## India withdraw team from Central Asian Volleyball event in Islamabad

LAHORE: Pakistan Volleyball Federation on Sunday said India have withdrawn their contingent from the next month's Central Asian Volleyball in Islamabad. PVP official Abdul Ahad said India had confirmed sending a 30-member squad, including 22 players for the championship starting May 28 at the Jinnah complex. Following the April 22 terror attack in Pahalgalam, where 26 tourists were killed, diplomatic tension has grown between the two nations. "The Indian Volleyball officials have informed the regional body that their government has cancelled the NOC issued to them for the tournament after the incident in Pahalgalam," Ahad said. "It is disappointing to know India has withdrawn from the championship and they will be replaced either by Afghanistan or Sri Lanka."

## Rawal, bowlers shine as India hammer Sri Lanka by nine wickets in rain-hit ODI

COLOMBO: Opener Pratika Rawal struck a fine half-century after spinners Sneh Rana and debutant Shree Charani starred with the ball as a clinical India outclassed Sri Lanka by nine wickets in the rain-hit opening ODI of the women's tri-nation series here Sunday.



Opting to bowl, India bundled out Sri Lanka for 147 in a curtailed 39-over-a-side contest, with Rana (3/31) and Charani (2/26) sharing five wickets between them, while senior off-spinner Deepti Sharma (2/22) also chipped in. India chased down the modest target in 29.4 overs, with Smriti Mandhana (43) providing a fluent start before Rawal (50 not out) and Harleen Deol (48 not out) took the visitors home without much fuss. India will next face South Africa on April 29. Playing only her seventh ODI, Rawal, who had slammed a record-breaking 154 against Ireland earlier this year, continued her rich vein of form. The 24-year-old, who holds the record for

most runs by any batter in their first six ODI innings, anchored the chase with maturity. Rawal stitched two crucial partnerships - 54 off 59 balls with Mandhana and an unbroken 95-run stand off 120 balls with Deol - to take India past the finish line. The right-hander, who made optimum use of her exquisite cover drives, struck seven boundaries in her 62-ball knock, while Mandhana found the fence six times during her 52-ball stay. Rawal brought up her fourth successive fifty with a single off the penultimate ball of the chase before Deol sealed the win with a boundary.

Medium pacer Kashvee Sudesh Gautam, who is also playing her first international match, too bowled well and while the 22-year-old could not register her name in the wicket's column, she was economical and conceded only 28 runs in 8 overs. With the match reduced to 39 overs per side due to a delay of three hours following heavy showers, the Indian bowlers used the conditions

to their advantage and did not allow the Sri Lankan batters to settle down at the R Premadasa Stadium. None of the Sri Lankan batters could get a big knock as Hasini Perera made 30 in 46 balls and Kavisha Dilhari contributed a 26-ball 25. Skipper Chamari Athapaththu (7), opening the batting alongside Hasini, failed to fire at the start of the innings.

## Abhinav Shaw shines with three gold medals across categories at KSSM Shooting C'ship

NEW DELHI: Young Abhinav Shaw came up with an impressive performance, winning a gold medal each in senior, junior and youth categories in 10m air rifle mixed team event at the Kumar Surendra Singh Memorial Shooting Championship here on Sunday. The 17-year-old from West Bengal, the youngest-ever medallist at the National Championships and also the reigning junior world champion in the mixed team event, swept all the three gold medals across categories, partnering different shooters. In the senior 10m air rifle mixed team final, Shaw partnered with world championship bronze medallist

Mehuli Ghosh to overwhelm the Railways pair of Meghana Sajjanar and Shahu Tushar Mane 16-4. Elavenil Valarivan and Smit Rameshbhai Moradiya won bronze for Gujarat in the event. In the junior gold-medal match, Shaw partnered with Svati Chowdhury to give West Bengal the second gold of the day as they beat Shambhavi Kshirsagar and Parth Rakesh Mane of Maharashtra 16-12. Abhinav Agrawal and Gautami Bhanot picked up the bronze medal for Madhya Pradesh. Shaw completed the golden hat-trick with Sandrata Roy in the youth category. The pair defeated the Madhya Pradesh duo of Nikhil Pundir and Gautami Bhanot 17-5.

Haryana won the bronze through Ameerah Arshad and Puru Raj Borthal. Rhythm Sangwan and Aditya Mahra won the senior pistol mixed team event in Bhopal's MP State Academy range. The Haryana pair defeated Rahi Sarnobat and Pranav of Maharashtra 16-14 in the gold-medal match. Shiva Narwal, the reigning world champion in the senior mixed team pistol event, and Kanak then gave Haryana the second gold by winning the junior event 16-8 over Rajasthan. Delhi's Rashmika Sahgal won a fourth gold in the championship, partnering Hardik for a 16-6 verdict over Karnataka in the gold-medal match in the youth category.

DUBAI: Former India coach Ravi Shastri has cautioned against giving Jasprit Bumrah five Tests in a row in England, saying the premier pacer should be given a break after two matches and the freedom to pick the game for adequate rest. India will clash with England in an away series, beginning at Headingley on June 20, marking the beginning of the new World Test Championship (2025-27) cycle. The back injury Bumrah suffered during the Australia tour had kept him out of Champions Trophy. The star bowler

made a return to competitive cricket during the ongoing IPL, competing for Mumbai Indians. "I would be very, very careful (with Bumrah). I would give him two Test matches at a time and then wait for the break," said Shastri in the latest issue of the ICC Review. "Ideally, make him play four (Tests). You'll be tempted to make him play five if he starts off in a great manner, but it's how his body pulls up," said the cricketer-turned-commentator. The legendary cricketer opined that Bumrah should be given the leeway to decide which match he

wants to skip. "He should be given the first opportunity to say, 'Yes, a little, (I am) feeling the niggles. A break would help'. Give him that break." He added that a fully-fit Indian pace trio of Bumrah, Mohammed Shami and Mohammed Siraj will certainly trouble England. Shami's unavailability, Bumrah getting injured in the fifth Test and Siraj's poor form had adversely impacted India that lost the Border-Gavaskar series 1-3. Siraj has since made a strong comeback in the IPL for Gujarat Titans. "I think with Siraj,

Jasprit and Shami, these three, if they are fully fit, they will give England heaps of problems. "It's a quality, top-class pace attack when you get these three fit. And what I like about Siraj...for him to go back to the drawing board and come back the way he has, there's a spring in his stride, the pace is up there, and he means business game after game. And that is perfect from India's point of view with England coming up," said Shastri. With Shami too hitting his strides after missing the BGT and Champions Trophy due to a knee injury he suffered during the 2023 Cricket World Cup,

Shastri said he will be the "workhorse" during the Test series in England. Shami was dearly missed during the Border-Gavaskar Tests with Bumrah having to take the maximum workload. "The fact that he (Shami) puts his hand up and says, 'I'm available for that first 'Test match' means he knows his fitness levels. "He's a workhorse. I've known Shami for a long time. If he puts his mind to it, he'll get there. And the fact that there's Siraj and there's Jasprit doing as well as they are, that is just the motivation he needs to step up and get to that level," said Shastri.

MUMBAI: In-form Mumbai Indians extended their winning run with a 54-run hammering of Lucknow Super Giants, recording their fifth consecutive victory in the Indian Premier League (IPL) here Sunday. The hosts smashed LSG in a one-sided clash in which Suryakumar Yadav grabbed lead as tournament's leading run-scorer; with his 28-ball 54. Suryakumar continued to plunder runs to become the leading run-scorer in this IPL, crossing the 400-run mark with his third fifty. The India T20 skipper also completed his 4,000 runs in the tournament. Ryan Rickelton also sizzled with a 32-ball 58 that helped MI post a stiff 215 for seven being invited to take first strike. With a handsome total to defend, Mumbai Indians juggled their bowlers cleverly as the visitors struggled to find response to the challenges thrown by the home bowlers. With his wickets column not reflecting how well he has bowled since his comeback, pacer Jasprit Bumrah finally reaped the rewards to return with impressive figure of 4-0-22-4. He broke the back of LSG's chase with three wickets in the 16th over. In the process, Bumrah also went past Lasith Malinga (170) to become MI's leading wicket-taker in IPL history. LSG's chase was also marred by another poor outing for their captain Rishabh Pant (4). They were shot out for 161 on a perfect batting surface at the Wankhede Stadium. Bumrah, usually reserved for later stages, was brought on

early into the attack against a top-heavy LSG batting line-up and he produced immediate breakthrough in the third over. Bumrah nailed Aiden Markram (9) with precision as he angled three deliveries straight into the right-hander, who hit the next one straight to Naman Dhir trying to fend off the pressure. Pooran went after Deepak Chahar in the sixth over; slicing sixes off two wide full tosses and putting one into the stands over midwicket but his charge didn't last against MI's dependable right-arm spin option in Will Jacks (2-0-18-2). In the seventh over, Suryakumar, placed at long off just before the first delivery from Jacks, ran to his left and took a sharp diving catch to get rid of the dangerous Pooran. Jacks then had the out-of-form Pant caught at short third man off a meek reverse sweep, with LSG sliding to 60 for three. Mitchell Marsh, who had begun well with a couple of gigantic sixes in the powerplay, lasted more than halfway through the chase for LSG but could not contribute beyond a 24-ball 34 (3x4s, 2x6s). The wickets fell regularly

around him at the top, forcing the Australian to change gears and be more conservative, in which he eventually failed. His resistance ended in the 12th over when Trent Boult (3/20) dropped one short and Marsh pulled it hard but failed to get the distance, caught by Tilak Varma at deep square leg. Boult was once again impactful as he accounted for Marsh. Ayush Badoni (35) and Digvesh Rathi (1) in the final ball of the match. Earlier in the first half, Suryakumar's belligerent 54 and Rickelton's 58 fired Mumbai Indians to a good total. Suryakumar's 28-ball knock, laced with four sixes and as many fours, kept MI on track for a total in excess of 200 even as Tilak Varma (6) and Hardik Pandya (5) fell in quick succession. The standout stroke during his innings was when Suryakumar went down on his knee to lift Prince Yadav (1/44) over fine leg for a six on a waist-high ball. LSG's decision to bowl first, anticipating a spin-friendly track under the sun backfired to some extent on a batting-friendly pitch here, with none of

their bowlers able to control stroke-play. MI's scoring rate hovered around 10 runs an over even as it felt they were going through a slowdown in the second half. Rickelton's assault in the powerplay fuelled Mumbai's charge even as they lost the in-form Rohit Sharma early on. Coming into the match after scoring back-to-back fifties, Rohit (12) welcomed India speedster Mayank Yadav (2/40) with two consecutive sixes. But the India captain was undone by a slower delivery. Mayank pulled Rohit outside off on a 120kmph deliv-

ery in the third over; which the batter cut straight into the hands of Prince at third man. But the early blow had no impact whatsoever as Rickelton stroked his way for an impressive second IPL fifty off 25 balls. The left-handed South African wicketkeeper-batter hit his strides early in the game, hitting powerfully down the wicket and putting away anything in his range into the stands. Rickelton forged a second-wicket partnership of 55 runs with Will Jacks (29), setting the foundation for the middle order.
