After blasts, security...

high-level security setup has been activated in and around the venue of the event, they said.

Meanwhile, the protests against Pakistan rocked Jammu and Udhampur districts after twin blasts with protesters blocking highway and other roads.

In Udhampur, locals came out at three places in the town and held anti-Pakistan protests.

They also burnt effigy of Pakistan and raised anti-Pakistan slogans.

The protesters demand enhancement of security in and around the town to foil the terrorists' designs and create fear psychosis.

They lashed out at the security agencies for their failure to ensure fool proof security despite ongoing Navratri festival and forthcoming visit of Union home minister Amit Shah on October 4.

In Jammu city, Shiv Sena, Bajrang Dal and Dogra front held anti-Pakistan protests and called for uncovering those who executed the blasts and ensure their elimination. They raised anti-Pak slogans and took out protest rallies in the city.

Military Affairs. On Wednesday, the government announced appointing Chauhan as the new Chief of Defence Staff, more than nine months after the post fell vacant following the death of Gen Bipin Rawat in a helicopter crash.

Lt Gen Chauhan (retd) is from the 11 Gorkha Rifles, the same regiment of Gen Rawat.

"He will assume charge as the new Chief of Defence Staff on Friday," said an official.

Lt Gen Chauhan (retd) was the Director General of Military Operations (DGMO) of the Army during the Balakot air strikes in 2019 when Indian airplanes pounded a Jaish-e-Mohammed terrorist training camp deep inside Pakistan in response to the Pulwama terror strike.

He will assume the rank of the four-star General once he takes charge as India's second Chief of Defence Staff. He will be the first retired three-star officer to return to service in four-star rank.

After his retirement as the eastern Army Commander last year, he has been serving as the military adviser in the National Security Council Secretariat headed by NSA Ajit Doval.

In a career spanning over nearly 40 years, Lt Gen Anil Chauhan (retd) held several command, staff and instrumental appointments and had extensive experience in counter-insurgency operations in Jammu and Kashmir and North-East India.

Lt Gen Chauhan retired from the service in May last year when he was serving as the eastern Army Commander.

As the Eastern Army Commander, he played a significant role in bolstering India's overall combat readiness along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in Arunachal Pradesh and Sikkim sectors.

On January 1, 2020, Gen Rawat took charge as India's first CDS with a mandate to bring convergence in the functioning of the Army, the Navy and the Indian Air Force and bolster the country's overall military prowess.

Another key mandate of the CDS was to facilitate the restructuring of military commands for optimal utilisation of resources by bringing about jointness in operations, including through the establishment of theatre commands.

In June, the government amended rules paving the way for appointment of any serving or retired Lt General, Air Marshal and Vice Admiral under the age of 62 to the post of Chief of Defence Staff (CDS).

The change in rules allowed three-star officers to become the CDS along with serving chiefs of the three services.

However, the age limit of 62 years for officers to be considered for the post of CDS ruled out a number of officers.

While the age-limit for the three service chiefs is 62 years of age or three years of service, whichever is earlier, the age limit for the CDS is 65 years of age with no fixed tenure defined.

loaders only for the purpose of approach making since big sized boulders were lying in the approach which could not be removed manually.

The company also stated that the JCBs and loaders were used for the loading of mined minerals on the dumpers/trucks since loading of big sized boulders manually was also not feasible.

"The stand taken by the project proponent (PP) is an admission of use of heavy machines for excavation. Once it is admitted that the boulders were so big, not capable of removal or uploading without use of heavy machines like JCBs etc., it is difficult to conceive that the same could have been mined without use of heavy machines," the tribunal said.

It said when questioned from the learned counsel for project proponent that if mined boulders were so big sized that the same could not be loaded on the dumpers/trucks manually, how such boulders could have been mined from the mining area without use of such machines, "we did not receive any satisfactory reply".

"And it is said that whatever is/was the factual position that has been stated in the reply of PP," the order said.

Stating that the statutory procedure has not been followed by State Environment Impact Assessment Authority (SEIAA), J-K, while granting prior environmental clearances in letter and spirit though the provisions are mandatory particularly having direct impact upon the environment, the tribunal asserted that sand mining in river bed has serious consequences.

The agency said that Andrabi used social media platforms to spread insurrectionary imputations and hateful speeches for endangering the integrity, security, and sovereignty of India, and thirty-nine cases are registered against her under various laws in Jammu and Kashmir.

It clarified that even though the house was in the name of Andrabi's mother-in-law, there are significant numbers of incriminating videos and photos to show persons openly advocating secession of Jammu and Kashmir from the Union of India from this attached house.

She along with her associates regularly celebrated Pakistan Day' at her residence situated at Zair Number 34/1, 35/1, Iqbal Colony, 90 Feet Road, Soura PO- Naushera, PSSoura, Srinagar wherein anti-India speeches/slogans were made, insurrectionary material were distributed and pro-Pakistan slogans were chanted along with unfurling of Pakistani flag to profess that Kashmir is a part of Pakistan and that India is an aggressor, the reply filed recently claimed.

It was established that premises mentioned above has been used for holding meetings to commit unlawful activities and terrorist activities followed by Dukhtaran-E-Millat. As per sections 2(g) and 2 (h) of the UAPA, the above-said house clearly comes under proceeds of terrorism as the house was being used for spreading terrorism and for the purpose of a terrorist organization, the reply said.

Andrabi was arrested in 2018 by the NIA for the alleged commission of offences under the Indian Penal Code, including sedition, waging war against the country, and the stringent Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UAPA).

The case was registered by the NIA on directions of the Union Home Ministry.

In her petition, Andrabi contended that the order of attachment was illegal as none of the owners of the property is part of Dukhtaran-E-Millat.

She further said that the attachment amounts to a parallel proceeding and is premature and not suitable in the eyes of law.


BISHNAH: Police on Thursday nabbed a man with 42 bottles of illicit liquor and a sharp-edged weapon at Bishnah.

It added the MTP Act recognises the reproductive autonomy of every pregnant woman to choose medical intervention to terminate her pregnancy.

"Implicitly, this right also extends to a right of the pregnant woman to access healthcare facilities to attain the highest standard of sexual and reproductive health. It is meaningless to speak of the latter in the absence of the former. Reproductive health implies that women should have access to safe, effective, and affordable methods of family planning and enabling them to undergo safe pregnancy, if they so choose," it said.

The court noted the crisis of unsafe abortions still looms large despite the enactment of the MTP law in 1971 and unsafe abortions are a leading but preventable cause of maternal mortality and morbidity.

"However, despite the enactment of the MTP Act in 1971, unsafe abortions continue to be the third leading cause of maternal mortality, and close to eight women in India die each day due to causes related to unsafe abortions," the bench said, while referring to a report of United Nations Population Fund.

It said the absence of sexual health education in the country means that most adolescents are unaware of how the reproductive system functions as well as how contraceptive devices and methods may be deployed to prevent pregnancies.

"The taboos surrounding pre-marital sex prevent young adults from attempting to access contraceptives. The same taboos mean that young girls who have discovered the fact that they are pregnant are hesitant to reveal this to their parents or guardians, who play a crucial role in accessing medical assistance and intervention," the court noted. The Directive Principles of State Policy in the Constitution, it said, lay down the fundamental principles in the governance of the country and press upon the state to apply them while making laws.

The bench went on to say the state must ensure that information regarding reproduction and safe sexual practices is disseminated to all parts of the population and it must see to it that all segments of society are able to access contraceptives to avoid unintended pregnancies and plan their families.

"Medical facilities and Registered Medical Practitioners (RMP) must be present in each district and must be affordable to all. The government must ensure that RMPs treat all patients equally and sensitively.

"Treatment must not be denied on the basis of one's caste or due to other social or economic factors. It is only when these recommendations become a reality that we can say that the right to bodily autonomy and the right to dignity are capable of being realized," the bench said.

It, however, clarified that nothing in the judgment must be construed as diluting the provisions of the Pre-Conception and Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques (Prohibition of Sex Selection) Act, 1994.

6 narco smugglers nabbed with Ganja, heroin

JAMMU: Continuing its drive against drug trafficking, Jammu Police achieved major success by arresting a narco smuggler and recovered 6 Kg Ganja from his possession at Bahu Fort.

As per details, a team of Police Station Bahu Fort constituted under the supervision of SDPO East Sayed Abbas Jafari and led by SHO Bahu Fort Insp Nayat Ali rounded up a suspect. During search, 6 Kg Ganja was recovered from accused namely Mamnoon Chandra, son of Naryan Parshad Chandra, resident of Singra Chhattisgarh, at present Bishnah. He was arrested and FIR No. 251/2022 under sections 8/20 of NDPS Act was registered at Police Station Bahu Fort.

Meanwhile, Poonch Police arrested a narcotic smugglers namely Sajad Hussain alias Mussa, son of Sarwar Hussain, resident of Dhangloot Mendhar; Aftab Hussain, son of Mohd Rafiq, resident of Dhangloot Mendhar; Mohd Waseem, son of Hassan Mohd, resident of Anoop Nagar Fadarpur Merit City at present Jogi Morh Surankote, and Naveed Ahmed, son of Mohd Sharief, resident of Samote Tehsil Surankote. Heroin like contraband weighing 11-12 gm & Ganja weighing about 450 gm were recovered from accused persons.

The Police team lead by SHO Police Station Surankote Rajveer Singh, under the close supervision of DYSP Surankote Tanveer Jeni on direction of SSP Poonch Rohit Baskotra, while on routine patrolling at Surankote, recovered aforementioned narcotics. Accordingly, FIR No. 283/2022 under sections 8(a)/ 21/22/25 of NDPS Act, FIR No. 298/2022 under sections 8(a)/20 of NDPS Act & FIR No. 325/2022 under sections 8(a)/21/22 of NDPS Act were registered at Police Station Surankote and investigation started.
