remains fully committed towards ensuring the highest standards of facilities and services for the pilgrims.

During his visit, the Secretary reviewed installation and functionality of various sanitation infrastructures including the toilets, washrooms, dustbins, drainage for grey water disposal, segregation of wet waste site, plas-

tic waste management site and related facilities along the Pahalgam axis.

The Secretary also examined the installation of dustbins around the Nunwan base camp and yatra route to ensure effective waste disposal, segregation of waste at source and promote cleanliness among the pilgrims. He stressed the importance of maintaining highest standards of cleanliness and called for implementation of a zero-landfill policy along the entire pilgrimage route. Pertinent to mention

here that toilets and baths are to be installed along both the Pehalgam and Baltal axes and on yatra route. Besides, the departnent is also responsible for the operation and maintenance of 1,576 already installed toilets.

The Secretary issued specific directions for effective grey water management, including construction of adequate soak pits and drainage systems to prevent water logging and ensure environmentally sustainable waste disposal practices. He emphasized the need to ensure clean, safe and efficient facilities for pilgrims, particularly in areas such as sanitation, water supply, accommodation and med-

Inspecting the arrangements on the ground, the Secretary underscored that quality service delivery and hygienic condi-

ical support.

tions are non-negotiable. He asked the officials to adopt a pilgrim-centric approach and ensure that all necessary arrangements are made promptly for the convenience and well-being of devotees.

Aijaz Asad called for immediate redressal of complaints, especially those related through $_{
m real-time}$ \mathbf{a} response system. He informed that a QR codebased feedback system had been introduced at toilet points to enable pilgrims report cleanliness status, provide feedback and support centralized tracking for improving the service delivery.

The Secretary also interacted with the field staff, sanitation workers and ground-level officers. He instructed the concerned officials to ensure that every pilgrim has access to the best possible sanitation facilities.

He urged common masses, stakeholders and employers and workers' organizations to unite against the practice by ensuring that every child receives education, security and dignity. "The Labour Department is organizing awareness camps from time to time to make the people aware

about the rights of the Children and consequences of Child Labour and also taking effective measures in connivance with other departments to eradicate this curse of Child Labour and secure the prohibition and elimination of the worst forms

of Child labour", he added. In addition, he said, the Department of Labour is making every effort to plug the loopholes which are being faced while enforcing the laws with respect to prohibition of Child Labour to make the Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir free from child labour.

He added that Child Labour is robbing many children of their basic right to live with dignity, enjoy their childhood and attain their full development potential, so, it is the responsibility of each and every person to make effort in this regard to eradicate this Child Labour.

Observed annually on June 12, the World Day Against Child Labour was launched International Organization (ILO) in 2002 to highlight the plight of child labourers worldwide. The day aims to generate

awareness and action to eliminate all forms of child labour, especially its worst forms, which include hazardous work, forced labour and exploitation. The Covid-19 pandemic exacerbated the situation for many underprivileged children, when their schools closed and their parents lost their jobs/wages. Many children who dropped out of school and who were forced to work to supplement their family income, have not returned to school.
