Action on Loose FASTag

ASTag, introduced by the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI), has brought a digital transformation in toll collection across the country. Using RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) technology, FASTags enable automatic toll deductions directly from a prepaid or linked bank account as the vehicle passes through a toll plaza. The aim was to reduce traffic congestion, enhance transparency, and promote cashless transactions. However, the rising misuse of FASTags in the form of 'loose FASTag' has become a growing concern.

A 'loose FASTag' refers to a tag that is not permanently affixed to the vehicle's windshield, as required. Instead, it is kept unattached or loosely placed inside the vehicle, enabling it to be misused. In many cases, a single FASTag is shared among multiple vehicles, either by passing it around physically or using it only when passing toll plazas. This undermines the core idea of linking each FASTag uniquely to a vehicle's registration, enabling toll fraud and identity concealment.

Such misuse has serious consequences. For one, it results in revenue loss to NHAI and toll operators, which can hamper road maintenance and infrastructure development. Secondly, it creates loopholes in law enforcement. In cases involving stolen vehicles or criminal activity, tracing a vehicle becomes challenging if the FASTag data does not match the actual vehicle used. It also compromises the integrity of traffic and transport data used for planning and audits.

The use of loose FASTags is a clear violation of government regulations. According to NHAI guidelines, a FASTag must be permanently affixed to a vehicle's windshield and linked to its registration number. Any deviation may lead to deactivation of the tag, imposition of fines, or even legal action in cases of deliberate fraud. The growing trend of non-compliance, if unchecked, can erode public trust in the FASTag system and discourage digital adoption.

To address this issue, authorities are introducing a range of technological and administrative measures. ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) cameras are being deployed at toll plazas to match number plates with FASTag accounts in real-time. GPS tracking in commercial vehicles is being considered to monitor tag usage and detect inconsistencies. Additionally, tamper-proof FASTags that cannot be removed without deactivation are also being explored to prevent their misuse.

Public awareness plays a crucial role in curbing this malpractice. Many users, especially in rural and commercial segments, may not be fully aware of the rules surrounding FASTag usage. Awareness campaigns by NHAI and traffic authorities can help educate users about the importance of proper usage, legal implications, and the collective benefits of a streamlined toll system.

What makes Shakarmarg truly special is its unmatched biodiversity and natural charm. This region boasts a cluster of high-altitude alpine lakes, including yet-undocumented glacial lakes that rival those in Kashmir Valley and Ladakh. These lakes, tucked within the folds of Pir Panjal, reflect the sky like mirrors and offer a surreal trekking experience. The lush green meadows that stretch over vast acres are carpeted with vibrant seasonal wildflowers, aromatic herbs, and medicinal plants, creating a natural tapestry of colors and scents that few places in India can rival.

Moreover, Shakarmarg is home to a diverse range of bird species, many of which are rare and endemic to the Himalayas. From the melodic Himalayan Monal to migratory birds crossing from Central Asia, this region offers tremendous potential for birdwatchers and

ornithologists. Botanists and environmentalists will also find the unique flora in this region scientifically and economically important. Beyond its natural assets, the peaks surrounding Shakarmarg offer world-class opportunities for mountaineering, rock climbing, camping, and paragliding - making it a hotspot for adventure tourism.

Equally important is the socio-cultural and historical fabric of Darhal and the surrounding villages. The people here are warm, hospitable, and deeply connected with their land and traditions. Promoting tourism in this region would not only boost the local economy but also empower tribal and rural communities through homestay programs, ecotourism jobs, handicraft markets, and local entrepreneurship. It would help preserve indigenous knowledge systems and traditional ecological practices passed down through generations. Additionally, the region has spiritual significance, and many locations in the higher reaches are revered by the local population, offering potential for spiritual and wellness-based tourism.

Despite this immense promise, Shakarmarg suffers from severe infrastructural neglect. The lack of a proper motorable road, insufficient marketing, lack of base camps, trekking infrastructure, digital connectivity, tourist rest houses, and security arrangements keep this paradise hidden. The current road connecting Rajouri to Darhal and beyond towards Shakarmarg remains single-laned, patchy, and underdeveloped. Tourists, researchers, and even locals face great difficulty in accessing this region. It is imperative that the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways prepares a Detailed Project Report (DPR) on an urgent basis for the upgradation and double-laning of the Rajouri-Darhal-Shakarmarg Road, including blacktopping, safety measures, drainage systems, and scenic viewpoint stops.

A world-class road, once constructed, will open up the entire upper Pir Panjal belt to tourism, trade, and development. This will not only serve Shakarmarg but also facilitate connectivity to nearby villages, border tourism circuits, and winter sports zones. The improved infrastructure will attract national and international tourists, generate employment, and enhance the region's inclusion in the UT's overall tourism policy. The introduction of proper signboards, helipads, mountain rescue teams, eco-camps, and solar-based eco-lodges will ensure both safety and sustainability.

I also request the Union Ministry of Tourism to include Shakarmarg in its list of priority destinations under schemes such as PRASHAD (Pilgrimage Rejuvenation and Spiritual Augmentation Drive) Parvat Mala and Swadesh Darshan, focused on promoting eco and cultural tourism circuits. A focused marketing campaign under "Incredible India" and "Visit Jammu" should be launched, including digital videos, short documentaries, Instagram reels, and adventure travel blogs highlighting Shakarmarg's natural allure.

Furthermore, I urge the Government of Jammu and Kashmir to organize an annual Shakarmarg Adventure Festival, featuring trekking expeditions, bird-watching tours, village fairs, cultural performances, and photography contests to bring this region into the national spotlight. Collaborations with private travel firms, academic researchers, NGOs, and international conservation groups will bring in further visibility and accountability.

I also appeal to the LG Administration and UT Tourism Department to establish a Shakarmarg Tourism Development Authority (STDA), with a focused mandate to plan, promote, and manage tourism in the area through a sustainable lens. This authority can ensure long-term planning, waste management, land use regulation, eco-lodge certification, and the preservation of fragile ecosystems. With responsible and inclusive planning, Shakarmarg can become a model for how untouched Himalayan regions can be opened for tourism without compromising their environmental and cultural sanctity.

Hon'ble LG Sir and Respected Ministers, this is not just a call for development-it is a plea to recognize a forgotten paradise. The economic upliftment, national integration, ecological conservation, and strategic value of Shakarmarg Darhal are immense. With just the right infrastructural push and administrative attention, this jewel of Pir Panjal can transform into a global tourism destination, bringing prosperity not only to Rajouri district but also to the entire Jammu region.

arhal Malkan, fondly known as Darhal Valley, is a serene retreat nestled in the Peer Panjal region, approximately 19 km north of Rajouri town and 160 km from Jammu in the Indian Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir. Home to nearly 40,000-45,000 residents, this bowl-shaped valley, situated at an elevation of 915 meters (3,001 feet), is a haven for adventure tourism. It beckons those seeking to reconnect with nature and escape the relentless pace of modern life, filled with physical and psychological challenges. Encircled by gently sloping mountains adorned with lush coniferous forests, the valley's beauty is amplified by the perennial Darhal River, which carves it into two near-equal halves

Geography and Climate

Darhal Valley enjoys a moderate to cool climate, often more pleasant than Jammu or Srinagar Historical data of the annual tempera-

Reachable in approximately one hour from Doodh Chamb/Milky waterfall, this gem is nestled amidst towering conifers and lush vegetation, which enhance the area's breathtaking beauty. The misty droplets of its cascading waters create a soothing ambiance, offering a perfect refuge for those yearning to reconnect with nature.

Aadangi Waterfall's tranquil setting and refreshing mist provide a calming escape, melting away stress and rejuvenating the mind. Demographics and History

Spanning 92 square kilometers, Darhal Valley is a rural tehsil in Rajouri District, established in 2004, comprising 12 villages. The Malik community, primarily of Rajput descent, dominates the region, with historical ties to the Mughal era when they, alongside the Thakkars of Sagrawat village, were tasked with guarding passes into Kashmir.

Among these natural wonders, Abdullah Waterfall, Khoriwali Chamm, Khoddan wala Cham, Khori Nar Waterfall, Doodh Chammb, Neela Chamb, Aadangi Waterfall and Khund Waterfallstand out as must-visit destinations, each offering a unique experience for adventurers and nature lovers alike.

Abdullah Waterfall: A Gem of Darhal

Now, a short 10-15minute trek from the road leads visitors to the base of this stunning cascade, where the sight of water plunging down the rocky cliffs creates a mesmerizing spectacle with magical impact.

Abdullah Waterfall's blend of natural beauty, historical significance and improved accessibility has cemented its status as Darhal's premier destination. Whether you're a seasoned hiker or a casual sightseer, this waterfall promises an unforgettable experience, inviting all to witness the serene power of nature in the heart of Darhal.

Khoriwali Chamm: A Hidden Cascade

Another captivating destination in Darhal is Khoriwali Chamm, located along the Khoriwali-Barmiwali road, just under a kilometre from the Government Middle School Khoriwali.
