He described the current environment as "chaotic and unsustainable," asserting that the authorities were pushing the transport sector toward collapse through arbitrary enforcement and lack of empathy.

He demanded an immediate and time-bound review of such actions, warning that continued inaction would provoke intensified agitation from transporters across the Union Territory.

Parvinder Singh, Chief

JAMMU: A meeting of the Jammu Chapter INTACH (Indian National Trust for Art and Cultural Heritage) was held under the chairmanship of S.M. Sahni, Convenor, where members expressed serious concern over the manner in which the two-hundred-vearold Balram Ji Temple at Dhounthly is being con-

served by PWD (R&B). Members noted that the ongoing work is not in consonance with the established guidelines and norms for conservation of architectural heritage.

The open courtyard, a distinctive architectural feature of Jammu temples, has been



compromised by the erection of mild steel frames to construct covered passages to the sanctum. Similarly, the historic well within the temple premises is being altered using concrete, bricks, and cement - materials prohibited in heritage conservation thereby compromising the visual and historic character

Concerns were also raised about similar practices being adopted at other heritage sites such as the Suchetgarh temple, Sui Simbli temple, and Purmandal, where conservation and development work by different agencies are reportedly breaching prescribed guidelines.

It was unanimously agreed that INTACH would take up the matter with the Principal Secretary, Department of Archives, Archaeology and Museums, and present a detailed report highlighting the wrong practices in several conservation projects under the "Scheme for Restoration, Revival. Preservation Maintenance of Architecture and Heritage in J&K.'

The house stressed that strict adherence to guidelines laid down by ASI, CPWD, and INTACH is essential for authentic conservation. Members called upon the Department to immediately halt the ongoing work at Balram Ji Temple and other affected sites and undertake a comprehensive review of the projects. It was further emphasized

that the Government should involve INTACH or other national-level conservation agencies in the planning and execution of heritage projects to ensure scientific and sensitive preservation of the region's cultural legacy.
