SRINAGAR: In a significant move to safeguard public health, Chief Secretary Atal Dulloo chaired an inter-departmental meeting to review the comprehensive action plan on food safety JammuKashmir. The review follows recent seizures of substandard meat and dairy products, raising alarm over food adulteration. The Chief Secretary direct-

ed stringent action against unlabelled and non-standard packaged food items. particularly those lacking ingredient details. The action plan, prepared by the Food Safety Wing in coordination with key departments, includes joint inspection teams, surprise checks, district-wise mapping of food businesses, and the establishment of cold-chain infrastructure at entry

Key components include regulation of the 257.5 lakh kg meat deficit through safe supply mechanisms, mandatory hygiene standards at meat shops, deployment of veterinary officers, and construction of modern slaughterhouses. Awareness campaigns, public participation, and monthly reviews by District-Level Advisorv Committees will further strengthen implementation. Chief Secretary Dulloo emphasized svnergy among departments to ensure only safe and hygienic food reaches markets, calling for active support from citizens and food business operators to make

Vikram Puri demands urgent relief, infrastructure rebuild after flood havoc in J&K

Calls for Tawi Bridge reconstruction, farmer compensation, industry revival package, and stronger water supply systems

SRINAGAR/JAMMU: Shri Vikram Puri, Chairman of the Trade and Commerce body of the Jammu and Kashmir National Conference, has issued a strong appeal to the Central Government and the Lieutenant Governor of J&K to act urgently in the wake of the devastating floods that have crippled the region's economy.

In a media interview, Puri said the collapse of the Tawi bridge stands as a grim reminder of the fragile state of infrastructure. He urged its immediate reconstruction along with rapid restoration of damaged roads, power, and public assets. "Connectivity is our lifeline. Without it, trade, industry, and daily life come to

a standstill," he stressed. He pointed out that the Jammu-Srinagar National Highway closure for days stranded thousands of trucks carrying essentials and fruit, causing losses running into crores. Horticulture, particularly apples, and pears, has suffered massive damage, while paddy fields have been washed away, leaving farmers devastated. Local communities, as well as Gujjar and Bakarwal families, he said, have lost livestock, their only livelihood and need urgent compensation. Traders and households too have lost food stocks and storage facili-

ties, worsening the crisis.

Highlighting another critical issue, Puri noted that water supply systems collapsed in large parts of Jammu during the floods due to old and damaged pipelines. "This is a wakeup call. We need immediate replacement of outdated pipelines, better flood-control measures in low-lying areas, and backup systems to ensure safe drinking water in times of disaster," he said.

On the industrial front, Puri

demanded a revival package for micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs), including restructuring of loans, rationalization of electricity tariffs, and marketing support local industries to promote local products nationally. He also criticized the repeated exclusion of Jammu from Parliamentary committee visits, despite being home to most industrial units

Appealing to Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Lt. Governor Manoj Sinha, Puri said: "Flood-hit families, farmers, Gujjars, traders, and industries cannot wait. Relief must be immediate, compensation must be transparent, and infrastructure rebuilding must begin without delay."

Concluding, he reminded that

while the people of J&K have always shown resilience, various disciplines. "Resilience must be matched with responsibility. He called on the central government to act swiftly to prevent long-term economic collapse and to restore hope among the people.

JAMMU: The Department of Strategic and Regional Studies (DSRS), University of Jammu (JU), organised an insightful online public lecture on "Nepal Crisis and its Impact on India." The lecture was delivered by Prof. Sangeeta Thapliyal, a renowned scholar from Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU), specialising in South Asian studies and Nepalese politics.

Prof. Thapliyal provided a comprehensive overview of Nepal's political transition from monarchy to a republican democracy, focusing on the fragile nature of coalition politics, frequent governmental changes, and the challenges in implementing the 2015 Constitution. She highlighted issues such as federal restructuring, identity-based demands, and

stress points in Nepal's evolving democracy.

She also examined Nepal's complex geopolitical positioning between India and China. While China has expanded its influence through infrastructure and connectivity projects under the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), India shares deeprooted historical, cultural, and socio-economic ties with Nepal. Prof. Thanlival stressed that managing this trilateral dynamic requires diplomatic sensitivity, especially given ongoing border disputes and trade con-
