district this afternoon while on a routine mission to evacuate an ailing soldier from a forward post," Srinagar-based defence spokesman Col Emron Musavi said.

He said the helicopter lost communication with the forward post at Gujran in Baraumb before airlifting the trooper.

The slain co-pilot has been identified as Major Sankalp Yadav (29), while the injured pilot, a Lieutenant Colonel-rank officer, was rescued from the crash site and rushed to the Command Hospital in Udhampur.

"The pilots were responding to a medical emergency of the force. I am pained beyond words and I salute the dedication and bravery of the pilots who undertake such difficult evacuation operations," BSF Inspector General (Kashmir Frontier) Raja Babu Singh said.

Officials said immediately after the 'Cheetal' crashed, the Army launched a rescue operation and pressed into service an Advanced Light Helicopter (ALH) and soldiers on foot.

The two pilots were evacuated but Major Yadav was declared dead upon arrival at the hospital.

"Major Yadav was commissioned into the army in 2015 and he hailed from Jaipur, Rajasthan. He is survived by his father," the spokesman said.

Jammu and Kashmir Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha and Northern Army Commander Lieutenant General Upendra Dwivedi condoled the demise of Major Yadav. "I salute the courage and supreme sacrifice of our braveheart Army officer Maj Sankalp Yadav who laid down his life in the line of duty in Gurez sector. My deepest condolences to the bereaved family in this hour of grief. I wish for speedy recovery of the injured," Sinha said.

They will get it through violence if not through a fight," he said.

"They cannot be muzzled. They know how to get their demands met. If these demands are not met, they would again resume their agitation," he said referring to the year-long stir against the Centre's farm laws.

Malik, who had earlier criticised the Centre and PM Narendra Modi over the handling of the farmers' agitation, said there was always a chance that he will get a "call from Delhi" if he talks about farmers.

"I live in Delhi in a one-and-a-half room house, that is why I could mess ('panga le saka') with Modi over the farmers' issue," the Governor said.

"I don't have any enmity with the Centre but I can leave my post for the farmers," he said.

Malik repeated his earlier remark, saying when he met the PM over the farmers' issue in the past, they had a fight in just five minutes.

"I told him that the Sikhs and Jats do not forget. You must send them with something. They had remembered Indira (Gandhi) as well," he said in an apparent reference to the former PM's assassination.

Malik was in Jodhpur to attend a book release by the Marwar Jat Mahasabha.

He earlier too has made remarks against the PM and the Centre over the farmers' issue. At an event in Haryana earlier this month, he had claimed that his friends advised him not to criticise the BJP government as he could be made the President or Vice President if he kept quiet. Malik had then asserted that he "doesn't care about these positions". In January, he had claimed that when he went to meet the prime minister on the issue of farmers, Modi was "arrogant" and had a fight with him within five minutes.

India, China hold...

The main focus of the talks is expected to be the completion of the stalled disengagement process in the Hot Springs (Patrolling Point-15) areas.

The Indian delegation at the talks is being led by Lt Gen Anindya Sengupta, the newly-appointed Commander of the Leh-based 14 Corps.

The Indian side is also expected to insist on disengagement as soon as possible in all the remaining friction points including resolution of issues in Depsang Bulge and Demchok.

The 14th round of talks had taken place on January 12 and did not result in any significant headway in resolving the row in remaining friction points.

"The two sides agreed to stay in close contact and maintain dialogue via military and diplomatic channels and work out a mutually acceptable resolution of the

remaining issues at the earliest," a joint statement issued after the 14th round of talks said.

their lapses which many a times they deliberately make to confer wrongful advantage on the persons accused of offences under NDSP Act and their handlers," DB said, adding, "We have invariably seen that whenever huge quantity of contraband is recovered from a person traveling in a vehicle, it is the driver or one or two carriers with him who are booked and prosecuted, but no effort is made by the police to find out the origin from where the contraband has emanated and the destination where it was supposed to be delivered. In this way, we only try to prosecute the carriers and not the handlers of these carriers who are responsible to run the trade in an organized manner."

DB further directed that Department of Home, UT of Jammu and Kashmir, Director General of Police J&K and Director General Prosecution shall do well to find out in how many cases an effort has been made by the police to find out origin and the destination of the contraband seized while in transit. DB further observed that we are sure that an honest enquiry, if any made, in this regard would reveal some sort of connivance between some of the police officers/officials and the drug mafia. "In instant case, Enquiry Officer, however, has, as expected, given clean chit to the police, but we leave it to the wisdom of authorities who are responsible to maintain law and order to look into this aspect with some more seriousness. Hoping that the respondents are alive to the alarming situation created by free flow of drugs throughout the Territory of Jammu and Kashmir, we leave it to them to take appropriate corrective and remedial measures and wish not to say anything more. After all, responsibility to maintain law and order lies with the executive and we, as Courts, are only obligated to apply law as it is," the Court observed and directed Registry to send a copy of judgment to Secretary to Govt., Home Department, Director General of Police, Secretary to Govt., Law Department and Director General Prosecution.

This significant judgment has been passed in a appeal filed by UT aggrieved by the judgment of acquittal dated December 26, 2013 recorded by the Principal Sessions Judge, Jammu whereby the respondents have been acquitted of the charges under Sections 8/20/60 of Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act 1985, and has prayed for leave to appeal.

As per prosecution, on October 28, 2011 a party from Police Station Nagrota, while on patrolling duty at Bantalab, Nagrota, stopped a vehicle XYLO bearing registration No JK03C-4188, at about 5 PM, which was coming from Srinagar. Two passengers along with a driver were travelling in vehicle. The driver disclosed his name as Mohd Amin, whereas two passengers were identified as Ashok Kumar and Deepak Kumar. On search of vehicle, Charas like substance wrapped in a plastic bag was recovered. None of them account for the possession and accordingly, a docket was sent to Police Station through constable Murad Ali, whereupon FIR No. 257/2011 for commission of offences under Sections 8/20/60 of NDPS Act was registered against respondents and investigation was set in motion. During the course of investigation, the police seized the vehicle. The Charas recovered was weighed and it was found that Ashok Kumar and Deepak Kumar were carrying 4 Kg and 2 Kg Charas respectively, whereas driver Mohd Amin was found carrying 4 Kg and 500 gm Charas which they had concealed in diekey of the vehicle. The sample of 100 gm each was taken and sent for chemical examination and as per report of the chemical examiner, seized item was confirmed as Charas.

DB after hearing both the sides observed that needless to point out that with a view to bring home charge under NDPS Act, more particularly under the Sections with which the respondents had been charge-sheeted, the recovery of contraband from them is a sine quo non. The next important step is to seal the contraband in a manner that its safety is not compromised in any manner. It is for Investigating officer to further ensure that the seized contraband which is properly sealed reaches safely before the FSL for chemical examination and that there is no room or scope for any opportunity to anybody to tamper with the seized contraband. The examination of seized material by the FSL follows steps like proper seizure of the contraband and sealing, picking up of the samples of required quantity from the seized item, re-sealing them in presence of Executive Magistrate and then sending them to the FSL without any further waste of time. "However, where distance between the place of occurrence/Police Station from the FSL is too long that it is necessary to keep the samples taken from the seized contraband in safe custody, in such situation, the Investigating Officer must deposit the seized contraband as well as samples after entering them in Malkhana register both at the time of deposit and at time of its exist from the Malkhana. These are salient steps which are required to be followed in any investigation in the cases involving the seizure of narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances. As is rightly observed by the trial Court that in the instant case, the recovery of the contraband was made on spot. The seizure memo was prepared by the SHO of Police Station, Nagrota, whereas Abdul Rashid, ASI and Murad Ali were marginal witnesses of the said memo. The seizure memo was further attested by the SDPO. It is from the seized contraband, three samples of charas weighing 100 gms each were taken and sealed separately as A, B and C. As is apparent from the evidence on record, PW Murad Ali has deposed that the polythene bags containing contraband were recovered from the respondents and were in their hands at the time of recovery. Interestingly, the Public Prosecutor, who was conducting the prosecution, did not put this seizure memo to the witness, resultantly PW Murad Ali neither identified his signatures on the seizure memo, nor proved its contents. On one hand, this witness would state that the Charas was recovered from the vehicle and on the other hand, he would state that it was in the hands of the respondents. He has even gone to the extent of denying having any knowledge about the occurrence and has stated that it was only PW Abdul Rashid, ASI who told him that the Charas had been recovered from the respondents. He further claims in his statement that all the papers were signed in the police station," the Court observed.

DB further observed that having noticed the aforesaid serious flaws in the investigation and complete inapt handling of prosecution by the applicant/appellant, this Court vide its order dated 27.11.2019 directed the Secretary to the Government, Home Department of UT of Jammu and Kashmir to send a list of three senior officers out of which this Court may entrust the enquiry to anyone of them. The enquiry was directed to find out the lapses in the investigation and the connivance, if any, of the police with the drug mafia. From the list of officers sent by the Home Department, this Court vide order dated 13.12.2019 appointed one Sayed Ahfadul Mujtaba to conduct an enquiry into the whole matter and to pin point the guilt of the concerned officers/officials. The Enquiry Officer has submitted the enquiry report. The Enquiry Officer has given clean chit to the police insofar as the apprehension of this Court of the police acting in connivance with drug mafia is concerned. The Enquiry Officer, however, has concluded that the prosecution failed to prove its case before the Court because of inexperience and lack of professional and technical know-how required for investigation of a case under NDPS Act. The Enquiry Officer too has concluded that failure of the PP, who conducted the prosecution case in a slip-shod manner, has also contributed in failure of case before the

Court of law.

CBSE term-II board...

exams commence from April 26 for both classes.

While releasing the date sheets for term-II exams, the Board said on Friday that it has given a considerable gap between two exams keeping in mind that the schools were closed due to the pandemic.

"As the schools were closed due to pandemic which has led to learning losses, therefore, more gap has been given between the two examinations in almost all the subjects in both the classes," it said.

It also said that other competitive examinations including JEE-Main have been taken care of while preparing the date sheet.

"These date sheets have been prepared by avoiding nearly 35,000 subject combinations to ensure that no two subject examinations of a student fall on the same date," it said.

As many as 22 patients were cured and discharged from hospitals in Leh, taking the overall recoveries in the Union Territory to 27,850, officials said.

All the new cases were reported from Leh, they said, adding that a total of 665 sample reports in Ladakh were found negative.

J&K: Fee Regulation...

As a temporary measure and till such time that a final decision is taken, school managements shall hike the transportation fees that was being paid by the students who were availing the transport facility in October 2019 in the winter zone and in February 2020 in the summer zone by 12 per cent, it said.

It was also resolved that no private school shall seek any undertaking from parents or students for advance tuition fees and transportation fees, "the practice being illegal and shall not be allowed," the order stated.

It directed that the hike will be operative from the date of reopening of schools.
