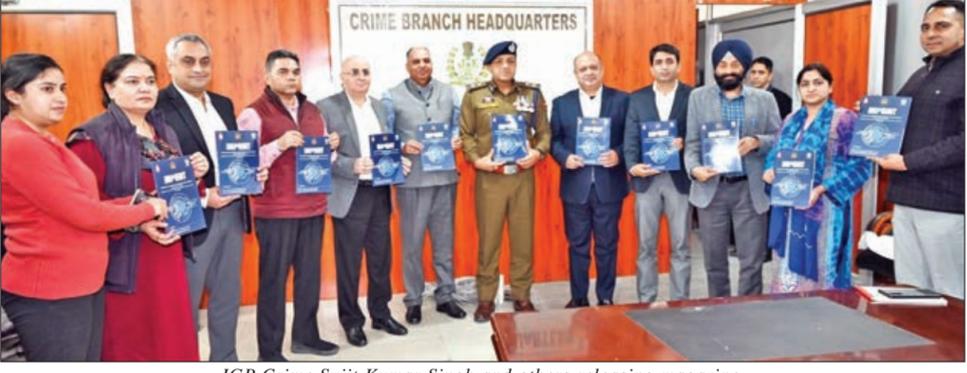

Satish meets delegations; reaffirms public welfare, sports empowerment

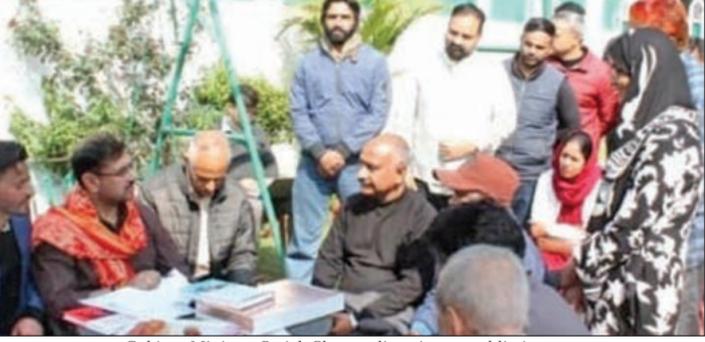

OI Chiki script 'powerful symbol' of Santhali identity that must be preserved: President Murmu

NEW DELHI: Describing the OI Chiki script as a "powerful symbol" of the Santhali identity, President Droupadi Murmu on Monday said efforts should be made to preserve and promote this century-old script.

Addressing a gathering to commemorate the centenary of the OI Chiki script, Murmu also expressed happiness that the script is growing in the digital medium.

In 1925, Pandit Raghunath Murmu created the OI Chiki script. Since then, it has become a powerful symbol of the Santhal identity.

It was included in the Constitution's Eighth Schedule in 2003.

In her address, Murmu described India as a "garden of multiple languages", stressing the importance of using one's mother tongue in communication.

She also said efforts should be made to preserve and promote the OI Chiki script.

Earlier, a military band welcomed Murmu at the venue - the Bhim Hall of the Dr Ambedkar International Centre. It first played the national song, 'Vande Mataram', followed by the national anthem, 'Jana Gana Mana'.

A group of folk artistes sang songs in

Santhali, followed by a performance by a troupe of Santhali dancers on a theme that celebrated nature and the cultural diversity of India.

A short film on the genesis and evolution of the OI Chiki script was also screened on the occasion.

A special postage stamp and a commemorative Rs 100 coin, along with a souvenir on OI Chikiscript, were also released at the event.

OI Chiki is the official script of the Santhali language, one of India's prominent tribal languages spoken widely

across Jharkhand, Odisha, West Bengal, Assam, and Bihar.

Belonging to the Austroasiatic language family, Santhali has historically thrived through oral traditions.

The script consists of 30 letters, designed to accurately represent Santhali phonetics. It has two styles - 'Chapa' and 'Usara'.

Union Minister for Tribal Affairs, Jual Oram, Union Culture Minister, Gajendra Singh Shekhawat, and Union Culture Secretary, Vivek Aggarwal, were present at the event, .

Murmu also felicitated several persons who worked to promote the OI Chiki script.

"In 1925, Pandit Raghunath Murmu invented the OI Chiki script. Since then, it has been used for the Santhali language. Now, this script is a powerful symbol of the Santhal identity worldwide. It is also an effective means of fostering unity among the Santhal community," the president said.

On December 29 last year, Murmu participated in a centenary celebration of the script in Jamshedpur,

Jharkhand.

In her address then, Murmu said that apart from getting education in any other language, learning the mother tongue, Santhali in the OI Chiki script, is also important for the overall development of the community.

Shekhawat in his address said the invention of the OI Chiki script gave "phonetic completeness" to Santhali culture, terming its centenary a "bright chapter in the inclusive consciousness of India".

Terming OI Chiki an "absolutely sci-

entific script", he described its evolution as a "sangam" (confluence) of various cultural ethos, of ebb and flow of cities, and a confluence of tradition and innovation.

Secretary Aggarwal termed Pandit Raghunath Murmu a "visionary inventor" and OI Chiki script a "gift to India".

OI Chiki script is borne out of Santhali culture and its form drew inspiration from natural elements such as fire, earth and facial forms, Aggarwal said.

Prior to the 20th century, Santhali was transcribed using various borrowed scripts, including Roman, Bangla, Odia and Devanagari, according to a note shared on the script by the government. These scripts facilitated limited written expression, and hence they were not specifically designed to accurately represent the distinctive phonetic features of the Santhali language. The language includes unique sounds, such as glottal stops and specific vowel patterns, which were difficult to accurately represent using external writing systems.

Consequently, this often led to distortions in pronunciation and meaning, thereby creating obstacles in educational contexts and hampering systematic linguistic development preservation, the note said.
