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Series of measures directed to combat spread of dengue: Delhi health minister

NEW DELHI: Delhi Health Minister Saurabh Bhardwaj on Tuesday said he has directed a series of measures to combat the spread of dengue in the national capital. "We have requested that warnings and awareness announcements be made across all metro stations, bus stations and other public transport hubs to inform people about dengue prevention," the minister said. Emphasising that it is very important that all government hospitals in the city are fully equipped to handle dengue cases, Bhardwaj said he directed several actions to the health secretary but was unsure if those steps have been implemented. "I have directed the health secretary to visit one government hospital each day to check that all necessary dengue-related equipment is available. However, I'm uncertain if these visits have commenced. If not, I will personally visit the hospitals and ensure compliance," the AAP minister said. Bhardwaj alleged that whenever there is a major crisis in Delhi, documentation has revealed that Lt Governor V K Saxena is behind it. Highlighting the Asha Kiran shelter home case, where 14 inmates died in July, the minister said investigation has revealed that there was a shortage of doctors and paramedics. "The responsibility for appointments lies with the LG. Since becoming a minister, I have written dozens of letters to the LG regarding the 30 per cent vacancies," Bhardwaj said.

Safety of healthcare professionals: NTF meets for first time, to hold wider consultations

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court-appointed panel to formulate a protocol for the safety and security of healthcare professionals met for the first time on Tuesday and decided to hold wider consultations with stakeholders to identify issues that need prioritisation and draft a framework to address them. The 10-member National Task Force (NTF) was constituted after the apex court last week took suo motu cognisance of the alleged rape and murder of a trainee doctor at the state-run RG Kar Medical College and Hospital in Kolkata which sparked nationwide protests. The NTF members deliberated on some of the inputs and representations that it has received for improving the safety, security and working conditions of healthcare workers at medical establishments, sources said. "It was decided that the NTF will interact further with stakeholders such as the IMA, resident doctors associations concerned because it is important to know their viewpoints and hear them out besides reading the representations. Also there is a limited timeline so the draft need to be ready as soon as possible," a source said. "We have already deliberated on some of the inputs but we would expand those and hold deliberations further to



make it more inclusive and comprehensive so that we have clarity on the issues that need prioritisation as well as implementation map and definite framework," the source added. Besides, it was also decided that the Union Health Ministry will start a portal where all stakeholders can give their inputs and views on the issue. The Union Health Ministry last Wednesday had issued an office memorandum mentioning the terms of reference for the NTF according to which it shall formulate effective recommendations to remedy the issues of concern pertaining to safety, working conditions and well-being of medical professionals and other related matters. The apex court had asked the NTF to formulate an action plan under two sub-heads - 'Preventing violence, including gender-based violence, against medical professionals and providing safe working conditions', and 'Prevention of sexual violence against medical professionals'. Under the 'prevention of violence against medical professionals and providing safe working conditions' to ensure due security in medical establishments, there has to be training of departments and places within the hospital based on the degree of volatility and the possibility of violence, according to the terms of reference. Areas such as the emergency rooms and the intensive care units are prone to a greater degree of violence and may possibly need additional security in place to deal with any untoward incident, it said. The NTF will look into putting in place a baggage and person screening system at every entrance of a hospital to ensure that arms are not carried inside the medical establishment and also to prevent intoxicated persons from entering the

premises of the medical establishment, unless they are patients. As far as infrastructural development is concerned, there should be provision of separate resting rooms and duty rooms in each department for male and female doctors, and male and female nurses; and a gender-neutral common resting space. The rooms must be well-ventilated, have sufficient bed spaces, and provide a facility for drinking water. Access to these rooms must be restricted through installation of security devices, the document said. Besides, the NTF would also focus on adopting appropriate technological intervention to regulate access to critical and sensitive areas, including through use of biometric and facial recognition. The terms of reference include ensuring adequate lighting at all places in a hospital and, if it is attached to a medical college, all places within the campus and installation of CCTV cameras at all the entrance and exit points of the hospital, and the corridors leading up to all patient rooms. If the hostels or rooms of the medical professionals are away from the hospital, there should be provision of transport between 10 pm to 6 am to those who wish to travel to or from their place of stay to the hospital. There should be employment of social workers trained in grief and crisis counselling at all medical establishments. Under the other sub-head for the prevention of sexual violence against medical professionals, the document underlined that the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act 2013 applies to hospitals and nursing homes (including private health providers). In terms of the provisions of the Act, an Internal Complaints Committee must be constituted in all hospitals and nursing homes. The phrase 'medical professionals' encompasses every medical professional including doctors, medical students who are undergoing their compulsory rotating medical internship (CRMI) as a part of the MBBS course, resident doctors and senior resident doctors, and nurses (including those who are nursing interns), the document said. The 10 members of the task force include Vice Admiral Arti Sarin, Director General (Medical Services), Dr D Nageshwar Reddy, Chairman and Managing Director, Asian Institute of Gastroenterology and AIG Hospitals, Hyderabad, Dr M Srinivas, AIIMS-Delhi Director and Dr Pratima Murthy, Director, National Institute of Mental Health and Neurosciences, Bengaluru.

MP: BJP files complaint against Congress for posting 'false information' on woman sarpanch's caste

BHOPAL: The BJP in Madhya Pradesh's Satna district has lodged a police complaint against the Congress for allegedly spreading false information about the caste of a woman sarpanch, who earlier alleged that she was not allowed to hoist the national flag and not offered a chair during a village meeting. The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) claimed that the woman in question belongs to the Other Backward Classes (OBC) category and was not a Dalit as claimed by the grand old party. The claims by the two parties came in the wake of the allegations made by Shradha Singh, the sarpanch of Akouna village panchayat that during the Independence Day celebrations on August 15, she was not allowed to hoist the tricolour and also not given a chair to sit during a gram sabha. BJP's Satna mandal general secretary Keshav Kori on Monday filed the complaint against the Congress for "posting a message on the issue to mislead people by describing her as a Dalit leader while in reality she belongs to the OBC community". In a post on X, the Congress on Monday claimed, "A Dalit woman sarpanch of Akouna village



was not given a chair to sit in a meeting. When she demanded the chair, those present in the meeting asked her to bring the chair from her home or sit on the floor." "Earlier also she was not allowed to hoist the flag as she belongs to the Dalit community. It is a very serious issue and stern action should be taken against the accused persons" the party said. However, state BJP's organisation general secretary Hitanand Sharma said on X, "Sarpanch and sachiv (secretary) both belong to the same caste - Kurmi - and it is possible that they might have differences among themselves. Therefore, this (issue) should not be given any caste angle to mislead the people." In the complaint to the City Kotwali police station in Satna, Kori demanded a probe against Congress leaders for posting a misleading message on social media and registration of a case against them. However, acting on the media reports and woman sarpanch Shradha Singh's allegations on the issue in a video message on social media, chief executive officer (CEO) of Satna District Panchayat, Sanjana Jain, issued a show-cause notice to Akouna village panchayat secretary. After recording statements of all concerned, the CEO in her report said that Shradha Singh reached the place for hoisting the national flag after 9 am instead of the scheduled time of 8 am. The organisers also called her three times on her phone, but she didn't turn up till 9 am, following which the deputy sarpanch hoisted the national flag. The probe also revealed that she was offered a chair to sit in the programme.

6,960 poachers arrested for killing, trafficking 2,869 wild animals in last 10 yrs: Minister

BHUBANESWAR: More than 6,900 poachers were arrested for killing and trafficking of 2,869 wildlife animals during the past 10 years, Forest, Environment and Climate Change Minister Ganesh Ram Singhkhuntia told the Odisha Assembly on Tuesday. While replying to a question from Congress legislator Taraprasad Bahinipati, the minister said the law enforcement authorities have arrested 6,960 poachers during the last 10 years and seized different body parts of wild animals including skins, nails and horns of tigers, bear, deer, sambar and other wild lives, elephant tusks, and pangolins from them. While the seized elephant tusks have been stored at the state government's treasury, the other seized items have been preserved at the forest range offices, he said. The government has formed a joint task force comprising officials of forest and police departments to examine the wild animal poaching cases and take necessary steps, he stated. In another written statement to the House, the Forest minister said there are 54 endangered species



including 17 species of reptiles, 15 species of birds and 22 species of mammals that have been identified in Odisha, as per the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red Data Book. To protect wild animals in their natural habitat 19 sanctuaries, one national park, two tiger reserves, three elephant reserves and one biosphere reserve have been constituted in the state, he said. Anti-poaching and anti-smuggling squads equipped with vehicles, arms, and communication networks have been deployed at vulnerable points to prevent poaching and monitor the movement of suspected poachers, the minister said. Similarly, forest field staff are being trained to improve intelligence gathering in order to prevent

Women's rights groups demand justice amidst rising sexual violence

NEW DELHI: Amidst a series of rape cases reported from multiple states, women's rights groups have issued a joint statement seeking expeditious investigation and action, and demanding an end to sexual crimes and gender-based violence. The All India Dalit Mahila Adhikar Manch (AIDMAM), All India Democratic Women's Association (AIDWA), All India Mahila Samskritik Sanghatan (AIMSS), All India Progressive Women's Association (AIPWA), All India Feminist Alliance (ALIFA), All India Lawyers' Association for Justice (ALLAJ) are among the 35 organisations who have made the appeal. The outcry comes in the wake of shocking incidents of sexual violence from various parts of the country including Kolkata, Manipur, Gujarat, Uttarakhand, Bihar, and Uttar Pradesh, with the statement saying they are each a grim reminder of the ongoing threat to women's safety in India. The immediate catalyst for this voice of protest is the alleged rape and murder of a 31-year-old medical practitioner at the RG Kar Hospital and Medical College in Kolkata. The statement said the case has



drawn widespread condemnation, not only for the brutality of the crime but also for the subsequent "cover-up" by the institution and authorities. It sharply criticised the response of elected representatives and government officials, accusing them of politicising these tragedies rather than ensuring justice. The groups argue that the focus should be on the effective functioning of criminal investigation, law enforcement, and governance, rather than on just empty rhetoric or draconian measures like the death penalty, which they assert has been proven ineffective in deterring crime. The statement particularly criticised the Mamata Banerjee-led West Bengal

government for its handling of the Kolkata case. The statement condemns the state's initial attempts to "dismiss" the crime as a suicide and its transfer of key hospital officials amidst nationwide protests. The government's actions, including the controversial transfer of 43 doctors and professors, are seen as efforts to silence those demanding justice, the statement said. The groups urged the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI), now investigating the Kolkata case, to conduct a fair and unbiased investigation, free from political influence. The statement also highlights the challenges of securing justice in an environment where the govern-

ment has been accused of releasing and even honouring individuals convicted of heinous crimes, such as those involved in the Bilkis Bano case, the Kathua case, and the violence in Manipur. The statement draws attention to the "failure" of both state and central governments to ensure the effective implementation of laws designed to protect women. Despite the existence of mechanisms to monitor these laws, the groups argue that they are often ignored, creating a climate of impunity that allows gender-based violence to continue unabated. The activists emphasise that the issue goes beyond individual cases, pointing to the structural violence root-

ed in patriarchy, caste, class, and other oppressive systems that disproportionately affect women, particularly those from marginalised communities. They cite data from the National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB), which reports an average of 86 rapes per day in India, with a national conviction rate as low as 27 per cent. The statement also criticises the recent budget allocations, questioning the lack of funding for monitoring the implementation of key protective laws. The Ministry of Women and Child Development's refusal to disclose whether mandated mechanisms are in place and functioning is seen as further evidence of governmental neglect, the statement said. In their call to action, the groups demand not only justice for the victims but also a systemic change. They also called for a fair trial process, and urged the Supreme Court to ensure accountability for the failures of institutions, elected representatives, and law-enforcement agencies. The statement concludes with an appeal to break the silence around sexual violence, challenge patriarchal structures, and stand up for justice and accountability. The time for change, they insisted, is now.
