NEW DELHI: The CBSE is in a dilemma over scheduling the two rounds of board examinations as recommended in the new National Curriculum Framework (NCF) - its options being January-February, March-April and June.

Another option the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) is exploring is a semester system involving biannual exams. Currently, the board exams for Classes 10 and 12 are conducted in February-

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM: Kerala can expect to receive moderate to heavy rainfall with thunder and lightning for the next five days, the India Meteorological Department said on Wednesday as it issued a red alert for one district

The IMD said that a low pressure belt from the north Kerala coast to Gujarat and strong westerly-north westerly winds along the coast of the southern state were the reasons for the expected

moderate to heavy rains in the coming days. The red alert was sounded in Wayanad and

orange alerts in Pathanamthitta, Kottayam, Ernakulam, Idukki, Malappuram, Kozhikode, Kannur and Kasaragod districts for the day.

It also issued a yellow alert in the remaining five

districts of the state for the day. A red alert indicates heavy to extremely heavy rain of over 20 cm in 24 hours, while an orange alert means very heavy rain (6 cm to 20 cm). A yellow alert means heavy rainfall between 6 to 11cm. As heavy rains caused landslides, property damage, waterlogging of roads and flooding of acres of farmland, the Central Water Commission (CWC) issued a warning about a dangerous rise

in levels of various rivers in the southern state. The CWC issued warnings with regard to a dangerous rise in water levels of various rivers. including Achankovil in Pathanamthitta and Thodupuzha in Idukki districts of the state.

It cautioned people living close to the rivers to be careful. The Kerala State Disaster Management Authority (KSDMA) advised people to be careful in view of the strong winds accompanying the



heavy rains in the state.

The IMD, meanwhile, cautioned fishermen against venturing into the sea for fishing in the Kerala, Karnataka and Lakshadweep coastal areas from July 17 to July 21 due to the possibility of bad weather and strong winds.

In Ernakulam, a home was damaged in a landslide, but no one was injured and the family living there was moved to a safe location, the district administration said.

The Kottayam district administration said that 45 people were moved to camps following incessant rains there throughout Tuesday night.

Kerala Pradesh Congress Committee (KPCC) chief K Sudhakaran, in a statement, urged party workers and members to aid in relief work where people have suffered property damage and other losses due to the heavy rains. He also urged the Youth Congress, the Kerala Students Union to come forward and help in the relief work. There should be a strong presence of Congress workers wherever help is needed, he said.

Former chief minister late Manohar Parrikar had emphasised on the pre-audit of roadshows and that accountability parameters should be framed, he said. Earlier, only Goa used to participate in these events but now Ladakh and states like Madhva Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, Karnataka are attending the international marts, he noted.

Policy (NEP) 2020, the new NCF proposed a semester system for students of Classes 11 and 12.

cessfully launching the "Cooperation among Cooperatives" initiative in two districts on a pilot basis, the Gujarat government has decided to implement it across all 33 districts of the state, officials said on Wednesday

The initiative aims to enhance the cooperation among Gujarat's thousands of cooperative societies by centralising their bank accounts and deposits in various district and state coop-

The initiative was envisioned by Union Cooperation Minister Amit Shah and launched on a pilot basis in Banaskantha Panchmahal districts of Gujarat, the state government said in a statement.

Gujarat Cooperation Jagdish Vishwakarma said the success of the pilot project has led the government to decide on implementing the initiative across all 33 districts of Guiarat.

As part of the pilot project in these two districts, over 4 lakh new accounts were opened by cooperative societies and their active members in the district cooperative banks, resulting in a jump of over Rs 966 crore in the bank deposits, it said.

ATMs were installed at cooperative societies in these two districts, it said.

"The district cooperative banks will be able to extend their services on the village level and ensure that the capital and funds of Guiarat cooperatives' stay within the community and come to the aid of other cooperative societies," Vishwakarma said.

"The initiative consolidates the existing bank accounts of cooperatives and their members operating in various commercial banks and brings them under a centralised discooperative banks," the government said.

This helps consolidate the collective capital of these cooperative societies under one centralised bank, resulting in enhanced deposit pool for loans and increased financial liquidity among cooperatives.

This helps address the credit needs of the cooperative societies and ensure that the collective capital of cooperatives comes to the dedicated use of other cooperatives, Vishwakarma said.

"In this way, the capital and deposit of one successful cooperative society comes to the use of other societies, benefiting the entire cooperative sector of Guiarat." he launched between June 2023 to January 2024 in two districts, the government said in its statement.

During the pilot project period, the existing bank accounts held by 1,048 milk societies were consolidated into the district co-operative banks along with the complete transfer of surplus funds into their new bank accounts.

The two districts saw the opening of over 4.7 lakh new savings accounts in cooperative banks, enhancing the existing deposits of these banks by a whopping Rs 966crore, it said.

A total of 3.32 lakh RuPay debit cards were also issued to the societies and their active members, it said.

In order to enhance banking facilities and financial liquidity at village level, a total of 1,736 societies in these districts, including prominent milk societies affiliated with dairy unions, were also equipped with micro-ATMs and affiliated as "Bank Mitra".

To help members access financial services, over 1,631 employees associated with the cooperative societies were given a comprehensive training on digital transactions, including micro-ATM operations, cash withdrawals, and

NEW DELHI: More than 14,000 child marriages have been prevented across 265 districts in 17 states and Union Territories by civil society, a report by an NGO

According to the report by the India Child Protection (ICP) research team which was released by child rights Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR). 59,364 child marriages were prevented with the help of panchayats in 2023-24.

The report said the Rajasthan High Court, in one of its judgments, held panchayats accountable for child marriage, which resulted in a significant decline in child marriage cases reported on Akshaya Tritiya. "Across India, 161 civil

society organisations in 265 districts throughout 17 states and Union Territories successfully prevented 14.137 child 2023-2024 by using legal interventions and prevented 59,364 child marriages with the help of panchayats," the

The total number of child marriage cases registered during the last five years (3,863) is less than the number of girl child marriages taking place in a single day (4,442)

On average, only one case of child marriage per district was registered for prosecution in 2022. National Crime

Records Bureau (NCRB) data shows that out of 63.513 children who were kidnapped or abducted and recovered in 2022, 15,748 (25 per cent) were kidnapped or abducted for the purpose of either 'marriage' 'intercourse'. Of this, 15,142 children recovered in 2022 were kidnapped solely for the purpose of marriage. In 2022, 13,981 cases were reported for the offence of

kidnapping of minor girls to compel them for marriage, compared to 11.236 in 2020. This highlights a 24 per cent increase in the number of minor girls being kidnapped or abducted for the purpose of marriage during 2020-22. In 2022, out of the total 3,563 child marriage cases listed for trial in courts

under the Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, merely 181 cases were successfully concluded in terms of trial completion.

This "slow" disposal rate has resulted in a persistently high pendency rate, which stands at 92 per cent. Despite the fact that there are only 3,365 cases pending, with the current rate of disposal, the country may take 19 years to clear the backlogs as of 2022, it said.

The conviction rate in filed under the Prohibition of Child Marriage Act is an area of concern, given its "disheartening" statistics. In 2022, merely 11 per cent of these cases resulted in convictions. contrasting sharply with the overall conviction rate of 34 per cent for all crimes committed against children in that year, the report said.

The ICP research team collected primary data from a sample of 1,132 random villages across 20 districts of Assam, encompassing a total population of 21 lakh and a child population of eight

The report said there was

81 per cent reduction in the instances of child marriage between 2021-22 and 2023-24. In absolute numbers, the incidents of child marriages in the study villages declined from 3,225 cases in 2021-22 to 627 cases in 2023-24.

In 30 per cent of the villages surveyed in Assam, child marriage has been completely eradicated. Additionally, 40 per cent of villages reported a significant decline in child mar-About 98 per cent of the

respondents believed that the Assam government's strict law enforcement initiatives in 2023 had a substantial and striking influence on the reduction of child marriages within their communities. The overwhelming majority

of respondents acknowledged the effectiveness of stringent enforcement measures in curbing child marriages.

In 12 districts, out of 20, over 90 per cent of respondents believe that taking legal action such as arresting individuals and filing FIRs in cases related to child marriage can effectively address

Overall, the same percentage for all 20 districts stands at 72 per cent. This community validation reinforces the need for sustained and rigorous prosecution strategies to address and eliminate child marriage completely.

The report recommended fast track special courts to be created to clear the backlog of child marriage cases.

In situations where parents, guardians, or panchayats have provided an undertaking, the punishment should be doubled and treated as equivalent to criminal conspiracy for rape, it said.

A specific provision should be made for the rehabilitation of victims and survivors of child marriage, treating them on par with survivors of child sexual abuse, the report suggested.

A special scheme should be introduced focusing on skill development and economic stability for women who choose to leave child marriages and central nortal run by the Ministry of Home Affairs to report child marriages with an urgent "Rapid Action Response Protocol", it

IAF tells SC it has deposited compensation to HIV positive veteran

NEW DELHI: An Indian Air Force (IAF) soldier, who contracted AIDS due to transfusion of contaminated blood at a military hospital in Jammu and Kashmir's Samba in 2002, has received Rs 18 lakh and the residual amount of over Rs 1.41 crore awarded to him as compensation has been deposited with the apex court registry. the IAF has informed the Supreme Court. The apex court, in a judgement delivered on September 26 last year on a plea by the veteran, had directed the IAF to pay him around Rs 1.5 crore as compensation.

The former soldier had taken during "Operation Parakram", launched in the aftermath of the terrorist attack on Indian Parliament on December 13, 2001, and was admitted to the hospital where he had to be administered one unit of blood.

The top court had in April this year dismissed a plea seeking review of its September 2023 judgement in the matter.

The veteran's petition alleging

contempt of the directions issued by the top court in its 2023 verdict came up for hear-

Tuesday. Additional Solicitor General (ASG) Vikramjit Banerjee said they have filed a compliance affidavit in the matter.

The bench, also comprising Justices Sanjay Karol and K V Viswanathan, observed that the amount deposited in the court registry be released to the veteran. An advocate, who is assisting the top court as an amicus curiae in the matter, spoke about the soldier's regular medical check-up and said the bench can consider referring him to the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS),

Delhi, for it. The bench said since the man resides in Ajmer, a good medical facility can be found in Jaipur to ensure he is not inconvenienced.

It asked the amicus to discuss the issue with the ASG so that it can be sorted out and posted the matter for hearing after two weeks. On March 5, the apex

court had directed that an amount of Rs 18 lakh towards attendant expenses be paid to the man and the remainder be deposited in the court's registry within two weeks.

The bench had also directed that his disability be considered as 100 per cent for paying him

the disability pension. In its 2023 verdict, the apex court had said, "It is held that the appellant is entitled to compensation, calculated at Rs 1.54.73.000 towards compensation on account of medical negligence of the respondents, who are held liable for the injury suffered by the appel-

It had said since individual liability cannot be assigned, the respondent organisations (IAF and Indian Army) are held vicariously liable, jointly and sev-

lant.

"The amount shall be paid to the appellant within six weeks by the IAF, his employer; it is open to the IAF to seek reimbursement, to the extent of half the sum, from the Indian Army. All arrears related to disability pension too shall be disbursed to the appellant within the said six weeks period," the apex court had said

The top court had passed the verdict on an appeal by the IAF veteran who challenged an order of the National Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission (NCDRC) rejecting his claim for compensation.

LUCKNOW: Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath on Wednesday met ministers from the state at his residence here to discuss the upcoming Assembly bypolls in 10 constituencies.

The floods in the state, which have so far affected more than 700 villages across 17 districts, were also discussed during the meeting. The meeting comes weeks

after the Lok Sabha elections in which the ruling BJP performed poorly. The party was reduced to 33 seats, a drop of 29 seats from 2019.

The INDIA bloc gained ground with the Samajwadi Party (SP) securing a win on 37 seats, a jump of 32 seats as compared to 2019, and the Congress winning on six seats.

"The meeting today was especially held to discuss the upcoming elections and we will win all the 10 assembly seats where by-elections are to be held." Finance Minister Suresh Khanna said after the meeting.

All the Uttar Pradesh cabinet ministers and ministers of

state were present in the meeting, sources said.

Jal Shakti Swatantra Dev Singh, who also attended the meeting, said "discussions were held on floods along with developmental works". The 10 assembly seats, which

are set to go to bypolls, are Katehari (Ambedkar Nagar), Karhal (Mainpuri), Milkipur (Avodhva), Meerapur (Muzaffarnagar), Ghaziabad, Majhawan (Mirzapur), Sisamau (Kanpur Nagar), Khair (Aligarh), Phulpur (Prayagraj) and Kundarki (Moradabad). Nine of the 10 seats fell vacant after the MLAs resigned following their victory in the Lok Sabha polls.

Prominent among these seats was Karhal (Mainpuri), which fell vacant after SP chief Akhilesh Yadav resigned following his elections to the Lok Sabha from Kannauj.

SP's Irfan Solanki's Sisamau assembly seat in Kanpur Nagar was declared vacant following his disqualification in view of his seven-year imprisonment by MP/MLA court.
