On the occasion, the Minister dedicated India's first of its kind public funded DST-ICGEB 'Biofoundry' at the 31st Board Meeting Governors International Centre for Genetic Engineering and Biotechnology (ICGEB) in New Delhi.

Founded in 1983, the International Centre for Genetic Engineering and Biotechnology (ICGEB) is a premier intergovernmental organization dedicated to advancing research in the life sciences. India is one of the founding members of ICGEB. The organization operates through three main centres: New Delhi (India), which focuses on research and biotechnology applications; Trieste (Italy), which serves as the headquarters and coordinates global operations; and Cape Town (South Africa), which functions as a key hub for research, development, and international collaboration.

ICGEB has 69 member countries and plays a key

Addressing the Board of Governors Dr. Jitendra Singh said "This milestone aligns with the Government of India's Policy BioE3 (Biotechnology

Economy, Environment & Employment), approved under the visionary leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi.'

Dr. Jitendra Singh reaffirmed that under the Modi Government, India's bioeconomy has seen an exponential rise - from \$10 billion in 2014 to \$165.7 billion in 2024, with a target to achieve \$300 billion by 2030. He emphasized that India is at the right time, in the right place, with a highly enabling political ecosystem to lead the next global biotechnology revolu-

Dr. Jitendra Singh highlighted India's remarkable progress in the biotechnology sector. He noted that India now ranks 12th globally in biotechnology and holds the 3rd position in the Asia-Pacific region. The country has emerged as the largest vaccine producer in the world and is home to the 3rd largest startup ecosystem globallv. A testament to this growth is the exponential rise in biotech startups, which have surged from just 50 in 2014 to over 10,000 in 2024.

Recalling the success of

Suraksha, Dr. Jitendra Singh noted the development of the world's first DNA-based vaccine.He proudly stated that India gifted these vaccines to the world under the Vaccine Maitri initiative, showcasing its commitment to global health

Dr. Jitendra Singh mentioned the development of India's 1st of its kind Indigenous generation antibiotic for monotherapy in bacterial pneumonia Nafithromycin, backed in part by DBT-BIRAC. He also cited the creation of diagnostic kits for Dengue and HIV.

Emphasizing the national importance of biomanufacturing he lauded the BioE3 Policy, approved by the Union Cabinet in August 2024, as a gamechanging step to build a resilient ecosystem for bio-based products and promote high-performance biomanufacturing. He stated that India is now poised to lead the next wave of industrial revolution with sustainable biotech-driven manufacturing practices.

Dr. Jitendra Singh expressed pride in ICGEB New Delhi's pioneering role in implementing the BioE3 Policy, especially through the newly dedicated Bio-foundry. The facility will serve as a platform for scaling up bio-based innovations in collaboration with startups and researchers.

BJP hails success of operation Sindoor, call it a turning point in India's national security doctrine

JAMMU: J&K BJP highlighted the impact and significance of Operation Sindoor, the successfully carried out strategic military operation under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi in a press conference held at the party headquarters in Trikuta Nagar, here on Wednesday.

The press conference was addressed by Arun Gupta, spokesperson, J&K BJP, accompanied by Adv. Sunil Sethi, Chief Spokesperson of J&K BJP and flanked by Dr. Tahir Choudhary and Dr. Abhijeet Singh Jasrotia, spokespersons, along with Dr. Pardeep Mahotra, Media Incharge, J&K BJP.

Speaking to the media, Arun Gupta described Operation Sindoor as a watershed moment in India's journey towards asserting its national interests with pride and determination.

He emphasized that the operation has reshaped the national psyche, strengthened the spirit of nationalism, and redefined how Indians perceive their role in the nation's progress.

"This operation has not just been a military success; it has transformed the environment across the country. It has taught us the true value of sacrifice and rekindled the pride in our identity as Indians. The sense of unity and strength that has emerged from this operation marks a new beginning," said Arun Gupta.

He further stated that India is now more resolute in defending its sovereignty. The idea of nationalism is unity and commitment to the motherland.

"Our leadership has clearly stated that the nation stands above all, and every citizen must internalize this message. We must confront any internal or external force that seeks to harm our country's integrity," he added.

Adv. Sunil Sethi underlined the strategic and symbolic importance of Operation Sindoor, noting that it sends a clear message to the enemies of peace. He said the operation reflects the changing posture of India, which has evolved from appeasement to active defense.

"This is a transformed India. We have moved beyond symbolic gestures like flying pigeons, and have embraced strength, symbolized by the deployment of BrahMos missiles. This change reflects our maturity and preparedness to strike when provoked," he stated. Adv. Sethi reiterated that India's fight is not against any specific nation or civilians, but strictly against terrorism and those who nurture it. "The new India will not allow borders to act as constraints in eliminating terror threats. Whether within the country or beyond our borders, we will strike at the heart of terrorism," he declared.

He also criticized Pakistan now firmly rooted in action, for continuing to sponsor and protect terrorist elements. noting that the Pakistan Army itself has been complicit in terrorist activities, including attending funerals of militants. "This blatant support for

terrorism justifies our tough response. The world must know that India will no longer tolerate provocations," he said.

Spokesperson J&K BJP, Arun Gupta addressing press conference at Jammu on Wednesday.

He praised the Indian Armed Forces and scientists for their exceptional performance during the operation. They highlighted how India's advanced defense systems neutralized multiple threats, including Pakistan's drone incursions, and protected civilian areas effectively.

"Our forces have destroyed Pakistan's drone missions mid-air, right in front of the people of Jammu. This is a testament to the strength of our technology and preparedness," said Adv. Sethi.

Sunil Sethi clarified that Operation Sindoor has been suspended, not concluded. and that India reserves the right to resume military action should further provocation arise. "This is not the end. We are committed to completely eradicating terrorism and its infrastructure," he said. "Pakistan has been forced to kneel, despite its alliances with nations like China and Turkey."

He also emphasized that India would not accept interference from any third country. "Any future talks with Pakistan will solely focus on two issues - terrorism and

Pakistan-occupied Jammu & Kashmir (PoJK)," he assert-Dr. Tahir Choudhary took a

national narratives, particularly those coming from the United States. He pointed out that Prime Minister Modi has made all actions under Operation

Sindoor transparent to the public, showing India's commitment to democratic accountability. He said the resilience of

India's defense systems has made the world uneasy, showcasing India as a formidable

Dr. Abhijeet Jasrotia acknowledged the role of opposition parties that stood united with the Modi government. "The entire country has seen that India conducted this operation responsibly, without harming civilian areas. In contrast, Pakistan targeted innocent people. This moral high ground strengthens our position globally," he noted.

Dr. Pardeep denoted the Operation Sindoor as the portrayal of unity, strength, and national pride. "This is a new India, and we all must stand with it. 

Ex-Minister Ch Sukhnandan demands bunkers for all border residents

growing crisis along the International Border (IB) in the Jammu region, senior BJP leader and former minister Ch. Sukhnandan Kumar has made a strong appeal to the government for the immediate construction of individual bunkers for all families living in border villages. The demand came after he met a delegation of distressed villagers who shared their experiences of living under the shadow of relentless crossborder shelling.

Residents from several severely affected villages including Border village Treva, Changia, Nandpur

villager told Ch Sukhnandan Kumar that his family had just brought home his 95-year-old father after heart surgery when the area

came under heavy mortar fire. "We were lucky to escape with our lives," he said, describing how they were forced to leave their home once again.

Another border resident recounted how a shell tore through the rooftop of his house in Korotana, creating a large crater and causing extensive damage. His family had narrowly escaped because they had temporarily relocated. Similarly, many others spoke of their sleepless nights. "The walls of our home are riddled with holes from mortar fragments. We live in constant fear," they said.

The villagers expressed strong patriotic emotions during the meeting. "If given full

freedom, our Indian forces would have completed the mission and wiped out terrorism from the face of the earth," they said. "Pakistan has become a safe haven for terrorists. We want PoK back, and if Prime Minister Narendra Modi has decided on a ceasefire, we are with him. We are always ready to stand with our country."

Moved by their issues, Ch. Sukhnandan Kumar assured the villagers that he would take up their concerns with higher authorities, particularly emphasizing the need for concrete bunkers for every family in the border areas. He said such protective structures were no longer a luxury
