AWANTIPORA: Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha on Tuesday said that the transformation post 2019 has empowered every section of Jammu and Kashmir society with access to all benefits provided by the constitution.

"A large population of Jammu and Kashmir was deprived of it for a long time". the Lieutenant Governor said while addressing a seminar on 'Society, Culture and Social Change: Kashmir and Beyond' organised by Islamic University of Science and Technology and Indian Sociological Society here.

The Lt Governor observed that deliberate attempts were made to keep Jammu Kashmir, the land of spirituality and wisdom, away from progress and prosperity due to Article 370 and 35-A. The lack of access to benefits brought stagnation to growth. "Discrimination was a norm and social welfare

Around 250 terrorists waiting across LoC; Army ups ante to counter

KERAN SECTOR/LOC: With intelligence reports suggesting presence of around 250 terrorists across launch pads in PoK, the army along the Line of Control (LoC) has upped its ante to counter any nefarious design from across the border.

Maintaining a high vigil at the forward post in Keran sector, the northern most part of Kashmir along the LoC, troops are maintaining a birds-eye vigil despite ceasefire between the two countries since February last

For the soldiers at this frontier, it's a battle that has to be fought on two fronts -hostile neighbour and harsh winter, which is approaching.

Though the claims of the army that infiltration has reduced in the past few years, officials, who spoke to a group of visiting journalists, said there were intelligence inputs about the pres-

Aarti Devi has rejected bail application of one Manjeet Singh who circulated obscene video of girl on social media.

According to police case. Police Station Reasi registered FIR on the complaint of complainant alleging therein that accused prepared false and fake nude video of complainant and screen-shot of same was shared to him by some unknown person from an unknown whatsapp number and on enquiry, the person disclosed his name as Manjeet Singh. Thereafter, complainant after stating that video does not belong to her, blocked his number. After a few days, the accused

contacted her again from another Whatsapp number and asked her that video belonged to her. Complainant tried her best to convince accused that video doesn't belong to her and asked him to stop torturing her. After a few days, the complainant came to know that her fake nude video was circulating on social media, as an attempt by accused to defame her.

Munsiff Reasi Aarti Devi after hearing both the sides observed that the prima facie accusation of offences alleged against accused person under sections 354-D of IPC, 66-E, 67-A, 67 of IT is under investigation and same is at initial stage. "Accused is in police custody since August 31, 2022. During the investi-

gation, statements of some of the witnesses including the complainant are also recorded. Without commenting much on the merits of case and giving any finding on the truthiness or falsity of allegation will amount to pre trial findings which is not permissible under law but the allegations as already said above are prima facie established which pertains not only to complainant but same has its wide impact on the society as a whole. J&K to 'dismantle terror ecosystem' **STATE TIMES NEWS** SRINAGAR: The State

Investigation Agency (SIA) on Tuesday carried out searches at multiple locations across Kashmir with an aim to dismantle the terror ecosystem working at the behest of Pakistanbased masterminds who have been "identified", an official said.

The searches were carried out at the residential premises of suspected people in Shopian, Awantipora, Pulwama and Anantnag in Kashmir Baramulla in north Kashmir in connection with the investigation of a case registered under various sections of Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act

and Indian Penal Code this year, the official said.

He said the case pertains to a terrorist grid active in the Valley and the searches are aimed at dismantling the terror ecosystem by identifying over ground workers supporting and abetting terrorism.

"Details that are being

investigated into at the initial stage include masterminds in Pakistan who with

active support of Pakistani Intelligence Agencies and in connivance with proscribed terrorist organization(s) of JeM based in Pakistan have been activating their upper ground workers for initiating,

organizing and executing terror activities in J&K, the official said. The Pakistani master-

minds have been "comprehensively identified", the official said, adding their particulars, however, are being kept confidential because other agents connected with them are not alerted.

During the searches, the official said incriminating material, mobile phones and other articles important for the investigation have been recovered and seized.

He said an analysis of the data would follow and the emerging leads would become the basis for further investigation.
