The group of four terrorists had been tracked for a year. They were confronted by a joint search party of the Army and police in the remote Bihali area of Basantgarh on Thursday morning, officials said. is being ensured." Replying to a question about the deployment of forces for the yatra in the region, he said, "Apart from Jammu and Kashmir Police, more than 180 companies of paramilitary forces have been deployed for the yatra."

He said that security forces have been deployed along the Jammu Kashmir National Highway from Lakhanpur to Banihal. "From road opening parties to CCTV cameras, everything has been set up, and security has also been provided at langars, lodging centres. There was no ROP (road opening party) arrangement from Lakhanpur to Jammu last year, but this year there will be ROP here as well," he said. The IGP added that starting from July 2, the traffic police will issue a daily advisory. "Cut-off timings will be fixed at all points related to yatra movement. All pilgrims who wish to participate in the yatra must follow this advisory so that there are no problems or inconveniences," he said.

He said all pilgrims are advised to join the main convoy that departs between 4:00 and 4:30 am. "Traveling individually will not be appropriate. Those travelling with the official convoy are provided with a secure environment, and it is safer to travel in an organised and protected setup," he said.

Congress glorified it's...

"This was the first betraval of democracy - when the popular choice was overruled for dynastic favoritism," Dr. Singh said, quoting Dr. Rajendra Prasad who had remarked, "Gandhiji has once again sacrificed his trusted lieutenant in favor of glamour." In a blister ing critique of historical hypocrisy, Dr. Jitendra Singh called out the Congress leadership's glorification of jail-time, pointing out that most leaders were imprisoned post-1933, under far more comfortable conditions than revolutionaries like Veer Savarkar and Comrade Dhanwantri, who endured Kala Pani. "Had Discovery of India been written before 1933, it would have been from a colonial dungeon, not a jail library," he quipped.

Dr. Jitendra Singh chronicled how Indira Gandhi was installed as Prime Minister in 1966 by K. Kamaraj under the assumption she would be a puppet. But within three years, she split the Congress, disrespected internal democracy, and laid the groundwork for authoritarianism. "Her lust for control created Sanjay Gandhi's extra-constitutional power center, where real power was usurped from democratic institutions," he said. Referring to PN Haksar who was a Kashmiri Pandit, her own Principal Secretary, Dr. Jitendra Singh quoted, "She is blind where that boy (Sanjay) is concerned," pointing to her compromised judgment in the face of dynastic emotion.

Recalling the historic student movements of 1974, Dr. Singh described how the youth of Gujarat and Bihar sparked a revolution against Indira's misrule, culminating in the Allahabad High Court's 1975 judgment that found her guilty of electoral malpractices. "Instead of stepping down, she imposed Emergency, arrested dissenters, censored the press, and suspended civil liberties," he said.

Dr. Jitendra Singh lambasted the infamous 42nd Constitutional Amendment, branding it the most "notorious assault" on India's democratic spirit. "They extended the life of Parliament from 5 to 6 years, introduced the terms secular and socialist opportunistically, and muffled every voice of dissent," he thundered.

Highlighting how this abuse extended even to Jammu and Kashmir, he said, "The Emergency allowed Congress to misuse Article 370 to extend the J&K Assembly term to six years. The reversal came only in 2019, under the leadership of PM Modi." Drawing a powerful cultural metaphor, Dr. Singh said, "Like Raj Kapoor's famous line in film 'Awara' - 'You are punishing me, but the gutter I came from still exists' - the Congress mindset of suppressing truth, glorifying dynasty, and throttling democracy still haunts us." He warned against whitewashing the past, saying, "We must remember every stain - not to glorify it, but to remind future generations who betrayed democracy. If we erase the memory of Emergency, we risk inviting its shadows again." In conclusion, Dr. Jitendra Singh gave a clarion call "If we want India's democratic journey to continue uninterrupted, we must constantly guard against those who disguise dictatorship in the garb of legacy. The Emergency may be history, but the mindset behind it is a threat that must be defeated - intellectually, politically, and democratically."

Notorious bovine smuggler booked under PSA STATE TIMES NEWS

KATHUA: In a major crackdown on organized bovine smuggling, the Jammu and Kashmir Police in Kathua, under the overall supervision of SSP Kathua, Shobhit Saksena, have apprehended a habitual offender and notorious bovine smuggler Kamal alias Kaka, son of Manohar Lal, a resident of Khanpur, Tehsil and District Pathankot (Punjab). The accused has been booked under the stringent Public Safety Act (PSA) of 1978 and lodged in Central Jail Kot Bhalwal, Jammu.

The operation was carried out by the Police Station Lakhanpur team, led by SHO Inspector Tribhawan Khajuria, under the close supervision of Additional SP Kathua Rahul Charak and DySP DAR Kathua Ritesh Samyal.

The accused Kamal @Kaka has been involved in multiple cases of bovine smuggling and criminal activities, with FIRs registered against him across various police stations in Kathua district as well as in Ghagwal. These include FIR No. 353/2023 U/S 188 IPC, 11 PCA Act (PS Kathua), FIR No. 257/2023 U/S 188 IPC, 11 PCA Act (PS Kathua), FIR No. 16/2024 U/S 188 IPC, 11 PCA Act (PS Ghagwal), and FIR No. 07/2025 U/S 223 BNS, 11 PCA Act (PS Lakhanpur)

In view of his repeated violations and to curb his illegal activities, a detailed dossier was prepared and submitted to the District Magistrate, Kathua, who issued the PSA detention warrant. Acting swiftly, Kathua Police executed the warrant today.

Drug peddler nabbed with 10.04 grms of heroin STATE TIMES NEWS

BILLAWAR: In a continued crackdown on drug trafficking, the Jammu and Kashmir Police in Billawar apprehended a drug peddler and seized 10.04 grams of heroin-like substance from his possession.

The operation was led by SHO Police Station Billawar, Inspector Zaheen Mushtaq, under the guidance of SP Operations Upper Kathua, Aumer Iqbal, and overall supervision of SSP Kathua, Shri Shobhit Saksena (IPS).

Amarnath Yatra: J&K...

Divisional Commissioner Ramesh Kumar told reporters here. These arrangements have been made by the district administrations of Kathua, Samba, Jammu, Udhampur and Ramban besides the police wings, he said.

He said community kitchens have been established with the support of voluntary organsations to provide food to the pilgrims in Kathua, Samba, Jammu, Udhampur and Ramban districts. "Sanitation facilities including toilet setup have been made at all lodgement centres in these districts too," he said.

Boarding and lodging centres have been created in Jammu city to accommodate the pilgrims in support with social organisations, he said.

Kumar said the Yatra will commence from Jammu on July 2 and Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha will flag it off from the Bhagwati Nagar base camp amid tight security arrangements. "The Yatra will formally start from Kashmir on July 3." In addition to regular registration counters, there will also be a facility for tatkal (on-the-spot) registration, which will be available at the Mata Vaishno Devi shrine, he said.

"This registration will be done based on a daily quota. There are five registration centres for this. Pilgrims who have completed their registration will be issued RFID cards for the Yatra. These RFID cards can be obtained from the Lakhanpur entry point, Samba, Jammu, Chanderkote and Banihal centres," he said.

On including all pilgrims in the Yatra convoy, he said those who have their own vehicles and are associated with the Yatra will also move along with the convoy after fulfilling all necessary formalities. Kumar said those who want to travel by private vehicles will also proeed to Kashmir under security cover. "An advisory has been issued stating that even individual pilgrims coming from outside will have to proceed along with the convoy." All of them will check in at the Bhagwati Nagar base camp in Jammu, from where they will leave daily in a convoy protected by security personnel, he said.

The divisional commissioner said this time the Amarnath Yatra will not involve travel by train. "All the arrangements for the Yatra have been completed."

The Divisional Commissioner added that in case of bad weather or the closure of the highvay, control rooms have been set to provide information to travellers in real time

He said arrangements have also been put in place for various other yatras in the region, particularly the Budha Amarnath pilgrimage in Poonch.

Replying to another question on whether the BJP is going to bring a bill in Parliament regarding this, he said, "I did not say that. I am not accredited to say that." He further said just yesterday, Dattatreya ji raised a demand for the removal of these words. "These were not part of Dr Ambedkar's original Constitution. These words are not the legacy of Dr Ambedkar. "Ambedkar gave us the best Constitution in the world. If these terms were not his idea, then whose ideology was it that inserted them?" Taking a dig at the Congress, he said the term of the Lok Sabha and state assemblies was extended under these clauses from five to six years during the Emergency.

"The Jammu and Kashmir government not only misused the Emergency provisions, they misused them twice by invoking Article 370," he said.

Ankush Medical Shop sealed for illegal drug sale STATE TIMES NEWS

UDHAMPUR: In its ongoing crackdown against the illegal sale of controlled substances, Udhampur Police, in coordination with the Assistant Controller Drugs Udhampur, sealed Ankush Medical Hall located in Garhi. The action was taken after the shop was found violating drug control regulations by selling drugs without valid prescriptions and failing to maintain proper records. During the inspection, the joint team recovered and seized 26 strips of Pregabalin capsules from the possession of the proprietor, Ankush Sharma, son of Govind Ram, a resident of Garhi. The seized drugs were being sold without corresponding sales or purchase records or any authorized medical prescriptions
