"A portion of the road from Basohli to Bani had been washed out due to ncessant rains leaving a yawning gap in the road at Tikri Morh, 47 km from Basohli. An entirely new formation had to be cut to bypass the damaged stretch of the road. This was undertaken in treacherous weather and difficult terrain with men and machines taking calculated risk," the PRO Defence Jammu said in a post on X.

He said the link was restored, establishing connectivity to Bhaderwah in Doda district from Basohli in Kathua.

"Kudos to Sankar Tayal, OC (Officer Commanding) 69 RCC (Road Construction Company) of BRO and his team for accomplishing this difficult mission," the defence PRO said.

The IMCT directed that damage details be compiled department-wise for submission to Government of India.

The DC informed the team that Budgam administration has already initiated both short-term restoration measures and long-term resilience planning.

The IMCT appreciated the efforts of District Administration Budgam in relief and restoration works, and stated that assessment report will be submitted to the Government of India for necessary support.

The IMCT assured that observations and recommendations of team mempers will be shared with the Government of India to ensure immediate relief as well as long-term resilience planning for Budgam district.

The next total lunar eclipse will be visible from the country on December 31,

Eclipses are rare and do not occur every full or new moon because the moon's orbit is inclined about 5 degrees to the earth's orbit around the Sun.

A lunar eclipse occurs when the earth comes between the sun and the moon, easting its shadow on the lunar surface.

Unlike solar eclipses, observing a total lunar eclipse does not require special equipment and is safe with the naked eye, binoculars, or a telescope.

In India, lunar eclipses are linked to several superstitions, with people often oiding food, water, and physical activity, fearing "poisoning or no gy". Some even believe eclipses are "harmful to pregnant women and their

However, astronomers say lunar eclipses are merely shadow phenomena, understood long before Aryabhata's time, and "pose no risk to people or ani-

Unfortunately, certain non-scientific beliefs have led to unfortunate incidents during past eclipses, underscoring the need for scientific awareness. It is perfeetly safe to go outside and eat while enjoying this magnificent celestial spectacle, said Ramanujam.

everything has been destroyed by floods....the entire year's hard work has gone down the drain," Mohammad Younis, a farmer from Shamsipora in Anantnag, told PTI.

Younis said the situation was similar across Anantnag, Pulwama and parts of Kulgam district, which together form the rice-producing bowl of south Kashmir.

"Most of the rice in south Kashmir is produced in the bowl which is shared in part by these three districts. The local farmers are devastated as they have

ost their livelihood this season," he added. Standing crops in Tachoo, Dooru, Shamsipora, Muniwar, Lallipora and Mallapora in Anantnag and Kulgam, Kakapora and Newa in Pulwama have been affected. Some areas of Budgam adjoining Pulwama have also suffered

The horticulture sector too has taken a heavy blow, with orchards washed away in Dachnipora area of Anantnag. "Apple trees in Sallar, Srigufwara, Kullar and other villages on the banks of Lidder stream have been damaged, while new orchards in Pulwama's low-lying areas have also been affected," a

horticulture department official said.

There has been substantial damage to apple crops in Shopian and Kulgam districts as well, the official added. While farmers claimed losses were running into hundreds of crores, officials said an accurate estimate would take time.

"People are still in the process of recovering from the impact of the flood. Field officials have been deputed and they will visit the affected areas most likely from tomorrow for carrying out loss assessment," a senior official from Anantnag district said.

Heavy rains in the last week of August pushed the Jhelum's water level to more than 27 feet, two feet above the flood level. While the river overflowed embankments in several parts of south Kashmir, a breach in Budgam led to inundation of large swathes of central Kashmir, including Srinagar.

Chief Minister Omar Abdullah has asked the Centre to announce a relief package for flood victims after assessing the losses in Jammu division as well as Kashmir vallev.

# **BRO** restores critical road connectivity in Pragwal sector

JAMMU: In a swift response to a major infrastructure disruption caused by heavy rains, the Border Roads Organisation (BRO) has successfully restored the Gharkhal-Pragwal road, the only critical artery connecting the strategical-



ly important sector in Akhnoor area near here, the Army said on Sunday. Torrential rains led to the complete washing away of a vital stretch of the road last week, bringing all civilian and military movement to a halt.

The road blockade severely impacted the mobility of residents and halted essential Army convoy movements to forward-deployed units, a defence spokesperson said.

He said local villagers faced tremendous hardships for several days, with disruptions in supply of daily essentials and medical access.

Responding to an urgent request from the civil administration and the Army BRO's 57 Road Construction Company (RCC), under the leadership of Lt Col Preetam, immediately mobilized men and machinery.

Braving the perilous conditions posed by the swelling Chenab River -- which had carved out a new stream -- the BRO team worked tirelessly to restore the breach, the spokesperson said.

Despite extreme challenges, the BRO personnel operated round-the-clock and successfully reconnected the sector.

Movement of vehicles has now resumed, bringing immense relief to the local population and restoring operational readiness for the defence forces, the spokesperson said.

He said local residents expressed deep gratitude and admiration for the BRO. "This restoration once again underscores the vital role played by the BRO in ensuring connectivity, security, and support in India's most challenging terrains and conditions," he said.

### Temporary bridge built to facilitate movement of stranded tribal families in Kishtwar

JAMMU: Authorities in Kishtwar district constructed a temporary wooder bridge on Sunday to facilitate the movement of stranded tribal families, officials said.

Following the recent spell of heavy rains, all wooden bridges in the Faridabad area of Marwah were washed away, leaving several tribal families belonging to the nomadic Bakerwal community stranded after spending the summer months in the region, an official spokesperson said.

With no route available to return, he said the families made urgent appeals for assistance.

Responding promptly to the situation, the forest department team swung into action and swiftly constructed a temporary wooden bridge, restoring vital connectivity and enabling the safe return of the stranded families, the spokesperson added.
