Ratna Bhandar of Puri's Jagannath temple reopened after 46 years

PURI: Ratna Bhandar, the revered treasury of the 12th-century Jagannath temple in Puri, was reopened on Sunday after 46 years for an inventory of valuables and the repair of its structure, officials said.

The members of a committee set up by the state government for the purpose entered the temple around 12 pm, and after performing rituals, the treasury was reopened, they said.

The reopening of the Ratna Bhandar became a major political issue during the recently held assembly elections in the state. Targetting the then-ruling BJD over its missing keys, the BJP had promised that it would make efforts to reopen the treasurv if it won the polls. "On the wish of Lord Jagannath, the Odia community, with the identity of 'Odia Asmita', has started making efforts to move forward," the Chief Minister's Office (CMO) said in a post on X in Odia.

"On your wish, the four gates of the Jagannath temples were earlier opened. Today, on your wish, the Ratna Bhandar was opened after 46 years for a greater purpose," it said in the post, which was shared at 1.28 pm, the auspicious moment decided to reopen the treasury. Among the 11 people present

when the treasury was reopened were former Orissa HC judge Biswanath Rath, Shree Temple Jagannath Administration (SJTA) chief administrator Arabinda Padhee, Superintendent DB Gadanayak and a representative



of Puri's titular king 'Gajapati Maharaja', officials said.

Also among them were four servitors, Patjoshi Mohapatra, Bhandar Mekap. Chadhaukarana and Deulikaran, who took care of the rituals, they said.

Though the treasury was reopened, the inventory of valuables will not be carried out immediately, Padhee said before

"The inventory work will not start today. It will be done after uers, goldsmiths and other experts. Our first priority will be to ensure the safety of the structure of the treasury. After the completion of the repair works, the valuables will be brought back and then, the process for inventory will be carried out," he added.

Padhee said three keys of the outer chamber were available -- one was with the Gaiapati Maharaj, another one was with the SJTA and the third one was with a servitor.

After the opening of the inner chamber, the original key of which was missing, it will be sealed and the new key will be kept in the district treasury under the supervision of the collector, he said.

Six wooden chests with brass interiors were brought to the temple for moving the valuables. The chests, made of teak wood, were 4.5 feet in length. 2.5 feet in height and 2.5 feet in breadth, an official said.

"The temple authority on July 12 had asked us to build 15 such chests. After working for 48 hours, we have completed six chests," said one of the workers who made them.

The idols of the sibling deities of Lord Jagannath, Lord Balabhadra and Goddess Subhadra are at present in the Gundicha temple where they were taken during Rath Yatra on July 7. NMC urges PM to appoint Ashok Lavasa as Chairman of 8th Pay Commission

JAMMU: President, Mazdoor National Conference (NMC), Subash Shastri, on Sunday urged Prime Minister Narendra Modi to immediately appoint Ashok Lavasa as chairman and other members of the 8th Pay Commission, with an announcement to be made by the Union Finance Minister during the presentation of the union budget in Parliament on July 23, 2024. Shastri emphasized that establishing the pay commission would resolve the confusion and uncertainty among employees and pensioners on this issue once and for all.

Addressing NMC workers, Shastri noted that, except for the 7th Pay Commission, all previous commissions were constituted in the third year of every decade as per past practice.

He stressed that the notification for the 8th Pay Commission is urgent, as it will impact about one crore employees and pensioners in both central and state governments.

He suggested that the commission should expedite its report so that implementation can occur before the due date of January 1, 2026. Shastri called for the

immediate merger of 50% of Dearness Allowance (DA) into the basic pay and pension and advocated for a 20% interim relief to be sanctioned quickly to help employees and pensioners cope with rising prices and inflation.

Additionally, he urged the Prime Minister to restore the old pension scheme in

place of the National Pension System (NPS), highlighting that states like Himachal Pradesh. Rajasthan, Punjab, and Karnataka have already reinstated the old pension scheme for their employees.

Shastri expressed hope that the new NDA government at the Centre would take positive steps in this regard. Shastri also appealed to the Prime Minister to release 18 months of pending DA arrears and regularize daily wagers who have completed seven years of service as of March 2024, proposing that their monthly emoluments be raised to Rs. 18,000.

Other demands included clearing all pending GP fund and gratuity cases, setting up a Labor Welfare Board, implementing all Central Labour Laws in UT J&K, and granting a medical allowance of Rs. 1000 per month to pensioners, on par with the Central
