Amarnath Yatra resumes...

at higher reaches of Shri Amarnathji Shrine. There were gusts of water near the Holy Cave area and the nallah adjoining the Holy Cave," Sinha had tweeted on July 28 last year.

Jammu and Kashmir's former chief minister Farooq Abdullah had last week questioned the rationale behind setting up tents in the dry bed of the stream and demanded an inquiry to fix responsibility.

"The location of the tents and langars is such that I do not think these things were done there earlier. Panjtarni is such a nice area for this. This needs to be investigated. Maybe it is a human error," Abdullah said.

The local administration had claimed that flash floods had occurred because of cloudburst, a claim negated by the Indian Meteorological Department (IMD) which termed it as a highly localised rain event only.

"The flash floods could have been triggered due to rainfall in the higher reaches of the mountains near the Amarnath cave shrine," IMD Director General Mrutyunjay Mohapatra had said earlier.

According to the IMD, a rain event is categorised as a cloudburst if a weather station receives 100 mm of rain in one hour but the rainfall reported on Friday was 31 MM between 4:30 pm and 6:30 pm, which is quite low to be categorised as a cloudburst.

The Raj Bhavan spokesperson also dismissed the allegations that Radio Frequency Identity (RFID) cards had not been properly distributed. Some of the pilgrims had said on their return that they were never provided the RFID card.

"All yatris are provided with an RFID tag. This is for the first time RFID tag is being issued for Amarnath Yatra to ensure pilgrims' security and safety. RFID tag had proved very useful on the day of the flash flood in ascertaining how many people had crossed into the area closest to the cave," the spokesperson said.

However, he chose not to answer about the number of people who were still missing.

Officials, in the know of the developments, said the picture will be clear by Tuesday evening when the remaining debris would be cleared.

A day after the Andhra Pradesh government had said that 37 pilgrims were still missing, its Additional Resident Commissioner of AP Bhavan Himanshu Kaushik, who has been camping in Srinagar, said that 35 persons for whom "we received calls from their relatives on Andhra Pradesh helpline numbers" have been traced and are safely returning to their state.

Out of the remaining two, the body of Guniseth Sudha of Rajamahendravaram was found on Monday and was identified by her husband.

Another woman Kotha Parvati of Rajamahendravaram still remained untraced and the search for her was continuing, he added.

Flash floods near the shrine on July 8 left at least 15 people dead and more than 30 missing.

According to the officials, among the dead are six pilgrims from Rajasthan.

Two pilgrims hailing from Uttar Pradesh were cremated at Srinagar while some of the bodies of the victims who had been identified were airlifted to their native places.

Air Commodore Pankaj Mittalon on Monday said that the efforts of the first responders ensured that the number of deaths was "limited".

He said a major part of the rescue and relief operations was over and the area should be good enough to be opened for normal activities in the next two days.

"Basically, due to the initial efforts which people put in on the first day, the fatality rate and the number of casualties were really limited," he told reporters here.

"Major effort (of rescue and relief operation) has already gone through and they have already cleared the opening of the yatra again. I think in a day or two, we will be able to clear the area for anything else," he added.

The Indian Air Force (IAF) officer said the weather was the biggest challenge in the rescue and relief operations in the aftermath of the incident.

"The valley (leading to the cave shrine) being narrow and due to clouding, choppers were finding it difficult to enter," he told reporters.

He was involved in an IED attack at Larmoo Awantipora on May 2, 2022 in which two CRPF personnel got injured.

The other killed ultra Ishaq Ahmad Lone was a hybrid terrorist and was also involved in several cases including attacks on police, security forces and civilian atrocities. In this regard, a case under relevant sections of law has been registered and investigation has been initiated.

The Prime Minister's Office (PMO) said the 6.5-metre-high emblem is made of bronze and weighs 9,500 kg. It has been cast at the top of the central foyer of the building, and a supporting structure of steel weighing around 6,500 kg has been constructed to support it.

The concept sketch and process of casting of the national emblem on the roof of the new Parliament building has gone through eight different stages of preparation from clay modelling and computer graphics to bronze casting and polishing, the PMO said in a statement.

Meanwhile, several opposition parties have slammed PM Modi for unveiling the national emblem.

Criticising Modi's presence, All India Majlis-e-Ittehadul Muslimeen (AIMIM) president Asaduddin Owaisi said, "The Constitution separates powers of parliament, government & judiciary. As head of the government, the prime minister should not have unveiled the national emblem atop the new Parliament building."

The Speaker of Lok Sabha represents Lok Sabha which isn't subordinate to the government, and the prime minister has violated all constitutional norms, alleged Owaisi, who is a Lok Sabha member from Hyderabad.

In a statement, the Polit Bureau of the CPI(M) said the prime minister's action was a "clear violation of the Indian Constitution".

It said the Constitution unambiguously separates the three wings of our democracy - the Executive (government), the Legislature (Parliament and state assemblies) and the Judiciary.

Flood-like situation in parts of Gujarat after heavy rains, 6,000 people evacuated; PM calls up CM, assures help

deployed to carry out rescue operations, a government release said.

Thirteen dams have been put on 'high alert' and eight on 'alert' as their water level rose due to the heavy showers, it said.

The IMD has forecasted heavy to very heavy rainfall with isolated extremely heavy showers during the next five days in south Gujarat, and heavy downpour in central parts of the state and Saurashtra.

Ahmedabad city received 219 mm downpour on Sunday night, causing water-logging in many residential areas and flooding on underpasses and roads. Several areas in the city inundated, resulting in hardships for commuters.

Schools and colleges in the city were closed on Monday.

Narmada and Chhota Udepur districts in central Gujarat, and Surat, Tapi and Valsad in south Gujarat

have been badly affected due to the heavy downpour.

In Valsad district, a helicopter was used to rescue around 10 people from a village where they were stranded due to flooding in the Auranga river, revenue official Madhavi Mistry said.

Nearly 1,000 people were shifted to safer places from various rain-hit areas in Valsad and 15 rescued, five of them from an urban area, she said.

In Chhota Udepur district, Bodeli taluka received 549 mm rainfall and Kwant taluka 432 mm rainfall in the 24-hour period till 6 am on Monday, it said.

The state has so far received 36 per cent of its average annual rainfall, as per the data shared by the SEOC.

Attacking the government, TMC MP Jawhar Sircar said MPs, who will occupy this building, were never consulted, and alleged that "Modi will now zap us with a mediocre architecture designed by his crony architect at exorbitant costs".

COVID: 39 new...

officials said. Meanwhile, Ladakh has reported nine fresh COVID cases during the past 24 hours, taking the overall infection tally of the union territory to 28,570, officials said. All fresh cases were reported in Leh.

So far, 228 people have succumbed to COVID-19 in Ladakh. Of these, 168 deaths were reported from Leh and 60 from Kargil, according to the officials.

The officials said that there are total 57 active cases in Ladakh, all of which are in Leh. A total of 129 samples were tested in Ladakh, of which 120 cases, comprising 96 in Leh and 24 in Kargil, came out negative, they said.

Total 48 people were discharged in the last 24 hrs after being cured.

With this, the total number of recoveries in the union territory has gone to 28,285, the officials said. As many as 2,308 passengers were screened at the Leh airport while 1,486 people were screened at Khatse, and 230 at Upshi check post on highway, they added.

are the guardian angels of liberty. Liberty, as embedded in the Code, has to be preserved, protected, and enforced by the Criminal Courts. Any conscious failure by the Criminal Courts would constitute an affront to liberty," said a bench of Justices S K Kaul and M M Sundresh.

It said it is the pious duty of the Criminal Court to zealously guard and keep a consistent vision in safeguarding the constitutional values and ethos.

A criminal court must uphold the constitutional thrust with responsibility mandated on them by acting akin to a high priest, it said.

It said an investigating agency has to expedite the process of investigation as a suspect is languishing under incarceration.

"Thus, a duty is enjoined upon the agency to complete the investigation within the time prescribed and a failure would enable the release of the accused. The right enshrined is an absolute and indefeasible one.

"Such a right cannot be taken away even during any unforeseen circumstances, such as the recent pandemic," the bench said in its 85-page judgement.

It said High Courts are directed to undertake the exercise of finding out the undertrial prisoners who are not able to comply with the bail conditions so that appropriate steps under the law can be taken for their release.

It said bail applications be disposed of within two weeks except when provisions mandate otherwise while pleas for anticipatory bail be decided within six weeks.

"The Government may consider the introduction of a separate enactment in the nature of a Bail Act so as to streamline the grant of bail," the bench said while pronouncing a judgement in a case related to the arrest of a man by the CBI.

It said there is a pressing need for the introduction of an Act specifically meant for granting bail as done in various other countries like the United Kingdom.

"Our belief is also for the reason that the CrPC as it exists today is a continuation of the pre-independence one with its modifications. We hope and trust that the Government of India would look into the suggestion made in right earnest," it said.

AHMEDABAD: Several parts of districts in south and central Gujarat, including Ahmedabad, received very heavy rainfall over the last 24 hours, resulting in a flood-like situation in various low-lying areas from where over 6,000 people were shifted to safer places, officials said on Monday.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi called up Gujarat Chief Minister Bhupendra Patel and took details of the situation. He assured Patel of all possible help from the central government, the Chief Minister's Office (CMO) said in a statement.

Due to the widespread rains, 388 roads, including state highways and panchayat roads, were closed. Efforts were on to open them for the traffic. Thirteen teams of the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) and 16 of the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF) have been

and a dedicated briefing to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Defence.
