pline throughout his career. Nayak Vakil Singh lost his life on June 28, 1984, when he was part of a convov attacked by terrorists in Agartala. Despite being gravely injured, he fought back valiant-

ly but later succumbed to his injuries. Dr. Jitendra highlighted that Nayak Vakil Singh's courage continues to inspire all.In his remarks, the Minister reflected on the significance of renaming the school in Hiranagar in honor of Shaheed Navak Vakil Singh. He stated a tribute to the soldier's immense sacrifice but would also inspire future generations to uphold the values of patriotism, dedication and selflessness.

Dr. Singh stressed the importance of memorializing great patriots like Nayak Vakil Singh.
